
Minutes of the first meeting of C-LAMPS held on 12th, October, 2007 at Vijaya College,

The following were the items discussed at the first meeting of members of the proposed society -
Centre for Leadership and Management in Public Services

1. Members unanimously to form an association in the name of "Centre for Leadership and Management in Public Services" (C-LAMPS) and append their signatures to the Memorandum of Association.
2. Members agreed on the name of the society as "Centre for Leadership and Management in Public Services" (C-LAMPS)
3. Criteria for admit new member was evolved. Membership Fees agreed as follows -
Life time membership - Rs.1000 and Annual Fees - Rs. 100
4. C-LAMPS structure
Governing Board - General Body will elect 8 members for Governing Board. Out of these 8 members one must be women. Governing Board will nominate within its members, one President, one Vice-President, one Secretary, one Joint Secretary, and one Treasurer. Governing Board can co-opt maximum of two eminent people into the Board.
5. Aims and Objects are approved by the members. The other clauses of the Memorandum of Association and the Rules and Regulations were also discussed and approved unanimously.
6. General Body elected following members for Governing Board- M K Sridhar, Gurumurthy K, M D Kiran, Karunamurthy R, Wg Cdr. Ragnath, Suparna Diwakar, Suresh Maruthi and Nayana Tara.
7. The secretary was asked to submit the required documents to the Registrar of Societies and do the needful to obtain registration of the association.
8. Bank Transactions - Members decided to authorize President, Secretary, and Treasurer to operate bank account after getting registration. The following operating rules were approved unanimously - Cash Withdrawal -

- k. Organize orientation programmes, seminars and discussion groups for persons including legislators in the field of Public services Leadership and Management at the level of policy making in Central and State Governments;
- l. To collaborate with other agencies, institutions and organizations, Institutes of Management and Administration and other allied institutions in India and abroad, in such way as may be considered necessary for the promotion of these objectives;
- m. Offer M. Phil, Ph. D. and Post-Doctoral Programmes and award degrees in public services planning, administration, policy research, gender, discrimination, globalization, management and information system, etc.;
- n. To disseminate and advance knowledge by providing instructional, research and extension facilities in such branches of learning as it may deem fit and to provide to all those concerned for promotion of innovations in public service delivery
- o. To conduct the above-mentioned programmes and courses in its off - Campuses, and off-shore campuses; and
- p. Provide various kinds of social and other services for the needy and deserving. To take all steps necessary for the welfare of society, in connection with public services including education and health
- q. To do or perform all such other acts, functions and things as may be deemed necessary, desirable or incidental in furtherance of the above objectives.
- r. Any other activity as may be decided by the general body, within the framework outlined above

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5. The management of the Association shall be in the hands of the Governing Council. It shall be elected by the general body at the annual general body meeting.
6. The Secretary of the Society is authorized to correspond with the Registrar of Societies in Karnataka, Bangalore, in connection with the registration of Association and any corrections to be effected in the Memorandum of Association and the Rules and Regulations. In the absence of the secretary, the Joint Secretary shall be so authorized.
7. The funds / income of the society by whatever means it might derive, shall be utilized for the purposes of the objects of the Association in consonance with section 3 (g) of the Karnataka Societies Registration Act, 1960 and no portion of it shall be utilized for payment to the members by way of profit, interest, dividend etc
8. The alteration of the Memorandum of Association shall be done in consonance with section 9 of the Karnataka Societies Registration Act.
9. The funds of the Society shall be invested in the modes specified under the provisions of Section 13(1) (d) read with section 11(5) of the Income Tax Act, 1961 as amended from time to time.
10. There shall be maintained all accounts of the society regularly. The accounts shall be duly audited by a Chartered Accountant. Every year, the accounts shall be closed by 31st March.
11. No amendment to the Memorandum of Association and the Rules and Regulations of the Association shall be made which may prove to be repugnant to the provisions of section 2(15), 11, 12, 13 and 80G of the Income Tax Act, 1961 as amended from time to time. Further no amendment shall be carried out without the prior approval of the Commissioner of Income Tax.
12. In the event of the dissolution or winding up of the Society, the assets remaining on the date of dissolution shall under no circumstances be distributed among the trustees, members of the managing committee, but the same shall be transferred to another charitable trust / society, whose objects are similar to those of this society and which enjoys recognition under 80G of the Income Tax Act, 1961 as amended from time to time.
13. The benefits of the society shall be open to all irrespective of castes, creed or religion.

Rules and Regulations of Association

1. The name of the Association shall be "Centre for Leadership and Management in Public Services"
2. The address shall be at 'Sri Krishna Dhaama', 457, 18th Main, IV T Block, Jaynagar, Bangalore -560 041.
3. The Association shall be all over Karnataka.
4. In this Memorandum of Association and Rules and Regulations, the following words will mean :
 - a. Association means Association of "Centre for Leadership and Management in Public Services"
 - b. C-LAMPS means "Centre for Leadership and Management in Public Services"
 - c. Year means Year, commencing from 1st of April to 31st of March
 - d. Governing Body means the Executive Committee elected by members to manage the affairs of the Association.
5. Aims and Objects of Centre for Leadership and Management in Public Services" C- LAMPS are:
 - a. Build an understanding and apply the same for the education, health and other public service systems in the following areas-
 - **Quality** – Quality of the services provided is a critical aspect, and towards this the use of various processes, tools and techniques for systemic quality and excellence
 - **Stakeholder Management** – the needs, priorities and perspectives of different groups would differ and it is critical to develop processes of understanding and negotiation amongst these
 - **Technology and Knowledge Management:** Increasingly, management is relying on modern tools and technologies including IT to be able to respond and be proactive in an increasingly volatile environment. Use of IT will also enable to meet the challenges of scale and diversity within the sector. C-LAMPS will work towards building a culture of informed decision making and transparency within the public system.

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- b. Work on **people development** and processes: systematic development and capacity building of various positions in identified areas of leadership, managerial and administrative roles. This will also include local level capacity building and the developing of capacities of micro planning, participative processes, and institution improvement plans among PRI members and leaders with the help of grass-root level functionaries. Provide professional guidance to state on softer people processes to contribute to building a culture of service orientation, good governance practices, responsiveness and transparency.
- c. Study existing **organization structures and processes** and suggest changes that would provide a conducive and enabling environment for Department officers and other stakeholders to contribute to the stated objectives. C-IAMPS would carry out studies for reform of the department or individual schemes and to assist the department in implementing the recommendations of any such studies conducted from time to time.
- d. Develop **training programs and training material**, and implement them in order to strengthen the people capacities of the department. To organize pre-service and in-service training programmes;
- e. Provide professional guidance to agencies, institutions and personnel engaged in Leadership and Management work in public services; here and elsewhere, Public Services institutions would include Government departments, civil society institutions, local body institutions, private institution working in public services etc
- f. Conduct aid, promote and coordinate necessary research and evaluation studies, extra mural studies, extension programmes and field outreach activities of various aspects of public services delivery system and allied disciplines including planning techniques and administrative procedures, effectiveness of various programs etc
- g. To act as a clearing house of ideas and information on research, training and extension in Public service Leadership and Management and other programmes, create resource centres including digital libraries etc for sharing knowledge in this area
- h. To prepare, print and publish papers, periodicals and books in furtherance of these objectives and especially to bring out journals on Public service Leadership and Management
- i. Organize orientation and training programmes and refresher courses conferences, workshops, meetings, seminars and briefing sessions for people and institutions in public service systems,
- j. Offer, on request, consultancy service to Governments, including State Governments, institutions and institutions/organizations in India & abroad. to award consultancy work/services to other people and institutions in public service systems;

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- k. Organize orientation programmes, seminars and discussion groups for persons including legislators in the field of Public services Leadership and Management at the level of policy making in Central and State Governments;
- l. To collaborate with other agencies, institutions and organizations, Institutes of Management and Administration and other allied institutions in India and abroad, in such way as may be considered necessary for the promotion of these objectives;
- m. Offer M. Phil, Ph. D. and Post-Doctoral Programmes and award degrees in public services planning, administration, policy research, gender, discrimination, globalization, management and information system, etc.;
- n. To disseminate and advance knowledge by providing instructional, research and extension facilities in such branches of learning as it may deem fit and to provide to all those concerned for promotion of innovations in public service delivery
- o. To conduct the above-mentioned programmes and courses in its off - Campuses, and off-shore campuses; and
- p. Provide various kinds of social and other services for the needy and deserving. To take all steps necessary for the welfare of society, in connection with public services including education and health
- q. To do or perform all such other acts, functions and things as may be deemed necessary, desirable or incidental in furtherance of the above objectives.
- r. Any other activity as may be decided by the general body, within the framework outlined above

6. Change of name of Association and Rules and Regulations

The name of the association will be "Centre for Leadership and Management in Public Services". In consonance with section 10 of the Karnataka Societies Registration Act, 1960, the name and Rules and Regulations of the society may be amended by a resolution passed at a special general body meeting, convened for the said purpose. The notice for such General Body shall have been delivered or sent by post to every member of the Association at least 21 days (twenty-one days) previous to the date of the special general body meeting and resolution. Proposing the change or amendment is passed in the votes cast in favour of the resolution by members who are entitled to vote in person and such votes are not less than three times the number of votes cast by members so entitled to vote. Every change or amendment within 31 days of making thereof, be filed with the registrar

7. Authorization

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The Secretary of the Association is authorized to correspond with the Registrar of Societies, Bangalore, in connection with the registration of the Association and any corrections to be effected in the Memorandum of Association and the Rules and Regulations. In the absence of the secretary, the Joint Secretary shall be so authorized.

8. Income

The funds / income of the society by whatever means it might derive, shall be utilized for the purposes of the objects of the Association in consonance with section 3 (g) of the Karnataka Societies Registration Act, 1960 and no portion of it shall be utilized for payment to the members by way of profit, interest, dividend etc.

9. Membership

a. Centre for Leadership and Management in Public Services will have three types of members – Active member ('A'), Associate Member ('B'), Patron ('C'). Only the active members will constitute the general body. Active members will be individuals. Associate members and patrons can be individuals or artificial entities such as companies, institutions etc, whose representatives can participate in the work and meetings of C-LAMPS.

10. Membership Fees

- a. Each Active member shall pay a life membership of Rs. 1,000.00 (One thousand only) to the society as well as an annual subscription fee of Rs 100 (One hundred only). The fees are non-refundable. All members whose name appears in the list of members of the Association shall have the right to participate in all the meetings, including general body. Only Active members shall have the right to vote. Associate members and Patrons shall not be required to pay any membership or subscription fees.
- b. Any person, who has not paid the membership fees, shall not have the right to participate in any meeting of the general body or any meeting of the Association.

11. Admission of members

People who are above the age of 18 years are eligible for active membership of the Association. To become Active members, the concerned individual would apply to the Executive Committee for membership. The membership needs to be approved by the Executive Committee. Associate members and Patrons will be invited to be associated with the Association.

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12. Funds

The Association shall raise funds in the following manner

- a. membership fees
- b. donations from institutions, statutory bodies, governments, individuals and any other source which the executive committee decides
- c. loans / assistance or grants, including project grants from national and international donors
- d. fees and revenues from assignments and projects executed by the association for other entities


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13. The management of the Association

- a. The management of the Association, called the Executive Committee, shall consist of 8 members, elected in the annual general body meeting.
- a. The management of the Association shall have tenure of one year and will continue till the next committee is elected by the general body.
- b. Office Bearers
- c. The executive committee members shall elect amongst themselves, a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Joint Secretary and a Treasurer. Out of these 8 members at least one must be a woman. Governing Board can co-opt a maximum of two eminent people into the Board.
- d. The Executive Committee will meet regularly, once in a quarter to manage the affairs of the Association.
- c. The interim vacancies arising in the Executive Committee by way of resignation, death or in any other way shall be filled up by the committee by co-opting a member, whose term of office shall be for the un-expired portion of the term of the committee or the member.
- f. General body of the Association may elect any additional office bearers, such as vice presidents and joint secretaries in addition to the existing executive committee as and when desired.

14. Proceedings of the Meetings and Resolutions.

- a. The first general body meeting shall be held by the Association within 18 months of the registration. Subsequent general body meetings shall be held within 9 months from the expiry of the year. Meetings shall be conducted in consonance with the Karnataka Societies Registration Act, 1960, section 11.
- b. The general body meeting shall elect the executive committee for the year and discuss any item permitted by the chair.
- c. Special general meetings can be convened in consonance with section 11 (3) of the Karnataka Societies Registration Act, 1960.

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- d. Each active member shall have one vote. Resolutions shall be passed by a simple majority of members present and voting.
 - e. Quorum for the Executive Committee and general body meeting is two members.
15. Office Bearers powers and duties

A. President

The President shall be the head of the Association and preside over all meetings.
She / He may appoint staff for the establishment.

B. Secretary

The secretary shall be the chief functionary of the Association and shall discharge the following duties

- a. Carry out the duties assigned by the Executive Committee

Manage and call for the Executive Committee with the consent of the President. She / He will be the custodian of all records, accounts, books and properties of the Association and be responsible for the Association to maintain books of accounts in consonance with section 12 of the Karnataka Societies Registration Act, 1960.

- b. Incur expenditure with the approval of the President.
- c. Maintain books of accounts and records, including proceedings of meetings

C. Treasurer

She / He may operate the accounts jointly with the President or jointly with the Secretary. Each payment will need to be approved by the Treasurer and the President or by the Treasurer and the Secretary. The Executive Committee can make changes in the signatory requirements from time to time.

The Vice President will act as the President, in the absence of the latter. The Joint Secretary will act as the Secretary, in the absence of the latter. The Secretary will act as the Treasurer, in the absence of the latter.

D. Reimbursements

Members of the Executive Committee and the general body may be paid sitting fees, travel expense reimbursements etc for participating in the meetings of C-LAMPS. They can also be paid for any professional services rendered as a part of the work or projects of C-LAMPS, including in the nature of consultancy charges, salaries etc. Such payments as well as payments to the senior management team, including the chief executive of C-LAMPS, towards salaries, consultancy charges etc can be reviewed by the Executive Committee.

Subsequently

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16. General rules

- a. All monies received by the Association will be acknowledged and receipts issued. The Executive Committee shall be competent to use the funds in such manner, as it deems fit in the interest of the Association.
- b. The Executive Committee shall place the audited accounts before the general body meeting for approval in consonance with section 11 of the Karnataka Societies Registration Act, 1960
- c. The Balance sheet and the list of committee members shall be filed with the registrar of societies in consonance with section 13 of the Karnataka Societies Registration Act, 1960, on or before the 14th day on which the annual general body meeting was held.
- d. Dissolution of the Association shall be in consonance with section 22 of the Karnataka Societies Registration Act, 1960.
- e. In the event of the dissolution or winding up of the Society, the assets remaining on the date of dissolution shall under no circumstances be distributed among the trustees, members of the managing committee, but the same shall be transferred to another charitable trust / society, whose objects are similar to those of this society and which enjoys recognition under 80G of the Income Tax Act, 1961 as amended from time to time.

17. All provisions of the Karnataka Societies Registration Act, 1960, shall be applicable, insofar as they shall be over-ridden by the specific clauses in the Memorandum of Association and Rules and Regulations of the Association.

18. Suits by and against the Association

The Association may be sued in the name of the Association, represented by the President.

19. General body


The general body shall be the supreme body of the Association.

20. Office working hours

The working hours of Centre for Leadership and Management in Public Services shall be 9.30 a.m. to 5.00 p.m. from Monday to Friday. The Executive Committee can make changes from time to time.

21. Amendments of Memorandum of Association and Rules and Regulations

The general body in consonance with section 9 and 10 of the Karnataka Societies Registration Act, 1960, 1960 can do this.



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22. Banking

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The treasurer shall open and operate bank accounts for Centre for Leadership and Management in Public Services. This will include current accounts, overdrafts, borrowings as well as investments made out of the association monies. The Executive Committee can determine further rules and modalities in this matter. Each payment made by cheque has to be signed by the treasurer jointly with the president or by the treasurer jointly with the Secretary. The Executive Committee can authorize borrowings as well as lending of monies, as may be required from time to time.

22 a. Investment

The funds of the Society shall be invested in the modes specified under the provisions of Section 13(1)(d) read with section 11(5) of the Income Tax Act, 1961 as amended from time to time.

23. Accounts

There shall be maintained all accounts of the society regularly. The accounts shall be duly audited by a Chartered Accountant. Every year, the accounts shall be closed by 31st March.

24. Amendment

No amendment to the Memorandum of Association and the Rules and Regulations of the Association shall be made which may prove to be repugnant to the provisions of section 2(15), 11, 12, 13 and 80G of the Income Tax Act, 1961 as amended from time to time. Further no amendment shall be carried out without the prior approval of the Commissioner of Income Tax.

25. Benefits

The benefits of the society shall be open to all irrespective of castes, creed or religion.

KARNATAKA ACT NO. 37 OF 2021

(First Published in the Karnataka Gazette Extra-ordinary on the 11th day of October 2021)

THE CHANAKYA UNIVERSITY ACT, 2021

(Received the assent of the Governor on the 11th day of October 2021)

An Act to establish and incorporate in the State of Karnataka a University of Unitary in nature in private sector by the Centre for Educational and Social Studies a Society to promote and undertake the advancement of knowledge frontiers in Higher Education in Sciences, Engineering and Technology, Arts, Humanities, Social Sciences, Commerce, Management, Medicine, Health Sciences, Pharmacy etc., and for the matters connected therewith or incidental thereto.

Whereas it is expedient to establish and incorporate in the State of Karnataka a University of unitary in nature in private sector by the Centre for Educational and Social Studies. The University shall be a multi-disciplinary institution committed unflinchingly to the service of society through excellence in teaching, development of knowledge and direct contributions in the world of practice. The concerns of India and Indian knowledge systems will deeply inform all the knowledge endeavors of the University including teaching, research and practice in Higher Education in Sciences, Engineering and Technology, Arts, Humanities, Social Sciences, Commerce, Management, Medicine, Health Sciences, Pharmacy etc., This Act shall embody the true spirit of the National Education Policy 2020.

Be it enacted by the Karnataka State Legislature in the seventy second year of the Republic of India as follows:-

**CHAPTER-I
PRELIMINARY**

1. Short title, extent and commencement.- (1)This Act may be called the Chanakya University Act, 2021.

2. It extends to the whole of the State of Karnataka.

3. It shall come into force on such date as the State Government may, by notification, in the official Gazette, appoint.



2. Definitions.- - In this Act, unless the context otherwise requires,-

- (a) “Academic Council” means the Academic Council of the University as specified in section 28 ;
- (b) “Agenda Matters” means all the matters and business to be designated in the Statutes each of which can be either included in the Agenda or be taken up for discussion and decision at a meeting of the Board of Governors or the Board of Management or any Committees, as the case may be, only subject to the prior written approval of the Chancellor, consenting to the passing of the such matters and business at such a meeting;
- (c) “Board of Governors” means the Board of Governors of the University as specified in section 26 ;
- (d) “Board of Management” means the Board of Management of the University as specified in section 27 ;
- (e) “Campus” means a campus established, maintained or recognized by the University, wherever situated within the State;
- (f) “Chancellor”, “Pro-Chancellor”, “Vice-Chancellor”, “Pro Vice-Chancellor” means respectively the Chancellor, the Pro-Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor and the Pro Vice-Chancellor of the University;
- (g) “Committees” means the committee formed under this Act or Statutes or Rules or Regulations or by the various functionaries of the University as the case may be and includes the Search cum Selection Committee, the Finance Committee and such other committees;
- (h) “Constituent College” means a college or institution established and maintained by the University;
- (i) “Court” means the Court of the University as specified in the section 25 ;
- (j) “Finance Committee” means the Finance Committee of the University as specified in section 30 ;
- (k) “Government” means the Government of Karnataka;
- (l) “National Accreditation bodies” means a body established by the Central Government for laying down norms and conditions for ensuring academic standards of higher education, such as University Grants Commission, All India Council of Technical Education, National Council of Teacher Education, Medical Council of India, Pharmaceutical Council of India, National Council of Assessment and Accreditation, Indian Council of Agriculture Research, Distance Education Council, Council of Scientific and Indian Research, etc., and includes the Government;



- (m) “Ombudsman” means the ombudsman of the university as specified in section 36 ;
- (n) “Prescribed” means prescribed by Rules made by the Government under this Act;
- (o) “Principal in relation to a Constituent College” means the head of the Constituent College and includes, where there is no Principal or in the absence of a Principal appointed, the Vice-Principal or any other person for the time being appointed to act as Principal;
- (p) “Regional Centre” means a centre established or maintained by the University for the purpose of coordinating and supervising the work of Study Centers in any region within State for performing such other functions as may be conferred on such centre by the Board of Management;
- (q) “Registrar”, and “Registrar (Evaluation)” means the Registrar, and the Registrar (Evaluation) of the University;
- (r) “Research Centre” means a centre within the state established, maintained or recognised by the University for carrying out research programme or any other research in any branch of knowledge;
- (s) “Society” means the “Centre for Educational and Social Studies” registered under Karnataka Societies Registration Act 1960 (Karnataka Act No 17 of 1960);
- (t) “Sponsoring Authority” or “Sponsoring Body” in relation to this Act means Centre for Educational and Social Studies ;
- (u) “State” means the State of Karnataka;
- (v) “Statutes”, “Regulations”, “Rules” and “Ordinances” mean, respectively, the Statutes, the Regulations, the Rules, and the Ordinances of the University made under this Act;
- (w) “Study Centre” means a centre within the State established and maintained by the University for the purpose of advising, counselling or for rendering any other assistance required by the students in the context of the education;
- (x) “Teacher” means and includes a Professor, Associate Professor, Assistant Professor or Reader or Lecturer or Faculty or such other person as may be appointed for imparting instruction or conducting or to guide research in the University or in a Constituent College and includes the Principal of Constituent College in conformity with the norms specified by the ‘University Grants Commission’;
- (y) “University” means the “Chanakya” University established and incorporated under this Act;



- (z) “University Grants Commission” means the Commission established under section 4 of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956 (Central Act 3 of 1956);
- (aa) “Visitor” means the visitor of the University as specified in section 13.

CHAPTER-II

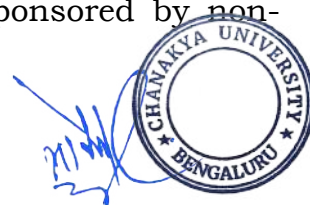
THE UNIVERSITY AND SPONSORING BODY

3. Proposal for the establishment of the University.- (1) The Society shall have the right to establish the University of unitary nature subject to and in accordance with the provisions of this Act.

(2) The proposal to establish a University shall be made to the State Government by the Society.

(3) The proposal shall contain the following particulars, namely:-

- (i) the objects of the University along with the details of the Society;
- (ii) the extent and status of the University and the availability of land;
- (iii) the nature and type of programmes of study and research to be undertaken by the University during a period of five academic years immediately following the commencement date;
- (iv) the nature of faculties or schools, courses of study and research proposed to be started;
- (v) the campus development such as buildings, equipment and structural amenities;
- (vi) the phased outlays of capital expenditure for a period of five academic years immediately following the commencement date;
- (vii) the item-wise recurring expenditure, sources of finance and estimated expenditure for each student;
- (viii) the scheme for mobilizing resources and the cost of capital thereto and the manner of repayments to each source;
- (ix) the scheme of generation of funds internally through the recovery of fee from students, revenues anticipated from consultancy and other activities relating to the objects of the University and other anticipated incomes;
- (x) the details of expenditure on unit cost, the extent of concessions or rebates in fee, free ship and scholarship for students belonging to economically weaker sections and the fee structure indicating varying rate of fee, if any, that would be levied on students who are either non-resident Indians or persons of Indian origin or sponsored by non-



resident Indians or persons of Indian origin and students of nationalities other than India;

- (xi) the years of experience and expertise in the concerned discipline at the command of the Sponsoring Society as well as the financial resources;
- (xii) the system for selection of students to the courses of study at the University; and
- (xiii) Status of fulfillment of such other conditions as may be required by the State Government under this Act to be fulfilled before the establishment of the University.

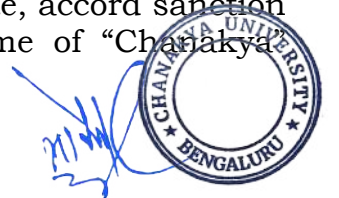
(4) A Screening Committee shall be constituted by the State Government consisting of three members who are Ex-officio members of Karnataka State Higher Education Council to examine the proposals received from the Sponsoring body which has to make recommendations to the State Government for the establishment of the University.

4. Establishment of the University.- (1) Where the State Government, after considering the recommendations of the Screening Committee and holding such inquiry as it may deem necessary, is satisfied that,-

- (i) The Society has the ability to run a University with sufficient infrastructure;
- (ii) owns a land to the extent specified below in accordance with its location, namely:-
 - (a) twenty five acres of land if it is within limits of Bruhat Bangalore Mahanagara Palike;
 - (b) forty acres of land if it is outside the limits of Bruhat Bangalore Mahanagara Palike but within Bangalore Metropolitan Region Development Authority Area;
 - (c) not less than fifty acres of land in the places other than the places specified in clauses (a) and (b).
- (iii) The land specified above shall consist of a single block and it shall be in the name of the concerned Society or institution or university itself.
- (iv) Adequate financial resources for creating the specified statutory funds and conducting the University affairs; and
- (v) Experience or expertise in running higher education institutions.

Based on the furnished particulars required in sub-section (3) of section 3, the Government may direct the Society to establish the permanent Statutory Endowment Fund as specified in section 53;

(2) After the establishment of the Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund, the State Government may, by notification, in the official Gazette, accord sanction for establishment of the University in the State by the name of "Chanakya



University after following the established process and ascertaining the requirements for the same.

(3) The headquarters of the University shall be at Bengaluru. The University may have Campuses or Regional Centers or Study Centers anywhere in Karnataka after five years of establishment of the University subject to the prior permission of the State Government and as per the norms of University Grants Commission.

(4) The First Chancellor, First Pro-Chancellor, First Vice-Chancellor, First Members of the Board of Governors, First Members of the Board of Management and the Academic Council, and all persons who may hereafter become such officers or members, so long as they continue to hold such office or membership, shall constitute a body corporate of the University.

(5) On sanction for the establishment of the University under sub-section (2), the land and other movable and immovable properties acquired, created, arranged or built by the Society for the purpose of the University shall vest in the University.

(6) In all suits and other legal proceedings by or against the University, the pleading shall be signed and verified by, and all processes in such suits and proceedings shall be issued to and be served on the Registrar.

(7) The land, building and other properties of the University shall not be used for any purpose other than incidental to the objects of the University.

5. Grants and Financial Assistance.- The University shall be self-financing and non-profit making organization shall neither make a demand nor shall be entitled to any maintenance grant-in-aid or any other financial assistance from the State or any other body or corporation owned or controlled by the State:

Provided that, the State may, provide financial support through grants or otherwise,-

(a) for research, development and other activities for which other State Government organizations are provided financial assistance; or

(b) for any specific research or programmes receiving support from the State Government;

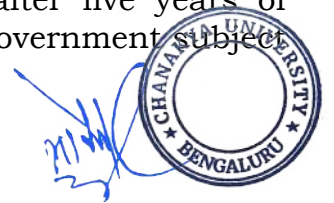
(c) for the benefit of similar universities in the State whether subject to a change in State policy or otherwise;

(d) for supporting the maintenance grant or special grants or any other support that the State Government may provide for similar institutions for such purposes from time to time; and

(e) for implementing the provisions set out in the new National Education Policy, 2020 adopted by the Government of India and Government of Karnataka:

Provided further that, the university may receive any financial support from any other source.

6. Power to establish constituent College, additional campuses, Regional Centers or Study Centers and Research Centers.- The University may have Constituent Colleges, Regional Centers, Research Centers, additional campuses and Study Centers at such places in the State after five years of establishment of the University with the prior approval of the government subject



to the norms of University Grants Commission and other National Accreditation bodies as it deems fit.

7. Objects of the University.- Objectives of the University shall be as stated below:

(i) to further the cause of quality higher learning in the State in the current competitive environment;

(ii) to disseminate and advance knowledge by providing instructional and research facilities in such branches of learning as it may deem fit, and in particular, to make special provisions for integrated courses and to make appropriate measures for promoting interdisciplinary, multidisciplinary and trans-disciplinary studies and research in the University;

(iii) to provide an innovative system of University level education, flexible and open, with regard to methods and practices of learning, combination of courses, eligibility for enrolment, age of entry, conduct of examination and operation of programmes with a view to promote access and equity in higher learning and to encourage excellence in the new fields of knowledge;

(iv) to provide an equal emphasis on both academic and application-oriented learning besides facilitating the realization of inherent human excellence reflecting the essence of Indian thought;

(v) To integrate Indian Knowledge Systems (IKS) with contemporary academic disciplines to expand the frontiers of knowledge and its application for our current times;

(vi) to promote national integration and the integrated development of human personality amongst all its stakeholders;

(vii) to provide instruction, teaching, training, research, consultancy, extension and development in various disciplines in areas such as Sciences, Engineering and Technology, Arts, Humanities, Social Sciences, Commerce, Management, Medicine, Health Sciences, Pharmacy etc., including other allied fields of development and make provisions for research, advancement and dissemination of knowledge in these fields;

(viii) to design and deliver high quality training, capacity building and development systems for teachers in higher and professional education, administrators and professionals working in Government, Public and Private Sectors and development professionals in other systems;

(ix) to establish Campuses and have Study Centers, Constituent Colleges and Regional Centers at various location within Karnataka;

(x) to institute degrees, diplomas, certificates and other academic distinctions like award of credits on the basis of successful completion of academic work evaluated through multiple methods of assessment;

(xi) to collaborate with any other universities, research institutions, non-profit organizations, industry association, professional associations or other organizations and institutions to conceptualize, design, develop and offer specific educational and research programmes, training programmes and exchange programmes for students, faculty members and others;



(xii) to disseminate knowledge and develop a public debate on issues of education and allied development fields through seminars, conferences, executive education programmes, community development programmes, publications and training programmes and events;

(xiii) to undertake programmes for development and training of faculty and researchers of the University in partnership with any other institutions of quality with prior approval of the State Government;

(xiv) to undertake collaborative research and advocacy with any organizations with prior approval of the State Government;

(xv) to establish and manage, Not-for-profit organizations, Special Purpose Vehicles in accordance with section 8 of The Companies Act, 2013 (Central Act 18 of 2013) in pursuant of the objectives of the University;

(xvi) to establish information centers, libraries, publishing entities, media establishments etc., for meeting the objectives of the University;

(xvii) to undertake necessary or expedient action to pursue and promote the objectives of the University; and

(xviii) to pursue any objectives as may be appropriate and approved by the Board of Governors for the enhancement of education and other related endeavours.

8. Powers of the University.- The University shall have the following powers,-

(i) to administer and manage the University and such academic entities for research, education, instruction and extension as are necessary for the furtherance of the objects of the University;

(ii) to provide for instruction in such branches of knowledge or learning as the University may think fit and to make provision for research and for the advancement and dissemination of such knowledge including through online education as per the rules applicable from time to time;

(iii) to plan and carry out courses of study for degrees, diplomas, certificates or for any other purpose;

(iv) to organize and undertake teaching, research and extension services;

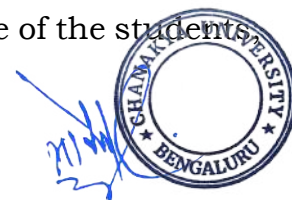
(v) to evaluate and assess the performance of the students of the University;

(vi) to grant diploma certificates, and to confer degrees and other academic distinctions on persons subject to such conditions as the University may determine;

(vii) to confer honorary degree or other distinctions in the manner laid down in the Statutes or the Regulations;

(viii) to determine, demand, collect and revise fees and other charges as may be defined by the Rules and the Regulations not prohibited by law in force;

(ix) to institute and maintain halls and hostels for the welfare of the students



(x) to establish and run the Constituent Colleges and oversee the imparting of education therein;

(xi) to establish and recognize such campuses, special centers, specialized study centers, research centers, specialized laboratories or other units for research and instruction as are, in the opinion of the University, necessary for the furtherance of its objects;

(xii) to supervise and regulate the discipline of the students of the University;

(xiii) to make arrangements for promoting the health and well-being of the students;

(xiv) to make such requisite arrangements in respect of the residence, discipline and teaching of women, other socio-economic backward classes and disabled students;

(xv) to institute, suspend or abolish professorship, associate professorship, assistant professorship, readerships, lectureships, and any other teaching, academic or research and non-teaching posts required by the University;

(xvi) to appoint or recognize persons as professors, associate professors, assistant professors, readers, lecturers or otherwise as teachers and researchers of the University;

(xvii) to create academic, technical, administrative, ministerial and other posts and to make appointments thereto as per Statutes;

(xviii) to make appointments of the faculty, officers and employees of the University or a Constituent College, Campuses, Regional Centers, Research Centers, Study Centers from India and abroad;

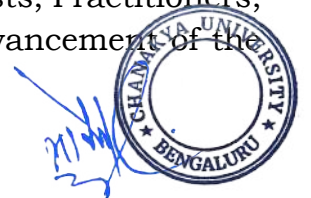
(xix) to lay down conditions of service of all categories of employees, including their code of conduct and enforce discipline among the employees of the University and to take such disciplinary measures as may be deemed necessary;

(xx) to institute and award fellowships, scholarships, studentships, assistantships, stipends, tuition waivers, medals and prizes;

(xxi) to provide for printing, reproduction and publication of research, journals and other works and to organize exhibitions for such purposes;

(xxii) to either partner or co-operate with any other organization, institution, national and international body, including public-private partnership, in the matter of education, training and research in subjects, the University may deem fit for such purposes as may be agreed upon on such terms and conditions as the University may, from time to time, determine;

(xxiii) to invite and/ or to appoint Visiting Professors, Emeritus Professors, Adjunct Professors and Faculty, Guest Faculty, Consultants, Artists, Practitioners, Scholars and such other persons who may contribute to the advancement of the objects of the University;



(xxiv) to establish and maintain within the University's premises or elsewhere, such class rooms and study halls as the University may consider necessary and adequately furnish the same and to establish and maintain such libraries and reading rooms as may appear convenient or necessary for the University;

(xxv) to regulate the expenditure and to manage the accounts of the University;

(xxvi) to receive grants, subventions, subscriptions, donations and gifts for the purposes of the University and consistent with the object for which the University is established;

(xxvii) to purchase, take on lease or accept as gifts or otherwise any land or building or works which may be necessary or convenient for the purpose of the University, on such terms and conditions as it may think fit and proper and to construct or alter and maintain any such building or works;

(xxviii) to acquire, sell, exchange, lease or otherwise dispose of any portion or whole of the immovable properties of the University, on such terms as it may think fit and proper without prejudice to the interest and activities of the University upon the prior approval of the Government;

(xxix) to draw and accept, to make and endorse, to discount and negotiate, Government of India and other promissory notes, bills of exchange, cheques or other negotiable instruments;

(xxx) to appoint in order to execute an instrument or transact any business of the University, any person as it may deem fit;

(xxxi) to give up and cease from carrying on any classes or schools or centers of the University if it so deems fit;

(xxxii) to enter into any agreement with the Central Government, State Governments, the University Grants Commission or other authorities for receiving grants;

(xxxiii) to invest the funds of the University or money entrusted to the University in or upon such securities and in such manner as it may deem fit and to transpose any investment as required from time to time;

(xxxiv) to make such statutes or regulations as may, from time to time, be considered necessary for regulating the affairs and the management of the University and to alter, modify and to rescind them;

(xxxv) to make provisions for extracurricular activities for students and employees;

(xxxvi) to organize and conduct refresher courses, orientation courses, workshops, seminars and other programmes for teachers, evaluators and other academic staff;



(xxxvii) to determine standards of admission to the University or a Constituent College, Regional Centers, Research Centers, Study Centers with the approval of Academic Council;

(xxxviii) to constitute for the benefit of the academic, technical, administrative and other staff, in such manner and subject to such conditions as may be specified by the regulations, schemes such as pension, insurance, provident fund and gratuity, as it may deem fit, and to make such grants as it may think fit for the benefit of any employees of the University, and to aid in establishment and support of the associations, institutions, fund, trusts and conveyance calculated to benefit the staff and the students of the University;

(xxxix) to enter into Memoranda of Understanding and partnerships with national and international universities, institutes and research bodies of repute, think-tanks; industry and professional bodies across different spheres of education and to institute programmes such as exchange of faculty, exchange of students, faculty development workshops, sharing of knowledge, resources and publications, etc;

(xl) to do all such other acts and things as the University may consider necessary, conducive, or incidental to the attainment or enlargement of the aforesaid objects or anyone of them.

(xli) to delegate if required all or any of its powers to the Vice Chancellor or the Pro-Vice-Chancellor(s) of the University or any committee or any sub-committee or to any one or more members or its body or its officers;

(xlii) to acquire and takeover and run the management of any other educational institutions with prior approval of Government;

(xliii) to raise, collect, subscribe and borrow money with the approval of the Board of Governors, for the purposes of the University; and

(xliv) to undertake any other activities connected with or incidental to above objectives of the University.

9. University open to all classes, castes, creed, gender or nation.-The University admissions shall be open to all persons irrespective of caste, class, creed, gender or nation. All admissions shall be made on the basis of merit in the qualifying examinations:

Provided that, forty percent of the admissions in all relevant courses of the university shall be reserved for the students of Karnataka State and admissions shall be made through a Common Entrance Examination conducted by the Central Government or State Government or its agency, as the case may be, and seats shall be allotted as per the merit and reservation policy of the State Government from time to time:

Provided further that, where there are less than ten seats in any course like Post Graduate, they shall be reserved by clubbing such courses together and where there are less than three seats in any course they shall be reserved by rotation.



10. National Accreditation.- The University shall seek accreditation from respective statutory national accreditation bodies soon after its establishment. Further all the courses run by this University shall be as per regulations of National Accreditation Bodies.

11. Powers of the Sponsoring Body.- The Sponsoring body shall have the following powers with reference to the University, each of which may be exercised by the Sponsoring Body at its discretion, namely:-

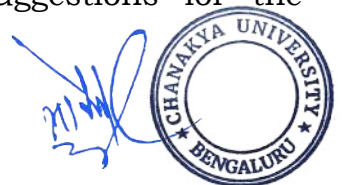
- (i) to appoint or re-appoint or terminate the appointment of the Chancellor;
- (ii) to nominate the Chairperson of the Court of the University;
- (iii) to constitute the first Court of the University;
- (iv) to constitute the first Board of Governors of the University;
- (v) to nominate persons as members of the Court, the Board of Governors, Board of Management, Academic Council, Finance Committee, Estates and Works Committee and such other bodies as specified by the provisions of this Act and Statutes made thereunder;
- (vi) to provide required funds to the University Endowment Fund; and
- (vii) to resolve any conflict at the meeting of the Board of Governors in the manner provided for in this Act.

CHAPTER – III OFFICERS OF THE UNIVERSITY

12. Officers of the University.- The following shall be the officers of the University, namely: -

- (i) The Visitor;
- (ii) The Pro-Visitor;
- (iii) The Chancellor;
- (iv) The Pro-Chancellor;
- (v) The Vice-Chancellor;
- (vi) The Pro Vice-Chancellor;
- (vii) Deans of Faculties/Schools;
- (viii) The Registrar;
- (ix) The Registrar (Evaluation);
- (x) The Finance Officer; and
- (xi) Such other officers as may be declared by the Statutes to be the officers of the University.

13. The Visitor.- (1) The Honorable Governor of Karnataka shall be the Visitor of the University and the visitor may offer suggestions for the improvement of the functioning of the University;



(2) The Visitor shall preside over the convocation of the University for conferring degrees and diplomas; and

(3) The Visitor shall have the following powers:

- (i) to call for any paper or information relating to the affairs of the University ; and
- (ii) on the basis of the information received by the Visitor, if he is satisfied that any order, proceedings, or decision taken by any authority of the University is not in conformity with the Act, Regulations, or Rules, he may issue such directions as he may deem fit in the interest of the University and the directions so issued shall be complied with by all the concerned.

14. The Pro-Visitor.- (1) The Honourable Minister for Higher Education, Government of Karnataka shall be the pro-visitor of the University.

(2) The Pro-visitor shall, when the Visitor is absent, preside at the Convocation of the University for Conferring Degree and diplomas.

15. The Chancellor.- (1) The Chancellor shall be appointed by the Sponsoring Body;

(2) The Chancellor must be an eminent personality who has made significant contribution to the society;

(3) The term of the office of Chancellor shall be for a period of five years and can be renewed for a maximum of one more term;

(4) The Chancellor shall have such powers as may be conferred on him by this Act or the Statutes made there under, which shall include the following powers, namely:-

- (i) to function as the head of the University;
- (ii) to preside at all convocations of the University in absence of the Visitor or pro-visitor;
- (iii) to function as a Chairperson of the Board of Governors of the University;
- (iv) to appoint or re-appoint or terminate the appointment of the Vice-Chancellor, in accordance with the provisions of this Act and the Statutes;
- (v) to pre-approve the appointment of the Pro Vice-Chancellor(s), the Dean(s), the Registrar, the Registrar (Evaluation) and the Finance Officer;
- (vi) to constitute the first Board of Management, the Academic Council, the Research and Innovation Council, the Finance Committee, and the Estate and Works Committee;



- (vii) to nominate such members to such bodies of the University as specified in this Act or the Statutes made thereunder; and
- (viii) to resolve a conflict (excluding conflicts at a meeting of the Board of Governors) in the manner provided in this Act.
- (ix) to pre approve the Agenda matters in the manner provided for in the Act;

(5) In the event of there being a conflict amongst the officers or body and any other officers or body of the University, then the issue shall be referred to the Chancellor and the decision of the Chancellor in respect of such issue shall be final and binding on the University.

16. The Pro Chancellor.- (1) The Pro-Chancellor may be appointed by the Sponsoring Body for a term specified by the Sponsoring Body subject to other terms and conditions as may be laid down in the statutes.

(2) The Pro-Chancellor shall exercise all powers of the Chancellor in his absence and shall be assigned any additional duties with prior written approval of the Chancellor.

(3) The Pro-Chancellor shall chair all the Committees, meetings and convocations in the absence of the Chancellor.

17. The Vice-Chancellor.- (1) The Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed by the Chancellor for a term of five years subject to other terms and conditions as may be laid down by the Statutes;

(2) The Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed from among three persons recommended by the Search cum Selection Committee constituted in accordance with the provisions of sec 49;

(3) The term of the Vice-Chancellor shall be for five years, which is renewable for a maximum of another term;

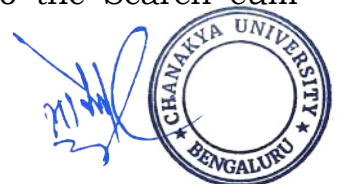
Provided that the Vice-chancellor shall continue to hold the office even after expiry of his term till new Vice-chancellor joins. However, in any case this period shall not exceed one year.

(4) The Search cum Selection Committee referred to in sub-section (2) shall consist of the following persons, namely:-

- (i) One eminent person nominated by the Sponsoring Body; and
- (ii) Two persons of repute as nominees of the Board of Governors, one of whom shall be nominated as the Convener of the Committee.

(5) The Search cum Selection Committee shall, on the basis of merit, recommend three persons suitable to hold the office of the Vice-Chancellor and forward the same to the Chancellor. The Chancellor shall choose one among the three and appoint that person as the Vice-Chancellor.

(6) The Chancellor shall send back the above list to the Search cum Selection Committee for reconsideration.



(7) The Vice-Chancellor shall be the Principal Executive and Academic Officer of the University and shall exercise general supervision and control over the affairs of the University and give effect to the decisions of the authorities of the University:

Provided that, where any matter, other than the appointment of a Teacher is of urgent nature requiring immediate action and the same could not be immediately dealt with by any officer or the authority or other body of the University empowered by or under this Act to deal with it, the Vice-Chancellor may take such action as he may deems fit with the prior written approval of the Chancellor:

Provided further that, the Vice Chancellor may appoint a teacher or any other officer of the University for a maximum period of one year and forward for ratification by the concerned authority as per the procedures laid down in the Statutes.

(8) The Vice-Chancellor shall exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as may be laid down by the Statutes or the Rules:

Provided that, where in the opinion of the Vice-chancellor, any decision of any authority of the university is outside the powers conferred by this Act or Statutes, Regulations or Rules made there under or is likely to be prejudicial to the interests of the university, he shall request the concerned authority to revise its decision within fifteen days from the date of its decision and in case the authority refuses to revise such decision wholly or partly or fails to take any decision within fifteen days, then such matter shall be referred to the Chancellor and his decision thereon shall be final.

(9) The services of the Vice- Chancellor can be terminated by the Chancellor on the recommendation of the Board of Governors after following the principles of natural justice and after providing an opportunity to present his case including, for termination on, disciplinary grounds.

(10) The Vice-Chancellor shall preside at the Convocation of the University in the absence of the Visitor, Pro-Visitor the Chancellor and the Pro-Chancellor.

18. The Pro Vice-Chancellor.- The Vice-Chancellor shall appoint, not exceeding three pro-vice Chancellors, with the written approval of the Chancellor in such manner and they shall exercise such powers and perform such duties as may be laid down by the Statutes and as directed by the Vice Chancellor from time to time.

19. Deans of Faculties or Schools.- Deans of Faculties or Schools shall be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor with the written approval of the Chancellor in such manner and they shall exercise such powers and perform such duties as may be laid down by the Statutes and as directed by the Vice Chancellor from time to time.

20. The Registrar.- (1) The Registrar shall be appointed by the Vice-Chancellor with the written approval of the Chancellor in such manner and on such terms and conditions as may be laid down by the Statutes and as directed by the Vice Chancellor from time to time;



(2) All contracts as defined in Statutes shall be entered into and signed by the Registrar on behalf of the University;

(3) The Registrar shall have the power to authenticate records on behalf of the University and shall exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as may be laid down by the statutes or may be required from time to time, by the Chancellor or the Vice-Chancellor;

(4) The Registrar shall be responsible for the due custody of all therecords and the common seal of the University and shall place before the Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor or any other authority all such information and documents as requested;

(5) The Registrar is authorized to sue or to be sued on behalf of the University;

21. The Registrar (Evaluation).- (1) The Registrar (Evaluation) shall be responsible for conducting all assessments, evaluation of the students of the University required towards the attainment of degree or diploma or certificate and other related activities in accordance with the Statutes of the University;

(2) The Registrar (Evaluation) shall be custodian of the records, documents etc pertaining to the evaluation or assessments and examination;

22. The Finance Officer.- (1) The Chancellor shall appoint the Finance Officer of the University on the recommendation of the Vice Chancellor on such conditions and terms provided in the statutes. The Finance Officer shall exercise all such powers and perform such duties as may be conferred by the Statutes and/ or as directed by the Vice-Chancellor from time to time.

(2) The Financial Officer shall be responsible for carrying out all the activities related to the financial and its regulatory activities of the University.

23. Other Officers.- The manner of appointment, terms and conditions of service and powers and duties of the other officers of the University shall be such as specified by Statutes.

CHAPTER – IV

AUTHORITIES OF THE UNIVERSITY

24. Authorities of the University.- The following, shall be the authorities of the University, namely:-

- (i) The Court;
- (ii) The Board of Governors;
- (iii) The Board of Management;
- (iv) The Academic Council;
- (v) The Research and Innovation Council;
- (vi) The Finance Committee;
- (vii) Estates and Works Committee; and
- (viii) Such other authorities as may be declared by the Statutes to be the authorities of the University



25. The Court.- (1) The Chairman of the Court shall be nominated or invited by the Sponsoring Body who shall be a person of eminence.

(2) The membership of Court, their tenure and such other conditions shall be as specified in the Statutes of the University.

(3) Subject to the provisions of this Act, the Court shall have the following powers and functions, namely:-

(a) to consider and give suggestions to Board of Governors on the Institution Development Plan (IDP) and the Annual Report of the University; and

(b) to perform such other functions as may be provided for by the Statutes.

26. The Board of Governors.- (1) The Board of Governors shall consist of the following, namely:-

(i) The Chancellor - Chairperson;

(ii) The Pro-Chancellor - Member;

(iii) The Vice-Chancellor - Member;

(iv) The Principal Secretary or Secretary to the State Government in the Higher Education, Medical Education or his nominee not below the rank of Deputy Secretary - Ex-officio Member;

(v) One expert from industry or from the field of management, finance or any other specialized field, including administration to be nominated by the Sponsoring body - Member;

(vi) Five eminent persons, nominated by the Sponsoring body – Members

(vii) The Pro Vice-Chancellor (s) who shall be non-voting member; and

(viii) One eminent educationist nominated by University Grants Commission – Member.

(2) The Registrar shall be a non-voting Secretary of the Board of Governors;

(3) The tenure of office of the members of the Board of Governors, appointment of members, other than two Government nominees, renewal and removal, etc., shall be such as may be laid down by the Statutes;

(4) All meetings of the Board of Governors shall always be chaired by the Chancellor and in his absence by any one of the nominees of the Chancellor. If Chancellor has not nominated any person to preside any meeting, members present in the meeting shall elect the person who shall preside that meeting only from among themselves by a simple majority;

(5) Quorum for all meetings of the Board of Governors shall be Five members attending and voting at such meeting:



Provided that, the presence of either the Chancellor or one nominee of the Sponsoring Body and in the absence of the Chancellor or one nominee of Sponsoring Body, the Vice Chancellor, shall always be necessary to form the quorum for any meeting of the Board of Governors;

(6) The Board of Governors shall be the Principal Governing Body of the University and shall have the following powers, namely:-

- (i) to lay down policies to be pursued by the University;
- (ii) to review decisions of the other authorities of the University if they are not in conformity with the provisions of this Act, or the Statutes or the Rules; or the Ordinances;
- (iii) to approve the Budget and Annual Report of the University;
- (iv) to make new or additional Statutes or amend or repeal the earlier Statutes, Rules and Ordinances;
- (v) to recommend voluntary winding up of the University to the Sponsoring body;
- (vi) to approve proposals for submission to the Government;
- (vii) to nominate members to the Authorities and Committees as provided for in the Act and Statutes;
- (viii) to appoint the Statutory Auditors of the University; and
- (ix) to take such decisions and steps as are found desirable for effectively carrying out the objects of the University.

(7) The Board of Governors shall meet at least four times a year or as many times as may be required.

(8) The Board of Governors shall meet at such time and place as may be specified by the Statutes.

27. The Board of Management.- (1) The Board of Management shall consist of the following, namely:-

- (i) The Vice Chancellor
- (ii) The Pro-Vice Chancellor (s);
- (iii) The Registrar;
- (iv) Two nominees of the Sponsoring Body; and
- (v) Two Deans of the faculties or Schools as nominated by the Vice-Chancellor.

(2) The Vice Chancellor shall be the Chairperson of the Board of Management and the Registrar shall be the Secretary of the Board of Management.

(3) The powers and functions of the Board of Management shall be such as may be specified by the Board of Governors;



(4) The minutes of the meetings of Board of Management shall be presented to the Board of Governors for ratification;

(5) All meetings of the Boards of Management shall always be chaired by the Vice Chancellor and in the absence of the Vice Chancellor, by the nominee of the Sponsoring Body and where the Sponsoring Body has not nominated any nominees, then by any other member as elected by the members present;

(6) In the event of a conflict of opinion at a meeting of the Board of Management, the issue shall be referred to the Chancellor and the decision of the Chancellor in respect of such issue shall be final and binding on the University.

28. The Academic Council.- (1) The Academic Council shall consist of the following, namely: -

- (i) The Vice-Chancellor – Chairperson;
- (ii) The Pro Vice Chancellor(s) – Member;
- (iii) The Registrar – Secretary.
- (iv) Such other members as may be specified by the Statutes from time to time.

(2) The Academic Council shall be the principal academic body of the University and shall, subject to the provisions of this Act, the Statutes, Regulations and the Rules, coordinate and exercise general supervision over the academic policies of the University.

29. The Research and Innovation Council.- (1) The Research and Innovation Council shall consist of the following, namely:-

- (i) The Vice- Chancellor – Chairperson;
- (ii) The Pro Vice-Chancellor (s) – Member (s);
- (iii) The Dean of Research – Secretary;
- (iv) Deans of all Faculties/Schools – Members; and
- (v) Such other members as may be specified in the Statutes from time to time.

(2) Research and Innovation Council shall be the Principal Research and Innovation Committee of the University and shall provide the larger holistic vision of the kind of research to be undertaken by the University, including prioritization of the research areas. Research and Innovation Council shall, subject to the provisions of this Act, the Statutes, Regulations and the Rules, facilitate, co-ordinate and exercise general supervision over the Innovation and Research policies of the University.

(3) The Research and Innovation Council shall also coordinate, promote and supervise activities of the University related to incubation and entrepreneurship.



30. The Finance Committee.- (1) The Finance Committee shall consist of the following, namely:-

- (i) The Vice-chancellor – Chairperson;
- (ii) One nominee of the Chancellor from among the members of the Board of Governors;
- (iii) The Registrar – Member;
- (iv) One nominee of the Sponsoring Body – Member;
- (v) The Finance Officer - Secretary; and
- (vi) Such other members as may be specified in the Statutes from time to time

(2) The Finance Committee shall be the principal financial body of the University to take care of all financial matters and shall, subject to the provisions of this Act, Rules and Statutes co-ordinate and exercise general supervision and control over the financial operations of the University.

31. Estates and Works Committee.- (1) The Estate and Works Committee shall consist of the following, namely:

- (i) The Vice Chancellor – Chairperson;
- (ii) Two members nominated by the Sponsoring Body;
- (iii) One expert nominated by the Board of Governors;
- (iv) The Registrar – Member;
- (v) The Finance Officer – Member;
- (vi) The Estate Officer – Secretary; and
- (vii) Such other members as may be specified in the Statutes from time to time.

(2) The Estate and Works Committee shall be the body responsible for all the major and minor constructions and maintenance of the buildings and the infrastructure facilities of the University, subject to the provisions of this Act, Rules and Statutes co-ordinate and exercise general supervision and control over such activities of the University.

32. Other Authorities.- The constitution, powers and functions of the other authorities of the University shall be such as may be specified by the Statutes.

33. Disqualification of membership of an Authority or Body.- A person shall be disqualified for being a member of any of the authorities or bodies of the University, if he,-

- (a) is of unsound mind and stands so declared by a competent court;
- (b) is an undischarged insolvent
- (c) has been convicted of any offence involving moral turpitude;



- (d) conducting or engaging himself in private coaching classes;
- (e) has been punished for indulging in or promoting unfair practice in the conduct of any examination, in any form, anywhere; and
- (f) as and when the Board of Governors takes a decision in writing for the reasons to be recorded that a Member of any of the authorities or bodies is unfit to hold the post.

34. Proceedings not invalidated on account of vacancy.- No act or proceedings of any authority of the University shall be invalid merely by reason of the existence of any vacancy or defect in the constitution of the authority.

35. Provisions pertaining to Agenda Matters.- (1) No Agenda Matter shall be either included in the Agenda for or taken up for discussion and decided in the meeting of the Board of Governors or the Board of Management or any Committees without obtaining the prior written approval of the Chancellor.

(2) In the event of breach, the Chancellor shall be entitled at all time to immediately take remedial action by reversing all decisions taken by any functionary or functionaries or body or bodies of the University in breach of the provisions of the Act and consequent upon the pursuit of such a remedial action all such actions taken by the functionary or functionaries or body or bodies of the University in breach of the provisions of the Act shall be deemed to be null and void, ab initio and consequently the status quo ante shall prevail in respect of the matter or decision in breach.

36. The Ombudsman.- (1) The Sponsoring Body shall nominate an outstanding person as an Ombudsman for the University to overview the operations of the University through a suitable feedback mechanism. The Ombudsman shall ensure the efforts of the University towards the key values of integrity, impartiality, transparency, equity and justice.

(2) The functions and the term of office of the Ombudsman shall be such as specified in the statutes.

Chapter -V

STATUTES, REGULATIONS AND ORDINANCES

37. Statutes.- Subject to the provisions of this Act, the Statutes may provide for any matter relating to the University and staff, as given below, namely:-

- (i) the procedure for transaction of business of the Authorities of the University and the composition of bodies not specified in this Act;
- (ii) the operation of the Permanent Statutory Endowment fund, University Endowment fund, the General fund and the Development fund under section 53;
- (iii) the terms and conditions of appointment of the Vice-Chancellor, Pro Vice Chancellor (s), the Registrar, the Registrar (Evaluation), the Finance Officer and the Estate Officer and their powers and functions;



- (iv) the mode of recruitment and the terms and conditions of service of the other officers, Teachers and employees of the University;
- (v) the procedure for resolving disputes between the University and its officers, Faculty members, employees and students;
- (vi) creation, abolition or restructuring of departments and faculties or Schools;
- (vii) the manner of co-operation with other Universities or institutions of higher learning;
- (viii) the procedure for conferment of honorary degrees;
- (ix) provisions regarding grant of freeships and scholarships;
- (x) policy relating to the fee chargeable from students for various courses of studies;
- (xi) institution of fellowships, scholarships, studentships, freeships, medals and prizes;
- (xii) procedure for creation and abolition of posts;
- (xiii) other matters which may be specified.

38. Statutes how made.- (1) The first statutes framed by the Board of Management shall be submitted to the Board of Governors for its approval.

(2) The Board of Governors shall consider the First Statutes, submitted by the Board of Management and shall give its approval thereon with such modifications, if any, as it may deem necessary.

(3) The University shall publish the First Statutes, as approved by the Board of Governors in the University Notification, and thereafter, the First Statutes shall come into force from the date of its publication.

39. Power to amend Statutes.- The Board of Governors may, make new or additional Statutes or amend or repeal the Statutes which are not repugnant to the provisions of this Act.

40. Regulations.- Subject to the provisions of this Act and the Statutes, the Regulations may provide for any matter relating to the University, and staff, etc., such as,-

- (i) admission of students to the University and their enrolment and continuance as such;
- (ii) the courses of study to be laid down for all degrees and other academic distinctions of the University;
- (iii) policies in respect of seats in different courses of studies and the procedure of admission of students to such courses;
- (iv) the award of degrees and other academic distinctions;



- (v) the conditions of the award of fellowships, scholarships, studentships, medals and prizes;
- (vi) the conduct of examinations and the conditions and mode of appointment and duties of examining bodies, examiners invigilators, tabulators and moderators;
- (vii) the fee to be charged for admission to the examinations, degrees and other academic distinctions of the University;
- (viii) the conditions of residence of the students at the University or a Constituent College;
- (ix) maintenance of discipline among the students of the University or a Constituent College;

41. Regulations how made.- The Regulations shall be made by the Academic Council and approved by Board of Management.

42. Power to amend regulations.- The Academic Council may, with the approval of the Board of Management, make new or additional regulations or amend or repeal the regulations.

43. Ordinances.- The Ordinances can be made, amended, repealed by the Board of Management of the University to be subsequently ratified by the Board of Governors.

44. Fixation of fee.- (1) The fee in respect of forty percent of the admissions in all courses of the university for which admissions are made through a Common Entrance Examination conducted by the State Government or its agency under the proviso to section 9 shall be the fees, as fixed by the State Government, for Government seats from time to time, in accordance with the consensual agreement entered into by the Government and the University in accordance with the Karnataka Professional Educational Institutions (Regulation of Admission and Determination of Fee) Act, 2006 (Karnataka Act 8 of 2006).

(2) In respect of other seats of the University, the fee shall be determined by the Fee Regulatory Committee constituted by the Board of Governors which shall consist of the Principal Secretary/ Secretary to Government incharge of Higher Education or his nominee as a member and a retired High Court Judge, as Chairman of the committee, and three other members nominated by the Board of Governors.

45. Conditions of service of employees.- (1) Every employee shall be appointed under a written contract subject to such terms and conditions as may be specified by statutes and regulations or specified if any by rules which shall be kept in the University and a copy of which shall be furnished to the employee concerned.

(2) Disciplinary action against the employees shall be governed by the procedure specified in the Statutes.



(3) Any dispute arising out of the contract between the University and an employee shall, be resolved in the manner provided for in the written contract and in accordance with the Statues.

46. Right to appeal.- In case of disciplinary actions by the University against its employee or student, the aggrieved employee or student shall have a right to appeal to such authority as specified by the Statutes.

47. Provident or Pension fund.- The University shall constitute for the benefit of its employees such provident or pension fund and provide such insurance scheme as it may deem fit in such manner and subject to such conditions as may be specified by the statutes and the laws in force.

48. Disputes as to constitution of University authorities and bodies.- If any question arises as to whether any person has been duly elected or appointed as, or is entitled to be a member of any authority or other body of the University, the matter shall be referred to the Chancellor whose decision thereon shall be final.

49. Constitution of Committees.- Any authority of the University mentioned in section 24, shall be empowered to constitute a committee of such authority, consisting of such members of such authority and having such powers as the authority may deem fit.

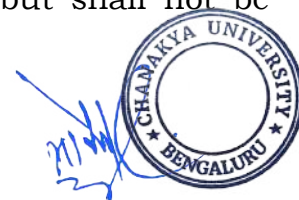
50. Filling of casual vacancies.- Any casual vacancy among the members, other than ex-officio members of any Authority or body of the University shall be filled in the same manner in which the member whose vacancy is to be filled up, was chosen, and the person filling the vacancy shall be a member of such authority or body for the residual term for which the person in whose place he would have been a member.

51. Protection of action taken in good faith.- No suit or other legal proceedings shall lie against any officer or other employee of the University for anything, which is done in good faith or intended to be done in pursuance of the provisions of this Act, the Statues or the Rules.

52. Transitional Provisions.- Notwithstanding anything contained in any other provisions of this Act and the Statues,-

- (i) the first Vice-Chancellor and Pro-Vice-Chancellor(s), if any shall be appointed by the Chancellor;
- (ii) the first Registrar, the first Registrar (Evaluation) and the first Finance Officer shall be appointed by the Chancellor; and
- (iii) the first Board of Management, the first Academic Council, the first Innovation and Research Council, the first Finance Committee and the first Estate and Works Committee shall be constituted by the Chancellor.

53. Permanent and Statutory Endowment Fund.- (1) The University shall establish a Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund of at least rupees twenty-five crores, out of which at least fifteen crores shall be in cash and remaining in the form of Bank Guarantee, which may be increased suo moto but shall not be decreased:



Provided that, in case of a University outside Bengaluru or Bengaluru rural District, at least ten crores must be in form of cash and the remaining five crores shall be in form of Bank Guarantee.

(2) The University shall have power to invest the permanent Statutory Endowment Fund in such manner as may be prescribed.

(3) The University may transfer any amount from the General Fund or the Development Fund to the permanent Statutory Endowment Fund. Excepting in the event of dissolution of the University, in no other circumstances can any monies' be transferred from permanent Statutory Endowment Fund for other purposes.

(4) Seventy five percent of the incomes received from permanent Statutory Endowment Fund shall be used for the purpose of development or general work of the University. The remaining twenty five percent shall be reinvested in the permanent Statutory Endowment Fund.

54. University Endowment Fund.- (1) The University shall establish an Endowment Fund having such funds as may be determined by the sponsoring Body which can include donations and other funds received from time to time.

(2) The University shall have the power to invest the University Endowment Fund in a manner as may be specified by the Statutes.

(3) The University Endowment Fund is a self-imposed fund that the University desires to maintain voluntarily and invest it responsibly to protect itself from financial challenges that may arise on account of parsing social objectives and/or unforeseen circumstances.

(4) The University may transfer any amount from the General Fund or the development fund to the University Endowment Fund. Except in the event of dissolution of the University, in no other circumstances can any monies be transferred from the University Endowment Fund for other purposes.

(5) Eighty percent of the incomes received from the University Endowment Fund shall be used for the purposes of development or general work of the University. The remaining twenty percent shall be reinvested into the University Endowment Fund.

55. General Fund.- (1) The University shall establish a General Fund to which the following amount shall be credited, namely:-

- (i) all fees which may be charged by the University;
- (ii) all sums received from any other source not prohibited by any law for the time being in force;
- (iii) all contributions made to the University; and
- (iv) all contributions or donations made in this behalf by any other person or body which are not prohibited by any law for the time being in force.

(2) The funds credited to the General Fund shall be applied to meet all the recurring expenditure of the University.



56. Development Fund.- (1) The University shall establish a Development Fund to which the following funds shall be credited, namely:-

- (i) development fees which may be charged from students;
- (ii) all sums received from any other source for the purposes of the development of the University;
- (iii) all contributions made by the University;
- (iv) all contributions or donations made in this behalf by any other person or body; which are not prohibited by any law for the time being in force; and
- (v) all incomes received from the Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund.

(2) The funds credited to the Development Fund from time to time shall be utilized for the development of the University.

57. Any other fund.- The University may establish any other fund as determined by the Board of Governors and approved functionalities and operations of these funds by the Board of Governors.

58. Maintenance of funds.- The funds established under sections 53, 54, 55, 56 and 57 shall be subject to general supervision and control of the Board of Governors, be regulated and maintained in such manner as provided in the statutes.

59. Annual Report.- (1) The Annual Report of the University shall be prepared under the direction of the Board of Management and shall be submitted to the Court for its suggestions.

(2) The Board of Governors shall consider the annual report along with the suggestions of the Court in its meeting and approve the same with or without modification; and

(3) A copy of the annual report duly approved by the Board of Governors shall be sent to the Visitor and the State Government before 31st December following close of the financial year in March of each year.

60. Account and Audit.- (1) The annual accounts and balance sheet of the University shall be prepared under the direction of the Board of Management and all funds accruing to or received by the University from all sources and all amount disbursed or paid shall be entered in the account maintained by the University.

(2) The annual accounts of the University shall be audited by an Auditor, who is a member of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India, every year.

(3) A copy of the annual accounts and the balance sheet together with the audit report shall be submitted to the Board of Governors before 30th November following close of the financial year on 31st March of each year.

(4) The annual accounts, the balance sheet and the audit report shall be considered by the Board of Governors at its meeting and the Board of Governors shall forward the same to the visitor and the Government along with its observation thereon on or before 31st December of each year.



(5) In the event of any material alteration in the Report of the Auditors, the Chancellor may issue directions to the University, to rectify the alterations and such directions shall be binding on the University.

61. Mode of proof of University record.- A copy of any receipt, application, email communication, notice, order, proceeding or resolution of any authority or committee of the University or other documents in possession of the University or any entry in any register duly maintained by the University, if certified by the Registrar, shall be received as prima facie evidence of such receipt, application, notice, order, proceeding, resolution or document or the existence of entry in the register and shall be admitted as evidence of the matters and transaction therein recorded where the original thereof would, if produced, have been admissible in evidence.

62. Power of State Government to issue direction.- The state Government may give such directions to the University as in its opinion are necessary or expedient for carrying out the purpose of this Act or to give effect to any of the provisions contained therein or of any rules or orders made there under and the Board of Governors or the Board of Management, as the case may be, of the University shall comply with every such direction.

63. Penalties.- (1) Whoever contravenes the provisions of this Act or the rules made thereunder or any examinations matters or in matters relating to award of degree or in giving marks cards shall on conviction be punishable with fine of not less than rupees fifty thousand which may extend to ten lakhs rupees or with an imprisonment for a term of not less than six months which may extend to two years or with both;

Provided that, where the University is also involved in committing the offence the permission letter granted under this Act to commence the University shall be withdrawn.

(2) A penalty under this section may be imposed without prejudice to the penalty specified in any other Act.

64. Power to enter and inspect.- Any officer not below the rank of Group 'A' officer authorised by the State Government in this behalf, shall, subject to such conditions as may be specified therein under the Karnataka Educational Institutions (Prohibition of Capitation Fee) Act, 1984 (Karnataka Act 37 of 1984) shall be deemed to the Officer authorised to exercise the same power and discharge the same functions as provided under section 9 of the Act for the purpose of this Act.

65. Power to give direction for dissolution of the University.- (1) If the University proposes dissolution in accordance with the law governing its constitution or incorporation, it shall give at least six months prior notice in writing to the Government.

(2) The Karnataka State the Higher Education Council shall conduct periodical Inspection of University regarding,-

- (i) standard of Instructions for grant of degree;
- (ii) quality of Education;
- (iii) avoidance of commercialization of Higher Education; and



- (iv) contravention of the provisions of the Act, if any; - and send report to the Government.

(3) On identification of mismanagement, maladministration and indiscipline, the Government can issue directions to the management of the University to set right the administration. If the direction is not followed within such time as may be prescribed, the right to take decision on for winding up of the University or any course thereof shall vest with the Government.

(4) The manner of winding up of the University or any course thereof shall be such as may be prescribed by the Government in this behalf:

Provided that no such action shall be initiated without affording a reasonable opportunity to show cause to the University.

(5) On receipt of the notice referred to in sub-section (1) the Government shall, in consultation with the relevant Regulatory Authority make such arrangements for administration of the University from the proposed date of dissolution of the University or winding up of the course and until the last batch of students in regular courses of studies of the University complete their courses of studies in such manner as may be specified in the Act.

66. Expenditure of the University during dissolution.- (1) The expenditure of administration of the University during taking over period of its management under sub-section (5) of section 65 shall be met out of the Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund, the General Fund or the Development Fund in such manner as may be specified in the Act.

(2) If the fund referred to in sections 53, 54, 55, 56 and 57 are not sufficient to meet the expenditure of the University during the taking over period of its management, such expenditure may be met by disposing of the properties or asset of the University, by the Government.

(3) Where the dissolution of the University is due to mismanagement or maladministration, the Government is at liberty to identify the persons responsible for such mismanagement or maladministration and to impose penalty as it deems fit.

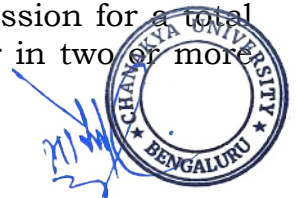
67. Removal of difficulties.- (1) If any difficulty arises in giving effect to the provisions of this Act, the State Government may, by a notification or by order, make such provisions, which are not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, as appear to it to be necessary or expedient, for removing the difficulty:

Provided that, no notification or order under this section shall be made after the expiry of a period of five years from the date of commencement of this Act.

(2) Every Order made under sub- section (1), shall as soon as may be after it is made, be laid before the State Legislature.

68. Power to make rules by the State Government.- (1) The State Government may make rules by notification, to carry out the purposes of this Act.

(2) Every rule made under this Act shall be laid as soon, as may be after it is made before each House of the State Legislature while it is in session for a total period of thirty days, which may be comprised in one session or in two or more



successive sessions, and if, before the expiry of the session immediately following the session or the successive sessions aforesaid, both Houses agree in making any modification in the rule or both Houses agree that the rule should not be made, the rule shall thereafter have effect only in such modified form or be of no effect, as the case may be, so however, that any such modification or annulment shall be without prejudice to the validity of anything previously done under that rule.

Whereas, Centre for Educational and Social Studies, Bangalore, has submitted the proposal to Government requesting to grant Private University status to be named as **THE CHANAKYA UNIVERSITY**.

Whereas, the Government has referred the same to the Karnataka State Higher Education Council to inspect the Institution about its infrastructure etc., and submit its report to Government.

Whereas, the Karnataka State Higher Education Council has submitted its report. Based on the report of the Committee, Government has prepared draft **THE CHANAKYA UNIVERSITY** Bill and placed it before the Karnataka Legislature for its approval. After obtaining the approval of the Legislature and assent of Hon'ble Governor of Karnataka, **THE CHANAKYA UNIVERSITY ACT, 2021** was published in the Official Gazette dated: 11.10.2021 and it was given effect from 5th March 2022 as published in the Official Gazette.

Whereas, as per Section 3 of **THE CHANAKYA UNIVERSITY ACT, 2021** Centre for Educational and Social Studies, Bangalore, has submitted the proposal to Government for establishment of the **THE CHANAKYA UNIVERSITY**. Accordingly, Government of Karnataka has constituted a Committee vide its order No. ED/308/URC/2021, dated: 14-01-2022 to inspect the physical infrastructure available with Centre for Educational and Social Studies, Bangalore, and to submit its report in terms of Section 3(3) of the said Act.

Whereas, the Committee constituted for the purpose, visited the main campus at Polanahalli and Haraluru Village, Devanahalli Taluk, Bengaluru Rural District and temporary campus at Brigade Orchards, in Rayasandra Village, kasaba Hobli, Devanahalli taluk of **CHANAKYA UNIVERSITY** on 5th February 2022 and after due inspection submitted its report to Government on the issues as contained in Clauses (i) to (xiii) of Section 3(3) the **THE CHANAKYA UNIVERSITY ACT, 2021**.

Whereas, the Centre for Educational and Social Studies, Bangalore, has created Statutory Fund of Rs.25.00 crores as stipulated under Section 4 read with proviso to Section 53 of the **THE CHANAKYA UNIVERSITY ACT, 2021**.

Now, therefore, after considering all the facts, Government of Karnataka has accorded approval with the following terms and conditions to the Centre for Educational and Social Studies, Bangalore, in accordance with Section 4(2) of



THE CHANAKYA UNIVERSITY ACT, 2021 to establish and commence a Private University in the name and style of THE CHANAKYA UNIVERSITY Polanahalli and Haraluru Village, Devanahalli Taluk, Bengaluru Rural District.

1. Centre for Educational and Social Studies, Bangalore, shall have the right to establish the University of Unitary Nature subject to and in accordance with the provisions of this Act.
2. Since the University is being located at Polanahalli and Haraluru Village, Devanahalli Taluk, Bengaluru Rural District. The University shall establish a permanent Statutory Endowment Fund of Rs.25.00 Crores, out of which Rs.15.00 Crores shall be deposited in cash which shall be operated by the University with the joint signature of the Additional Chief Secretary/Principal Secretary to Government and remaining amount of Rs.10.00 Crores shall be in the form of Bank Guarantee.
3. The nature and functions of the University shall be strictly as per the provisions of THE CHANAKYA UNIVERSITY ACT, 2021. It shall also comply the rules that will be made under the Act in due course. The University shall also comply all the prevailing relevant laws, which concern the governance of the University in any aspect.
4. Agenda matters shall be dealt as per section 2(b) of the Act.
5. "Statutes" and "Regulations" of the University under the Act shall be made within a period of 3 months from the date of this Notification.
6. The University is permitted to start the following courses in the campus, only after ensuring that necessary faculty is recruited and requisite infrastructure such as lab etc. is provided as per UGC/AICTE Guidelines:-

7. As per section 4(3) & 6 of the Act, the University is not allowed to affiliate any existing colleges / institutions of its own management till completion of five years and those colleges shall continue to be affiliated to the existing respective regular Universities. The constituent colleges, additional campuses, Regional Centres or Study Centres can only be established after five years from the date of commencement of the University with the prior permission of the state Government and shall be as per the norms of UGC and other National Accreditation bodies.
8. As per section 4(7) of the Act the property of the University shall be used for the purpose and objects of the University only.
9. The Trust shall possess land to an extent at least 25 acres.
10. The University shall always strive to achieve Global Standards and shall promote research and all progressive academic activities vigorously as per Section 7 of the Act.
11. The fees and other charges that may be collected by the University shall be as per the Statutes and rules as per section 8(viii). Further provisions of section 44 of the Act regarding the Fee Regulation Committee shall be complied with.
12. The reservations in admissions shall be as per section 9 of the Act.
13. National Accreditations shall be sought from respective statutory bodies as per section 10 of the Act.
14. The directions of the Visitor to the University i.e. the H.E the Governor of Karnataka shall be complied by the University as and when they are issued.
15. All the statutory bodies and statutory functions are to be complied by the University well in time as per Act.
16. The periodical statutory reports shall be submitted to Government as per provisions of the Act.
17. The University shall prepare annual accounts as per section 60 of the Act and also the audit of the University shall be taken up as per sub section 2 of 60 of the Act.
18. The University shall place the annual accounts and audit reports before the Board of Governors before 30th November every year.
19. The Board of Governors shall send the annual accounts alongwith the annual reports and audit reports before 31st December every year to the Government.
20. The CHANAKYA University is permitted to commence its operation from the temporary campus at Brigade Orchards, in Rayasandra Village, kasaba Hobli, Devanahalli taluk, Bengaluru Rural District subject to condition that the University



should be shifted to the main campus at Polanahalli and Haraluru Village, Devanahalli Taluk, Bengaluru Rural District as prescribed in the CHANAKYA University Act, 2021, at the latest by 2023.

The Assessment Manual:

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Introduction:

Preamble:

Assessment is the most important determinant of **Learning accomplishment** and is a measure of learning outcome in terms of the stated attributes reflected in the acquisition of Knowledge, Skills, Values, and attitude for Professional Excellence. Derived from the ancient wisdom of our educational heritage and designed according to the philosophy of the **Outcome Based Education**, the University, shall adopt a Faculty-Driven, Student-Centric, Course-Relevant, Outcome-Oriented and Vision-Embedded assessment system, which shall be a **Continuous, Comprehensive and Contextual mapping of Competence** for a guided learning progression and Career planning.

In its pursuit of pioneering the vision of NEP' 2020, Chanakya University wishes to foster a student centric assessment system that facilitates learning and views Examinations, as Assessments of Learning progress, rather than Judgmental Evaluation of a Student. Hence, the office of the Registrar (Evaluation), terms itself as the Office of Learning Assessment, a Facilitator of Assessment, where the Assessment methods, like pedagogy, is a factor of Learning enhancement, and is driven by Formative Assessment Methods.

II. Responsibilities of the Office of Registrar (Evaluation):

- Communication/ Orientation regarding the University vision of Learning Assessments
- Facilitation of the Planning, Scheduling and Execution of the Assessments
- Facilitating the Technology/ Digital integration of Learning Assessment Systems.
- Provision of Resources and Facilities required for the Assessments.
- Review of Assessment Methods and Student Performance in accordance with Outcomes
- Organizing Training Workshop and Facilitating of benchmarking of best practices.
- Facilitating Academic Advice/ mentoring through Assessment analytics
- Facilitating Compliance with Statutory and Policy Directives
- Updating the Assessment data in NAD and Facilitating Credits accounts in ABC
- Any other that may be related to Learning Assessment as defined/ directed.



1. Introduction:

The Assessment includes **Formative and Summative methods** mapped to the Program and Course Learning Objectives derived from the Graduate Attributes which emanates from the overarching Vision of the University. These are specified for each course to guide the assessment. Thus, each **faculty, shall define and communicate the Lesson Plan**, Topic flow, Learning progression and Assessment methods to the students at the commencement of the Course.

The Formative Assessment shall be continuous exercise undertaken along the term and Summative Assessment is held at the End of the Semester term. **The Formative and Summative assessment shall be in the ratio of 60:40.**

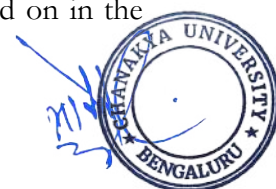
Formative Assessment: Formative Assessment (FA) is 'Seeking to **Formulate a Profound Positive Influence** on Student, regarding **Learning**'. Using various methods of Assessment to Understand the Strengths and Weaknesses of Students and Modify Teaching methods to guide Student Learning. **It Involves, Continuous Monitoring and Feedback** of Students Performance for Developing/ Adopting new methods of **Teaching and Instruction through Regular Counseling and Mentoring**

A. Orientation:

The **Course Faculty shall present a Course manual with the details of Course Content, Course Learning Objectives and Outcome (in tune with the Program Learning Objective & Outcome), The Lesson Plan with Topic Flow, Pedagogy & Resources, Chapter/ Topic wise expected levels of Learning mapped to Bloom's Taxonomy along with the Assessment Methods and Rubrics.** The Assessment methods shall be appropriate for the measurement of the specified Learning levels and Outcomes. The Course manual shall be updated in the University's LMS, with the approval of the office of the Registrar (Evaluation), before the commencement of the term, to enable students to plan their academic preparation and progression.

B. Schedule:

The Calendar for Assessment is **announced by the office of the Assessment**, which shall guide the scheduling and conduct of the Assessments. Formative assessment exercises shall be continuously held during the semester to determine **60% of the weightage of total marks.** However, there shall be a monthly review of the course wise performance of the students to facilitate the required counselling and guidance. The FA marks shall be uploaded on in the



LMS in Two phases of 30 (50% of 60) marks by the end of 8th week and the 15th week of the term.

C. School Assessment Committee:

The Assessments shall be conducted by the ‘School Assessment Committee’ headed by the Dean of the School or his Nominee, comprising of at least One faculty, representing each discipline. The SAC shall plan, schedule, guide and conduct the assessments in line with the expected outcomes of the program and in line with the envisioned graduate attributes. The SAC shall map the methods of assessment according to the Levels of learning and stated outcomes. The SAC is expected to encourage innovative methods of assessment by the faculty, subject to their appropriateness, for the Course, Class and the Program.

D. Examination Control Room:

The Registrar (Evaluation) office shall have a chamber designated as Exam Control/ Strong Room, to store and manage documents considered as ‘Confidential’. The Access to the chamber shall rests solely with the office of the Registrar (Evaluation).

2. Formative Assessment:

The Faculty may adopt any methods towards Formative Assessment, with details of the expected levels of **learning and assessment rubrics made known** to the students. These may include Assignments, Case Analysis, Projects, Presentations, Open Book Exam, Quiz, and other innovative methods deemed appropriate. As Formative Assessment is a method of continuous evaluation for facilitating learning improvement, **the faculty are advised** that the student may be given **multiple opportunities** for the submission/ performance of a specific assessment. The Formative assessment shall have a weightage of 60%.

A. Students’ Access:

All records of Formative Assessment **shall be made accessible** to students by the Faculty/ School with an opportunity for students to appeal for the redressal of any academic grievance. The school, through a committee, shall address any such grievance, related to academic affairs.

B. Assessment Audit:

The School shall maintain and **preserve all records of assessment**, including digital records, for the purpose of documentation and review. The School is expected to undertake an Audit of the Course **Assessment** for maintaining the **Sanctity and Standards of the Assessment**



process. If deemed necessary, the Office of the Vice Chancellor shall direct the Office of the Registrar (Evaluation) for the constitution of a **Committee for Assessment Audit.**

C. Absenteeism:

A Student who could not take the scheduled Formative Assessments due to **genuine reasons**, may appear to the Program Coordinator. The **Program Coordinator, on approval of the Dean**, in consultation with the concerned teacher, shall decide the merit of conducting a special test before the **Commencement of Summative Assessment.**

3. Summative Assessment:

The Summative Assessment carrying a weightage of 40%, shall be conducted by the School Exam Committee during a common schedule around **the 17-18th week** of the Semester shall be announced and facilitated by the office of the **Registrar (Evaluation).**

A. Notification: The Office shall notify the schedule of the Summative Assessments, 15 days in advance, in consultation with the SACs. The Final schedule, on notification, shall be communicated to the students through the LMS platform, Collpoll and the official notice board.

B. Eligibility: All students registered for specific courses shall be eligible to appear for the Formative and Summative Assessments. Students shall be **ineligible** to appear for **the Summative Examination** on Withdrawal from the Course/ Health issues/ Disciplinary Concerns.

The Summative Assessment **need not be a conventional written** examination and can be in the form of a Project, Experiment or **any form of Learning Experience** which can be measured.

C. Assessment Questions: The Summative Assessment Questions shall be mapped to Bloom's Levels of learning with a **minimum of 60% of marks** involving questions of **Higher Order Thinking skills.** The School Examination Committee shall **review the Question** papers before submitting the same to the Office of Registrar (Evaluation) for the conduct of the Summative Assessment.

The Student may **pursue a course without the requirement of** taking up the Exam, with the Grade sheet **indicating 'Exposed'** to such courses, with the letter, 'E'. If the Student changes the Program/ Major along the course of the program, the courses completed and which may not be a part of the Program/ Major, **may be treated as Open Elective.**



D. The Code of Conduct of the Assessment shall be guided by the **Ethics Committee**, constituted by the Office of the Vice Chancellor, which defines the rules governing procedures and protocols related to upkeep of the **sanctity of examination**. Instances of unethical practices, such as deviant behaviour, plagiarism, etc. shall be dealt with by the Ethics Committee, on the request of the School Examination Committee.

The process of reporting unethical practice, is given here under,

- Upon identification, the invigilator shall discuss the matter with the Faculty.
- The Faculty may escalate the issue to the Office of the Dean for resolution.
- The Dean shall discuss with the team and the students for a resolution of the issue.
- If unresolved, the matter shall be reported to the Ethics Committee, through the Office of the Registrar (Evaluation)
- The Office of Registrar (Evaluation) shall request the Ethics Committee to conduct the needful and resolve the issue within 5 working days and submit a Report.
- The Report is Presented to the Office of the Vice Chancellor, with a copy to the concerned Faculty & Students.
- The Faculty/ Student, if unhappy with the outcome, shall go on appeal to the Office of the Vice Chancellor, within 3 days of the receipt of the Report.

E. Use of Scribe: A Student who is unable to take up the written Summative Assessment, due to Divyaang nature or temporary disability (validated by the appropriate authority), may request the services of a Scribe to write the Assessment. The chosen Scribe should NOT possess a higher academic qualification, in relation to the Student. The Scribe, to be recommended by the Student, should be approved by the SEC, at least 15 days prior to the scheduled assessment.

4. Announcement of Results:

The Results of the Assessment shall be **announced through University LMS within 5 days** of the completion of the Assessment schedule. The University shall maintain the highest degree of **confidentiality in the announcement** of the results to the individual student, being informed about the result through their LMS account. There shall be **No public display** of the results Sheet. However, **Extraordinary individual** performances (Grade O), as attested by the Course faculty and the SEC, shall be displayed, as a matter of recognition of the Scholar and **inspiration for Students**.



A. Grading:

The Grading systems shall adopt a **combination of Absolute and Relative Grading** methods. The minimum percentage of marks for passing a course shall be 40%. The marks above 40% subject to relative grading with the range of each grade being defined by the Standard Deviation method. Course/s with an enrolment of up to 30 students shall adopt Absolute Grading and Course/s with enrolment of more than 30 students shall adopt Relative Grading.

D. Grade Points Calculation:

- Each Course has a Specific Credit. Total Credits = Sum Credits of Courses
- Each Grade has an assigned Point. Grade Points = Grade Point X Course Credits
- Total Grade Points = Sum of the Grade Points of all the Courses Taken by the Student
- Semester Grade Points Average (SGPA) = Total Grade Points / Total Credits
- Final Grade = The Alpha determined by the SGPA Score.

E. Equivalence in Percentage:

To derive the equivalence of **Grade points in terms of Percentage**, the Grade Points shall be **multiplied by 9.5**.

An illustration,

If the Grade Point is 8, the Percentage would be $8 \times 9.5 = 76$ percentile.



5. Passing the Exam:

The Student shall be declared to have cleared the **Course** with a minimum of **40% marks (Grade C)** in the Assessments, with a **minimum of 30%** in the Summative Assessment. The eligibility to clear the **Program** is a minimum of **50% marks (Grade C+)** out of the aggregate Marks.

- A. Access:** The faculty shall provide access for the valuated scripts to students within 3 days of the completion of the assessment schedule, based on which the student **may accept or reject** the results for Revaluation or deciding on **Withdrawal/ Dropping** the course. The Faculty shall prepare the final list of marks for the course along with the Grade obtained by the students, after students access to their scripts.
- B. Dropping the Course:** The Student may **Withdraw** a **Discipline Core Course** on securing low marks to appear again with a **Re-registration** for the Course in the next **applicable term**. However, if the **Course is an Elective**, the Course may be **Dropped**, in place of which the student may register for an **Alternate course**.

C. Revaluation/ Rejection of Results:

The Evaluation of the answer scripts shall be **conducted by the Course Faculty and** the student shall have the right to request for the valuated answer scripts. The student can seek a revaluation of the script, with a Fee based Application to the Office of Assessment, which shall **assign responsibility of the same to the SEC**. The script shall be assigned to **another faculty from within/ outside the School/ University**. The **higher of the marks after the revaluation** shall be applicable. However, if the **difference of the marks is more than 10 after the revaluation**, the script shall be subject to third valuation and an **average of the first two marks** shall be considered as the final marks. If the marks change to influence the result/ grade, the fee shall be **reimbursed** to the student.

- D. Re-Registration:** The Students **failing to secure 40% marks in the Summative Assessment**, shall **Re-register** for the Same/Alternate Course in the later terms to take up Formative and Summative Assessment in the Course, along with the Courses in the regular term. However, the **total courses registered for, in a term, shall not exceed the credits** prescribed for a term as per the academic regulations.



E. Academic Advice:

The Faculty are expected to act as **Academic advisors** in guiding the students regarding their Academic **progression for Career mapping**. The Skills would include, understanding **Students Profile, Interests and Aptitude, Emerging Domains** of Knowledge and their applications, the **Skills and Training** required and an **empathetic understanding of the students aspirations**. If the Student is unable to clear the course, in multiple attempts, they shall be **advised to Change the Course or the Program**, as applicable. This shall be a **guided academic advice**, to facilitate an appropriate **Academic progression and Career** plan for the student.

F. Progression: Students shall progress to the higher terms, **irrespective of their results** in assessment. They shall take up the non-qualified courses through re-registration in the later terms. However, **if the Course** in the higher semester **is a progression** of a specific course taken in the lower semester (E.g: Maths I and Maths II, etc), it shall be mandatory that the student shall qualify in the **earlier part of the course, to be eligible** for the next part of the course.

6. Grade Card:

A. Grade card issued at the end of each semester shall contain the following:

- The Credits for each course for that semester.
- The performance in each course is shown by the letter grade obtained.
- The Grade Point (CGP) of all the courses for the semester.
- The Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) of all the courses from the first semester.
- The total marks secured by the candidate for each of the courses in which the candidate appeared for the Summative Assessment.

B. Competency Report:

The students on completion of graduation (exit with the applicable graduate eligibility), shall be given a competency report along with the Grade card, identifying the competence of Knowledge, Skills, Values and Professional attributes, proved during the learning experience, as attested by the SAC.

7. Graduation:



- A. **Award of Certificates:** The Student shall be **eligible for the award of Certificate, Diploma, UG Degree and UG (Hons) Degree** on the successful completion of the Discipline, Open, Foundation and Competence courses along with completion of the internships, projects, fieldtrip, etc., as prescribed by the Scheme of Examinations.

If some candidates exit at the completion of First, Second or Third year of the Four years Undergraduate Programmes, with **Certificate, Diploma or the Basic Degree, respectively**, then the results of successful candidates at the End of Second, Fourth or Sixth semesters shall also be classified on the basis of the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA).

Student shall be free to pursue courses from multiple Institutions/ University apart from Chanakya University. However, they are eligible to get the benefit of being the Students of Chanakya University, only on acquiring a **minimum of 50 percent of the prescribed Credits** from Courses taken up in Chanakya University

- B. **Convocation Ceremony, 'Deekshanth':**

The University Shall hold a Convocation Ceremony at the end of the academic term to award the relevant certificates to the Graduating Students. The Convocation ceremony, to be presided over by the Hon'ble Chancellor, shall have the presence of the Vice Chancellor, University officers, Members of the Academic Council, Board of Studies, Board of Examiners, Deans and the team of faculty. The event shall recognise the academic achievement of the graduates, with an oath taking ceremony, reinforcing the purpose of their academic achievement. The event shall be marked by a special address by a recognized social leader, termed as the Convocation address, marking a note of guidance to the Students and the vision of the University.

8. Digital Repository:

- A. **Digital Storage:** The Answer scripts are digitised and shall be stored in the digital format. The physical copies of the students answer scripts shall be preserved for a period of 3 Years from the date of assessment.
- B. **MOOC Course:** The Student is allowed to take up the study of any **course from the Online platform** (subject to the **approval of the Dean/Program head**), which may be **considered equivalent** to the course offered by the University. This shall be especially applicable to the **study of Indian Languages** (instead of Hindi/ Sanskrit as given in the University), in the First Year of the program.



9. Transcript:

The Student shall get **only ONE** Grade sheet, even with **repeated attempts on completion of the Program. The Transcript shall be issued only at the time of Graduation/ Exit.** However, statement of Grade is issued on completion of a term, at the request of the **student.** Students who are unable to qualify are not given the grade sheet, but may apply for a **Statement of Marks.**

- 10. Academic Bank of Credit:** The Assessment Grades are entered into the National Academic Depository's Academic Bank of Credit, for facilitating a digital depository of students academic performance for various purposes, including credit accumulation, transfers and redemption through the opening and closure of Credits Account for facilitating Multiple Entry/ Exit options in a program.

A. Credit Transfer: Credits earned shall be deposited in the students account in the ABC, with a validity as specified by the regulations, can be redeemed for the award of the specified qualifications. **On the award of the degree, the credits shall be irrevocably debited from the respective students' Academic ban Account.** The credit transfer and the integration for a program of Chanakya University, shall be subject to the **approval of the equivalence committee.**

- 11. The League of Academic Distinction (LEAD):** Students who consistently score grades **above A,** without records of **untoward behaviour** and **unfavourable remarks,** are inducted into the Team LEAD (League of Academic Distinction) on the **completion of IV semesters. This distinction makes them eligible** for significant academic freedom and opportunity to represent the University/ School in Curricular Conferences, Experiences and Expeditions, apart from other **Rewards and Recognitions.**

Application Process:

3. Shortlisted candidates may be invited for an interview to assess their suitability for the scholarship.

Detailed Process:

1. Register and complete the Application: Students shall register and fill out the application available through NPF, and upload the required documents (Marks sheets, Aadhar card, Income certificate).
2. Upload a short write-up or SOP: Students should upload a letter of motivation/purpose describing their aspirations and need for Chanakya Scholarship. This can be supported by a letter of recommendation from the College Principal.
3. Documentation verification: Once the student is eligible, the internal team shall connect with the student and verify the uploaded data. Those who fulfill all the aforementioned criteria will be eligible to take the entrance test.
4. Take Chanakya Scholarship Entrance Test (CSET): CSET shall be conducted through MeritTrac. Students scoring above 50% in the entrance test will be shortlisted for the interview round.
5. Online Interviews: A 3-membered panel for each school to be constituted for conducting online interviews for students. This may be for 1 or 2 rounds based on the performance of the student and the recommendation of the interview panel.
6. Background/house verification: A dedicated team shall visit the student's house and collect the required documents as per the format requirement.
7. On-campus engagement: Students qualifying all the steps will be invited for on-campus engagement with the Deans of the School.
9. Shortlisted students' names will be declared on the website.
10. Letter of confirmation sent to students, followed by completion of the admission process with a week time for a student to join.

2. Agenda Item No. 2 - Approval of Academic Regulations of the University

Dr. Sandeep Nair, Registrar - Evaluation presented the highlights of the Academic Regulations of the university.

The academic council appreciated the comprehensive coverage of academic matters in the academic regulation of the university. Members also felt that the regulation provides a good take off point for the idea of liberal education to be implemented. Some members sought clarifications on specific provisions of the regulations and the same was provided to them. There have also been some suggestions for further improvements to be taken up over a period.

After a detailed deliberation **the Academic Council approved the proposed academic regulations which shall be in force from the date of approval.**

Further the Academic Council authorized the Vice Chancellor to make the necessary amendments during the intermittent period if needed and place the same in the next academic council meeting for approval.

3. Agenda Item No. 3 - Approval of Program Structure & Course wise syllabi of each program

The program structure and syllabi for courses offered were presented to the academic council. The members appreciated the program structure and credit structure designed by the university. They also made certain suggestions for effective delivery of the courses and in particular suggested the use of experiential learning and immersion programmes as part of pedagogy.

The Academic Council approved the programs and curriculum for the academic year 2022-23.

4. Agenda Item No. 4 - Recommendation for starting a School of Education, and School of Legal studies from academic year 2023-24

The University proposes to establish following schools and offer various program under each school from the academic year 2023-24.



The details are as below

The academic council approved the creation of the above schools. It was advised to submit the application to NCTE and BCI for the approval of the programs to be offered. The Vice Chancellor is authorised to take the necessary decision and actions to create the schools and draft the program structure & syllabi for each program.

Agenda Item No. 5: Any other matter with the permission of Chair

5.1 During the course of deliberations of various agenda items as well as during the open session under the above agenda, members made many suggestions. The major suggestions include the following.

- It was suggested to move psychology to the School of Maths and Natural Science.
- The expressed need to consider multiple entry & exit points while award of the certificate or diploma. He said that it is important to make sure that the student is equipped with enabling skills at every exit point. The Vice chancellor explained the mechanism in place for skills development at every exit point with a provision of acquiring additional credits to be eligible for the award of the certificate or diploma.
- It was suggested to develop pool of large no of courses to enable multidisciplinary learning.
- It was advised to focus on curriculum delivery with innovative pedagogy.
- It was recommended to focus is a lesson plan and its implementation in the classroom and suggested to develop a mechanism of regular review by the Dean of the respective school.
- It was suggested to recognise internship as a component of additional credit in the year one itself. The internship could be in the form of Industry internship or rural



immersion program. He expressed the need for focusing on need for doing along with need for knowing.

- The academic council suggested that Chanakya University should develop and present a model of academic architecture based on NEP 2020 as none of the universities have model which implements NEP in letter and spirit.
- It was suggested to consider offering open elective for 1st year and foundation courses for higher semesters.
- It was advised the university to constitute a committee of experts and industry representatives for revisiting credit matrix.
- Consider offering NSS and NCC under open elective category and consider UGC approved syllabi for the same.
- It was suggested to give weightage to seminar, assignments, tests as a part of assessment. Formative assessment must be flexible at the same time effective tool of learning.
- The academic council members were of the view that the multiple entry and exit option are an opportunity to attract best of the talent from other universities for admission in year 2 and year 3 by offering distinct courses.
- It was advised to apply to the Ministry for Youth Affairs for a NSS unit
- Application to be made to Directorate of NCC for NCC unit
- It was advised to try to engage the students with the real world and he would be available for advice on issues related industry integration at course level and skill-based training.
- The following approach was suggested to make the program effective and useful considering multiple entry and exist options. Which shall make sure that the students are enabled with necessary skills at every exit point.
 - Min. 75% of Year I should be Experiential/ Practical learning
 - Min 50% of Year II should be Experiential/ Practical learning
 - Min 25% of Year III should be Experiential/ Practical learning
- It was suggested to consider dividing the credits for languages over the 3 years rather than having more credits allocation in the year I.
- The council expressed the need for aligning each lesson with that course outcome and program outcome.
- It was suggested that there is need to create a leaning environment to help students build their own portfolio.

- The Vice Chancellor, Chairman Academic Council assured the academic council that all the suggestions shall be taken up in the appropriate forums and shall be implemented.











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The Regulations Governing UG Programme
(As approved by the Academic Council in a meeting held on 19.08.2022)



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Preamble

Education is the process of evolving excellence through Collective and Conscious action. Chanakya University aspires to pioneer the vision of NEP '2020 in harnessing the resources of the Technology era with the Wealth of Indian Heritage in the Creation and Dissemination of Knowledge for nurturing Global leaders.

NEP 2020 envisions, 'India Centered Education System that contributes **Directly** to Transforming Our Nation Sustainably into an **Equitable** and **Vibrant Knowledge** Society by providing **High Quality Education to All**'. This implies educational outcome as a Conscious realization of an Individual's Character, Culture, Competence with the Curiosity for Creating knowledge for building a **Compassionate World**'.

The Inter, Trans and Multi-disciplinary perspectives seeks to go beyond the limits of disciplinary knowledge in adopting project based learning approach. Having derived the University Vision as, '**Creating Knowledge and Transformative Leaders for Holistic Development**', the learning outcomes as identified by the graduate attributes of the University are,

1. Knowledge with Competence for application
2. Research with Analytical Abilities
3. Scientific Reasoning for Problem solving and Life long Learning
4. Digital skills, Multicultural perspectives and Sustainable solutions
5. Ethical Clarity and Effective Communication skills
6. Leadership and the cultivation of a healthy Civilizational Consciousness.

Thus, Quantitative knowledge creation and Qualitative Leadership attributes are integrated with the core idea of developing a 'Positive Civilizational Consciousness'. The Outcome based learning strategy is to be assessed with Bloom's Taxonomy levels in the design of curriculum, pedagogy and assessment, to enable the development of 'Learning as a skill', for a life of Inquiry, Industry and Inspiration. In view of the context and commitment envisioned above, we present the academic regulations, for the facilitation our academic endeavour.

A. Title & Commencement

These regulations shall be called '**The Regulations Governing the Undergraduate Honours Degree Programmes - 2022-23**'.



B. Salient Features:

1. Pioneering the **NEP 2020 Vision** in Liberal Education with 4 Year Honors Program with Multiple Entry and Exit options.
2. Multi, Inter and Trans disciplinary approach in Learning through clustering of Disciplines under an **umbrella structure termed as, 'Schools'**.
3. Support and **affirmative action** towards the inclusion of Global cross section of Students and Teachers.
4. Comprehensive **freedom to choose Courses** from across Domains, Skills, Values, MOOCs, Associated Institutions including Courses without Credits and Self Curated Courses.
5. Integration of **Indian Knowledge Heritage** in theory and Practice to inculcate a healthy **Civilizational Consciousness**.
6. Curriculum and Methodology with scope for **Experiential, Self and Continuous Learning**.
7. Faculty driven, Student centric and **Outcome oriented Assessment** system, that measures learning outcomes and intellectual progression.
8. **Credits for Non curricular activities and Experiences** including Sports, Internships, Co-curricular activities, SEVA or Voluntaryism and Self Curated Courses.

D. Syllabus:

The Syllabus refers to the content to be learnt by the student in a specific Course determined the nature and credits of learning. The syllabus shall be curated by the Dean's Council, a committee of experts, comprising of internal and external faculty/ experts of the subject drawn from the academia and industry, to be approved by the Board of Studies. The syllabus is drafted with well-defined learning objectives and outcomes with details on the methodology, prerequisites of learning, learning resources, desirable teacher attributes and emerging domains of specialization for research and employment. The content integrates the Social, Technological, Environmental and Professional orientation with reference to the course and program under study.

E. Structure:

- 1. Duration:** The 4 Year comprises of 8 semesters. A Semester Comprises of 16 weeks with a minimum of 80 working days.
- 2. Credits Matrix:** The 4 Year Honours comprises of minimum of 160 credits spread among Discipline Core (Major/ Minor), Open Electives, Foundation Course and Competence Courses.

- 3. Required Courses:** The Program includes required Non-credit courses, with assessment and appearance in the grade sheet. These courses shall not influence the result, however shall have the grades indicated in the grade sheet.
- 4. Fast/ Slow Track:** Students can acquire or drop up to 4 credits/ semester under the Fast/ Slow track system, enabling them to Shorten/ Extend their term of Study, not lesser than 5/7 semester and Not exceeding 6/8 for the UG Degree/ Honours Program.



5. **Certificate:** The Student shall have the choice of exiting from the course after the II semester with the option of securing a Certificate, subject to the acquiring of a mandatory 10 additional credits, further divided into Theory and Internship project based, in the ratio of 4:6.

6. **Diploma:** The Student shall have the freedom to exit the program after IV semester, with the option of securing a Diploma, subject to the condition of acquiring of a mandatory 10 additional Credits based on Internship.

7. **Bachelor's Degree:** The Student shall secure a basic Bachelor's degree, on the completion of VI Semesters on acquiring a minimum of 136 credits.

8. **Honours Degree:** The Student can obtain Bachelor's degree with Honours degree in two streams, viz, in a chosen domain of Discipline or in Research, with a minimum of 160 credits.

9. **Time Line:** The Student shall have a maximum of 6/8 Years to complete a Basic UG Degree/ UG Honours program, from the date of registration to the I semester.

10. **Re-Entry:** The students who exit with Certification, Diploma and Basic Bachelor Degree shall be eligible to re-enter the programme to complete the Honours programme by acquiring the necessary credits. However, such students shall take the exam in the revised course curriculum and syllabus.

11. **Lateral Entry:** Students from other Institutions, shall be allowed admission into the odd semesters (III/ V/ VII), subject to the approval of the Academic Equivalence Committee. Lateral entry provisions are subjected to conditions that the student shall be able to complete the graduate program within 6/8 years from the date of initial (I semester) enrolment, as the case may be.

12. **Credit Structure:** Credits represent the weightage of a course in terms of Teaching efforts or learning impact measured in Lecture/ Tutorial/ Practical Hours. One credit implies 15 Hours/ Semester and 1 Credit is equivalent to 25 marks in the Semester End Exam. The Table below illustrates the weightage of credits:

F. Course Types:

1. **Majors:** The student is required to specialise in One/ Two chosen disciplines termed 'Majors', to decide the nature of the Honours degree. A Discipline with a minimum of 48 credits qualifies to be Major.
2. **Minors:** The Student can pursue additional discipline/s, from across any Schools to be considered as Minor, by acquiring a minimum of 24 credits. The 4 Year Honours degree is designed to facilitate the acquisition of 1 Major with 2 Minors or 2 majors. Students seeking Minor Courses involving technical or practical (such as Natural/ Computer Science/ other), would require to satisfy the eligibility criteria, for students without prior adequate learning of those such disciplines.
3. **Foundation Course:** Every program shall have a mandatory set of Foundation courses of 20 credits to be completed to qualify for the UG degree.
4. **Open Elective:** As a part of pursuit of passion, the student shall take up courses under Open Elective from any School in the University or MOOCs or Self curated or Activities based learning such as NCC/ NSS/ Sports/ etc. with a total of 12 credits being allocated to this stream across 4 semesters.
5. **Competence Courses:** Skills are Explicitly integrated, highly visible, taught in context and have measurable assessment. The skills include, Language & Communication Creative Thinking, Team Work, Problem solving, Technical, Social, Personal, Professional, Citizenship and other skills. The student shall choose from Language, Skills and Research capabilities with a mandatory 32 credits in 3 Years.
6. **Required Non-credit (Audit) Courses:** The Programs across all schools shall include Required Non-credit courses, as may be prescribed by the University, from time to time.

G. Eligibility for Admissions:

1. The Admission to the University programs is guided by the **entrance test** conducted by the University, termed as Chanakya University Pravesha Pariksha. The University shall consider the Government sponsored and NTA administered CUET, as a qualifying exam for admission to the University. The test shall be followed by a personal interview for determining the eligibility.
2. A candidate who has passed the **two-year Pre-University** examination conducted by the Pre-University Board of Education, Government of Karnataka or any other examination considered



equivalent by the University is eligible for admission to the first Semester of the UG program. The Eligibility criteria may differ from program to program.

3. Lateral entry to the corresponding Degree Programmes from other institutions is subject to the availability of seats, provided the credits are transferred and retrieved through the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC).

4. The University shall have an **Academic Equivalence Committee**, comprising of Deans of Schools, Academic Coordinators, Programme Directors or others deemed suitable, to decide on the equivalence of course/s in case of inter-school or inter institution portability of students. It shall examine the content, outcome orientation and assessment to decide on the suitability of credit transfers or program completion.

9. The University shall have an open admission policy to offer admission to any individual upon clearing the eligibility criteria, even to individual courses. However, a student shall be deemed to be a regular student of the University, only if they register for courses worth minimum of 16 credits per semester. Scholarships, Hostel accommodation, etc are eligible only to the regular student of the University.

H. Medium of Instruction:

The Medium of Instruction shall be **English**.

I. Glossary:

Semester: A term consisting of 16 weeks (minimum 80 days) of Sessions, with 36-40 hours of guided learning per week.

Academic Year: Two Consecutive (one odd + one even) semesters constitute one academic year.

Discipline: A chosen Domain of learning comprising of related courses and which indicate the Nature of Honours/ program.

Course: The Specific Subject (paper/component) of a programme. They vary in Nature, Quantum, Instructions, Importance, Progression, Evaluation and Credits based on the Expected and Measurable Outcome of the Course.

Credit: A unit by which the Course work/ Learning emphasis/ Teaching Efforts are measured, especially in terms of Lecture/ Lab Sessions/ Tutorials. It determines the number of hours of instructions required per week in a semester.



Grade Point: It is a numerical weight allotted to each letter grade on a 10-point scale.

Credit Point: It is the product of grade point and number of credits for a course.

Letter Grade: It is an index of the performance of students in a said course. Grades are denoted by letters A+, A, B+, B, C+, C and D.

Programme: A programme leading to award of a Degree, Diploma or Certificate.

Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA): It is a measure of performance of work done in a semester. It is the Ratio of Total Credit points secured by a student in various courses registered in a semester and the total course credits taken during that semester. It shall be expressed up to two decimal places.

Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA): It is a measure of cumulative performance of a student at the end of the corresponding exit level. It is expressed up to two decimal places.

Transcript/ Grade Card/ Certificate: Based on the grades earned, a Grade Card shall be issued to all the registered students after every semester. The grade certificate will display the course details, viz, Course Code, Title, Credits, Grade secured, Result, etc.).

J. Attendance:

Students are expected to maintain the 100% attendance to the Classes and curriculum activities and any deviation from the rule, shall require the authorization of the program coordinator and Dean of the School.

K. Change of Course/s:

The Student shall have the **freedom to register for an additional course, than** the required number of courses (including the Online mode), to seek clarity and understanding regarding the suitability of the Courses/ Program to pursue. If the student wishes Change of Course/s, it shall be effected within Two weeks from the date of commencement of the term (to ensure the fulfilment of the mandatory attendance provision) with the authorization from the Dean. However, the students shall not be allowed to take a course, for which they were not registered.

L. Pedagogy:

The Teaching Learning methods shall be designed to measure the learning outcome in tune with the Vision of the University and Graduate Attributes. The Subject specific, Student driven



methodology shall involve extensive Experiential learning, Case methodology, Immersive projects, blended learning, Self learning activities and other innovative teaching methods.

The methodology shall **consider the diverse profile and learning needs** of the students. The mentors shall facilitate the identification of the need for Bridge/ Modular courses, Effective Peer learning mechanisms, Contextual use of technology tools and Virtual classrooms, distinguished faculty from Industry and Practice with extensive training and workshop for faculty development shall ensure learning through Instruction, Intellect and Inspiration.

M. Assessment:

The Schools shall conduct the student assessment for the Course/ programs offered in line with the Learning outcome. The Formative Assessment and Summative Assessment ratio shall be at 60:40. The various components of the Formative (continuous) Assessment, the methodologies and expected outcome is communicated at the commencement of the Course, by the course faculty.

Formative Assessment for 30% (out of 60%) marks, shall be held by the end of 8th week with the completion of 50% of the syllabus and the **Formative Assessment** for the remaining 30% marks shall be held by the end of 16th week, on the completion of 100% of the syllabus. The FA marks shall be submitted to the Office of the Registrar, within 7 days from the completion of the stated period of their completion.

During the 17th–18th week of the semester, the Summative Assessment shall be conducted by the School as the **Final component of Assessment** for 40% marks.

In case of a student who could not take the Formative Assessments on scheduled date/s due to genuine reasons, such a candidate may appeal to the Program Coordinator/ Dean. The Program Coordinator/ Dean, in consultation with the concerned teacher shall decide the merit of conducting a special test to such candidate on the date fixed by the concerned teacher but before commencement of the concerned Summative Assessment.

The Evaluated assignments of the Formative Assessments are immediately provided to the candidates by the concerned teacher and is maintained by the School, which shall be a part of the Academic Audit to be conducted by the Registrar (E), as deemed appropriate.

N. Conduct of Examination:



The Exams shall be conducted by the respective Schools, under the guidance of Exam committee headed by the Dean/ Dean's Nominee. The University shall follow a uniform examination calendar, as designed by the office of the Registrar (Evaluation).

Eligibility: All the students registered for specific courses shall be eligible to appear for the Formative and Summative Assessments. Students shall be ineligible to appear for the **Summative Examination**) under the following circumstances, viz, Non qualification in Formative Assessments (< 40%), Withdrawal from the Course, Disciplinary Issues and Medical grounds.

The Student may **pursue a course without the requirement** of taking up the Exam, with the Grade sheet indicating 'Exposed' to such courses, with the letter, 'E'. If the Student changes the Program/ Major along the course of the program, the courses completed and which may not be a part of the Program/ Major, may be treated as Open Elective/s.

The Code of Conduct of the Assessment shall be guided by the Ethics Committee, which shall lay down the rules governing procedures and protocols related to upkeep of the sanctity of examination. Instances of unethical practices, such as deviant behaviour, plagiarism, etc. shall be dealt with the Ethics Committee, on the request of the School Examination Committee.

Guided Learning Programme: The University may conduct a fast-track Guided Learning Programme, to facilitate the eligibility of students to SA, who fail to qualify in the Formative Assessment, under exceptional circumstances.

Re-Registration: The Students failing to qualify in the Guided Learning program to appear for the Make Up assessment or failing to secure 40% marks in the Make Up Assessment, shall Re-register for the Course in the Second Semester to take up Formative Assessment and Summative Assessment in the Course, along the Even Semester.

Dropping the Course: If the Student fails again in either the Formative or Summative Assessment in the re-registered attempt, they shall be advised to Change the Course or Program, as applicable. This shall be a guided academic advice, to facilitate an appropriate career planning for the student.

O. Passing the Exam:

The Student shall be declared to have passed the Course on obtaining a minimum of 40% both in the Formative and Summative Assessments. Student securing less than 40% marks in FA shall be ineligible to write the Summative Assessment and those who score less than 40% in the SA, may take up the makeup assessment, to be held soon after the completion of SA. If the student fails in



the makeup assessment, they shall repeat the course, afresh, in the subsequent semester. They may also exercise the option of dropping/ changing the course, if applicable.

Candidates who fail in lower semester examinations may go to the higher semesters and take the lower semester examinations. However, if the **Course in the higher semester is a progression on the course taken in the lower semester** (E.g: Maths I and Maths II, etc), it shall be mandatory that the student shall qualify in the earlier paper, to be eligible for the next part of the course.

P. Results and Grading:

The Grading systems shall adopt a combination of Absolute and Relative Grading system, wherein the Minimum percentage requirement for passing shall be based upon Absolute Grading system with the limit being 40%. The Results and Ranking shall be based on Relative Grading system. Course/s with an enrolment of up to 30 students shall adopt Absolute Grading.

The Course faculty shall be responsible for uploading the Marks/ Grade in the Learning Management System, as advised and guided by the Office of the Registrar (Evaluation).

Q. Grade Card:

Grade card issued at the end of each semester shall contain the following:

- The credits for each course for that semester.
- The performance in each course is shown by the letter grade obtained.
- The Grade Point Average (GPA) of all the courses for the semester.
- The Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) of all the courses from the first semester.
- The total marks secured by the candidate for each of the courses in which the candidate appeared for the Summative Assessment.
- The Class, Grade, Result and Rank (if applicable)

R. Award of Certificate:

The Student shall be eligible for the award of Certificate, Diploma, UG Degree and UG (Hons) Degree on the successful completion of the Discipline, Open, Foundation and Competence courses along with completion of the internships, projects, fieldtrip, etc., as prescribed by the Scheme of Examinations.

If some candidates exit at the completion of first, second or third year of the four years Undergraduate Programmes, with Certificate, Diploma or the Basic Degree, respectively, then the



results of successful candidates at the end of second, fourth or sixth semesters shall also be classified on the basis of the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA).

Student shall be free to pursue courses/ programs from multiple Institutions/ University apart from Chanakya University. However, they are eligible to get the benefit of being the Students of Chanakya University, only on acquiring a minimum of 50 percent of the prescribed Credits from Courses taken up in Chanakya University.

S. Evaluation/ Revaluation/ Rejection of Results:

The Evaluation of the answer scripts shall be conducted by internal valuator and the student shall have the right to request for the valuated answer scripts. The student can seek a revaluation of the script, with an application to the Dean, who shall assign the script to another expert for revaluation, other than the first valuator. The higher of the marks after the revaluation shall be applicable. However, if the difference of the marks is more than 10 after the revaluation, the script shall be subject to third valuation and an average of the first two marks shall be considered as the final marks. If the marks change to influence the result/ grade, the fee shall be reimbursed to the student.

Make UP Exam: The Student who fails to secure the eligibility marks (minimum 40%), may apply for the Make Up exam, to be held shortly after the SA to clear the course. However, if the student fails to secure the eligible marks of Minimum 40% in the make up exam, they shall have to repeat the Course, afresh, in the next applicable term.

Grade Improvement Option: The Student may seek to improve the results of SA, by withdrawing his SA Marks for specified Course/s, to apply for the Make Up Assessment and the Marks scored in the Make Up Exam shall be considered, as the final marks. This option can be exercised only once for a Course. The student may apply for the improvement option through an application in the prescribed form. Further, the Student who seek Grade Improvement option shall be eligible for Grading and Not for Ranks, if applicable.

T. Grievance Cell:

Every School shall have an academic grievance cell. Students shall report any grievances related to academic matters to the cell. The composition of this cell is as follows:

- Dean (or his/her representative)
- Program Director/ Student Welfare Officer



- One senior faculty member from each Program

The Registrar (Evaluation) shall be the final arbiter for any issue not specifically mentioned in these regulations and is authorised to take the appropriate action for resolution.

U. Additional Learning:

Dual Degree: The University shall facilitate the pursuance of dual degree, where in the student may take up an additional degree along with the one being pursued in the University in the Distance learning mode or Online Mode from the SWAYAM platform. This is subject to the student fulfilling the necessary conditions required for the successful completion of the courses taken in the University.

V. ACADEMIC BANK OF CREDITS (ABC):

The ABC allows for credit redemption through the process of commuting the accrued credits in the Academic Bank Account maintained in the ABC for the purpose of fulfilling the credits requirements for the award of Certificate/ Diploma/Degree by the authorized HEIs. Upon collecting a certificate, diploma or degree, all the credits earned till then, in respect of that certificate, diploma or degree, shall be debited from the account.

The procedure for depositing credits earned, its shelf life, redemption of credits, would be as per UGC (Establishment and Operationalization of ABC scheme in Higher Education) Regulations, 2021. The Equivalence of the credits and eligibility for transfer shall depend on the nature of courses, content and other related aspects, to be determined by the Academic Equivalence committee of the University. The University may enter into MoUs with select Universities/ HEIs in the country and abroad for the facilitation of the same.

W. MOOCs:

The University recognises, The UGC (Credit Framework for Online Learning Courses through SWAYAM) Regulations, 2021 up to 40 per cent of the total courses being offered in a programme in a semester through the SWAYAM platform and shall facilitate the same through proper guidance and quality assurance.

X. National Academic Depository:

The University shall facilitate the entry of the academic records in the National Academic Depository. National Academic Depository (NAD) is a 24X7 online store house of all academic awards viz. certificates, diplomas, degrees, mark-sheets etc. duly digitised and lodged by academic



institutions. Established by the UGC, NAD not only ensures easy access to and retrieval of an academic award but also validates and guarantees its authenticity and safe storage.

Digi Locker aims at 'Digital Empowerment', and the issued documents in Digi Locker system are deemed to be at par with original physical documents as per Rule 9A of the Information Technology (Preservation and Retention of Information by Intermediaries providing Digital Locker facilities) Rules, 2016.

7. Agenda Item No. 7: Any other matter with the permission of the Chair




The Regulations Governing UG Programme
(As approved by the Academic Council in a meeting held on 19.08.2022)



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Preamble

Education is the process of evolving excellence through Collective and Conscious action. Chanakya University aspires to pioneer the vision of NEP '2020 in harnessing the resources of the Technology era with the Wealth of Indian Heritage in the Creation and Dissemination of Knowledge for nurturing Global leaders.

NEP 2020 envisions, 'India Centered Education System that contributes **Directly** to Transforming Our Nation Sustainably into an **Equitable** and **Vibrant Knowledge** Society by providing **High Quality** Education to **All**'. This implies educational outcome as a Conscious realization of an Individual's Character, Culture, Competence with the Curiosity for Creating knowledge for building a Compassionate World'.

The Inter, Trans and Multi-disciplinary perspectives seeks to go beyond the limits of disciplinary knowledge in adopting project based learning approach. Having derived the University Vision as, '**Creating Knowledge and Transformative Leaders for Holistic Development**', the learning outcomes as identified by the graduate attributes of the University are,

1. Knowledge with Competence for application
2. Research with Analytical Abilities
3. Scientific Reasoning for Problem solving and Life long Learning
4. Digital skills, Multicultural perspectives and Sustainable solutions
5. Ethical Clarity and Effective Communication skills
6. Leadership and the cultivation of a healthy Civilizational Consciousness.

Thus, Quantitative knowledge creation and Qualitative Leadership attributes are integrated with the core idea of developing a 'Positive Civilizational Consciousness'. The Outcome based learning strategy is to be assessed with Bloom's Taxonomy levels in the design of curriculum, pedagogy and assessment, to enable the development of 'Learning as a skill', for a life of Inquiry, Industry and Inspiration. In view of the context and commitment envisioned above, we present the academic regulations, for the facilitation our academic endeavour.

A. Title & Commencement

These regulations shall be called '**The Regulations Governing the Undergraduate Honours Degree Programmes - 2022-23.**



B. Salient Features:

1. Pioneering the **NEP 2020 Vision** in Liberal Education with 4 Year Honors Program with Multiple Entry and Exit options.
2. Multi, Inter and Trans disciplinary approach in Learning through clustering of Disciplines under an **umbrella structure termed as, 'Schools'**.
3. Support and **affirmative action** towards the inclusion of Global cross section of Students and Teachers.
4. Comprehensive **freedom to choose Courses** from across Domains, Skills, Values, MOOCs, Associated Institutions including Courses without Credits and Self Curated Courses.
5. Integration of **Indian Knowledge Heritage** in theory and Practice to inculcate a healthy **Civilizational Consciousness**.
6. Curriculum and Methodology with scope for **Experiential, Self and Continuous Learning**.
7. Faculty driven, Student centric and **Outcome oriented Assessment** system, that measures learning outcomes and intellectual progression.
8. **Credits for Non curricular activities and Experiences** including Sports, Internships, Co-curricular activities, SEVA or Voluntaryism and Self Curated Courses.

D. Syllabus:

The Syllabus refers to the content to be learnt by the student in a specific Course determined the nature and credits of learning. The syllabus shall be curated by the Dean's Council, a committee of experts, comprising of internal and external faculty/ experts of the subject drawn from the academia and industry, to be approved by the Board of Studies. The syllabus is drafted with well-defined learning objectives and outcomes with details on the methodology, prerequisites of learning, learning resources, desirable teacher attributes and emerging domains of specialization for research and employment. The content integrates the Social, Technological, Environmental and Professional orientation with reference to the course and program under study.

E. Structure:

1. **Duration:** The 4 Year comprises of 8 semesters. A Semester Comprises of 16 weeks with a minimum of 80 working days.

2. **Credits Matrix:** The 4 Year Honours comprises of minimum of 160 credits spread among Discipline Core (Major/ Minor), Open Electives, Foundation Course and Competence Courses.

3. **Required Courses:** The Program includes required Non-credit courses, with assessment and appearance in the grade sheet. These courses shall not influence the result, however shall have the grades indicated in the grade sheet.

4. **Fast/ Slow Track:** Students can acquire or drop up to 4 credits/ semester under the Fast/ Slow track system, enabling them to Shorten/ Extend their term of Study, not lesser than 5/7 semester and Not exceeding 6/8 for the UG Degree/ Honours Program.



5. **Certificate:** The Student shall have the choice of exiting from the course after the II semester with the option of securing a Certificate, subject to the acquiring of a mandatory 10 additional credits, further divided into Theory and Internship project based, in the ratio of 4:6.

6. **Diploma:** The Student shall have the freedom to exit the program after IV semester, with the option of securing a Diploma, subject to the condition of acquiring of a mandatory 10 additional Credits based on Internship.

7. **Bachelor's Degree:** The Student shall secure a basic Bachelor's degree, on the completion of VI Semesters on acquiring a minimum of 136 credits.

8. **Honours Degree:** The Student can obtain Bachelor's degree with Honours degree in two streams, viz, in a chosen domain of Discipline or in Research, with a minimum of 160 credits.

9. **Time Line:** The Student shall have a maximum of 6/8 Years to complete a Basic UG Degree/ UG Honours program, from the date of registration to the I semester.

10. **Re-Entry:** The students who exit with Certification, Diploma and Basic Bachelor Degree shall be eligible to re-enter the programme to complete the Honours programme by acquiring the necessary credits. However, such students shall take the exam in the revised course curriculum and syllabus.

11. **Lateral Entry:** Students from other Institutions, shall be allowed admission into the odd semesters (III/ V/ VII), subject to the approval of the Academic Equivalence Committee. Lateral entry provisions are subjected to conditions that the student shall be able to complete the graduate program within 6/8 years from the date of initial (I semester) enrolment, as the case may be.

12. **Credit Structure:** Credits represent the weightage of a course in terms of Teaching efforts or learning impact measured in Lecture/ Tutorial/ Practical Hours. One credit implies 15 Hours/ Semester and 1 Credit is equivalent to 25 marks in the Semester End Exam. The Table below illustrates the weightage of credits:

F. Course Types:

1. **Majors:** The student is required to specialise in One/ Two chosen disciplines termed 'Majors', to decide the nature of the Honours degree. A Discipline with a minimum of 48 credits qualifies to be Major.
2. **Minors:** The Student can pursue additional discipline/s, from across any Schools to be considered as Minor, by acquiring a minimum of 24 credits. The 4 Year Honours degree is designed to facilitate the acquisition of 1 Major with 2 Minors or 2 majors. Students seeking Minor Courses involving technical or practical (such as Natural/ Computer Science/ other), would require to satisfy the eligibility criteria, for students without prior adequate learning of those such disciplines.
3. **Foundation Course:** Every program shall have a mandatory set of Foundation courses of 20 credits to be completed to qualify for the UG degree.
4. **Open Elective:** As a part of pursuit of passion, the student shall take up courses under Open Elective from any School in the University or MOOCs or Self curated or Activities based learning such as NCC/ NSS/ Sports/ etc. with a total of 12 credits being allocated to this stream across 4 semesters.
5. **Competence Courses:** Skills are Explicitly integrated, highly visible, taught in context and have measurable assessment. The skills include, Language & Communication Creative Thinking, Team Work, Problem solving, Technical, Social, Personal, Professional, Citizenship and other skills. The student shall choose from Language, Skills and Research capabilities with a mandatory 32 credits in 3 Years.
6. **Required Non-credit (Audit) Courses:** The Programs across all schools shall include Required Non-credit courses, as may be prescribed by the University, from time to time.

G. Eligibility for Admissions:

1. The Admission to the University programs is guided by the **entrance test** conducted by the University, termed as Chanakya University Pravesha Pariksha. The University shall consider the Government sponsored and NTA administered CUET, as a qualifying exam for admission to the University. The test shall be followed by a personal interview for determining the eligibility.
2. A candidate who has passed the **two-year Pre-University** examination conducted by the Pre-University Board of Education, Government of Karnataka or any other examination considered



equivalent by the University is eligible for admission to the first Semester of the UG program. The Eligibility criteria may differ from program to program.

3. Lateral entry to the corresponding Degree Programmes from other institutions is **subject to the availability** of seats, provided the credits are transferred and retrieved through the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC).

4. The University shall have an **Academic Equivalence Committee**, comprising of Deans of Schools, Academic Coordinators, Programme Directors or others deemed suitable, to decide on the equivalence of course/s in case of inter-school or inter institution portability of students. It shall examine the content, outcome orientation and assessment to decide on the suitability of credit transfers or program completion.

9. The University shall have an open admission policy to offer admission to any individual upon clearing the eligibility criteria, even to individual courses. However, a student shall be **deemed to be a regular student** of the University, only if they register for courses worth minimum of 16 credits per semester. Scholarships, Hostel accommodation, etc are eligible only to the regular student of the University.

H. Medium of Instruction:

The Medium of Instruction shall **be English**.

I. Glossary:

Semester: A term consisting of 16 weeks (minimum 80 days) of Sessions, with 36-40 hours of guided learning per week.

Academic Year: Two Consecutive (one odd + one even) semesters constitute one academic year.

Discipline: A chosen Domain of learning comprising of related courses and which indicate the Nature of Honours/ program.

Course: The Specific Subject (paper/component) of a programme. They vary in Nature, Quantum, Instructions, Importance, Progression, Evaluation and Credits based on the Expected and Measurable Outcome of the Course.

Credit: A unit by which the Course work/ Learning emphasis/ Teaching Efforts are measured, especially in terms of Lecture/ Lab Sessions/ Tutorials. It determines the number of hours of instructions required per week in a semester.



Grade Point: It is a numerical weight allotted to each letter grade on a 10-point scale.

Credit Point: It is the product of grade point and number of credits for a course.

Letter Grade: It is an index of the performance of students in a said course. Grades are denoted by letters A+, A, B+, B, C+, C and D.

Programme: A programme leading to award of a Degree, Diploma or Certificate.

Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA): It is a measure of performance of work done in a semester. It is the Ratio of Total Credit points secured by a student in various courses registered in a semester and the total course credits taken during that semester. It shall be expressed up to two decimal places.

Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA): It is a measure of cumulative performance of a student at the end of the corresponding exit level. It is expressed up to two decimal places.

Transcript/ Grade Card/ Certificate: Based on the grades earned, a Grade Card shall be issued to all the registered students after every semester. The grade certificate will display the course details, viz, Course Code, Title, Credits, Grade secured, Result, etc.).

J. Attendance:

Students are expected to maintain the 100% attendance to the Classes and curriculum activities and any deviation from the rule, shall require the authorization of the program coordinator and Dean of the School.

K. Change of Course/s:

The Student shall have the freedom to register for an additional course, than the required number of courses (including the Online mode), to seek clarity and understanding regarding the suitability of the Courses/ Program to pursue. If the student wishes Change of Course/s, it shall be effected within Two weeks from the date of commencement of the term (to ensure the fulfilment of the mandatory attendance provision) with the authorization from the Dean. However, the students shall not be allowed to take a course, for which they were not registered.

L. Pedagogy:

The Teaching Learning methods shall be designed to measure the learning outcome in tune with the Vision of the University and Graduate Attributes. The Subject specific, Student driven



methodology shall involve extensive Experiential learning, Case methodology, Immersive projects, blended learning, Self learning activities and other innovative teaching methods.

The methodology shall **consider the diverse profile and learning needs** of the students. The mentors shall facilitate the identification of the need for Bridge/ Modular courses, Effective Peer learning mechanisms, Contextual use of technology tools and Virtual classrooms, distinguished faculty from Industry and Practice with extensive training and workshop for faculty development shall ensure learning through Instruction, Intellect and Inspiration.

M. Assessment:

The Schools shall conduct the student assessment for the Course/ programs offered in line with the Learning outcome. The Formative Assessment and Summative Assessment ratio shall be at 60:40. The various components of the Formative (continuous) Assessment, the methodologies and expected outcome is communicated at the commencement of the Course, by the course faculty.

Formative Assessment for 30% (out of 60%) marks, shall be held by the end of 8th week with the completion of 50% of the syllabus and the **Formative Assessment** for the remaining 30% marks shall be held by the end of 16th week, on the completion of 100% of the syllabus. The FA marks shall be submitted to the Office of the Registrar, within 7 days from the completion of the stated period of their completion.

During the 17th–18th week of the semester, the Summative Assessment shall be conducted by the School as **the Final component of Assessment for 40% marks**.

In case of a student who could not take the Formative Assessments on scheduled date/s due to genuine reasons, such a candidate may appeal to the Program Coordinator/ Dean. The Program Coordinator/ Dean, in consultation with the concerned teacher shall decide the merit of conducting a special test to such candidate on the date fixed by the concerned teacher but before commencement of the concerned Summative Assessment.

The Evaluated assignments of the Formative Assessments are immediately provided to the **candidates** by the concerned teacher and is maintained by the School, which shall be a part of the Academic Audit to be conducted by the Registrar (E), as deemed appropriate.

N. Conduct of Examination:



The Exams shall be conducted by the respective Schools, under the guidance of **Exam committee** headed by the Dean/ Dean's Nominee. The University shall follow a uniform examination calendar, as designed by the office of the Registrar (Evaluation).

Eligibility: All the students registered for specific courses shall be eligible to appear for the Formative and Summative Assessments. Students shall be ineligible to appear for **the Summative Examination**) under the following circumstances, viz, Non qualification in Formative Assessments (< 40%), Withdrawal from the Course, Disciplinary Issues and Medical grounds.

The Student may **pursue a course without the requirement of taking up the Exam**, with the Grade sheet indicating 'Exposed' to such courses, with the letter, 'E'. If the Student changes the Program/ Major along the course of the program, the courses completed and which may not be a part of the Program/ Major, may be treated as Open Elective/s.

The Code of Conduct of the Assessment shall be guided by the Ethics Committee, which shall lay down the rules governing procedures and protocols related to upkeep of the sanctity of examination. Instances of unethical practices, such as deviant behaviour, plagiarism, etc. shall be dealt with the Ethics Committee, on the request of the School Examination Committee.

Guided Learning Programme: The University may conduct a fast-track Guided Learning Programme, to facilitate the eligibility of students to SA, who fail to qualify in the Formative Assessment, under exceptional circumstances.

Re-Registration: The Students failing to qualify in the Guided Learning program to appear for the Make Up assessment or failing to secure 40% marks in the Make Up Assessment, shall Re-register for the Course in the Second Semester to take up Formative Assessment and Summative Assessment in the Course, along the Even Semester.

Dropping the Course: If the Student fails again in either the Formative or Summative Assessment in the re-registered attempt, they shall be advised to Change the Course or Program, as applicable. This shall be a guided academic advice, to facilitate an appropriate career planning for the student.

O. Passing the Exam:

The Student shall be declared to have passed the Course on obtaining a minimum of 40% both in the Formative and Summative Assessments. Student securing less than 40% marks in FA shall be ineligible to write the Summative Assessment and those who score less than 40% in the SA, may take up the makeup assessment, to be held soon after the completion of SA. If the student fails in



the makeup assessment, they shall repeat the course, afresh, in the subsequent semester. They may also exercise the option of dropping/ changing the course, if applicable.

Candidates who fail in lower semester examinations may go to the higher semesters and take the lower semester examinations. However, if the **Course in the higher semester is a progression** on the course taken in the lower semester (E.g: Maths I and Maths II, etc), it shall be mandatory that the student shall qualify in the earlier paper, to be eligible for the next part of the course.

P. Results and Grading:

The Grading systems shall adopt a combination of Absolute and Relative Grading system, wherein the Minimum percentage requirement for passing shall be based upon Absolute Grading system with the limit being 40%. The Results and Ranking shall be based on Relative Grading system. Course/s with an enrolment of up to 30 students shall adopt Absolute Grading.

The Course faculty shall be responsible for uploading the Marks/ Grade in the Learning Management System, as advised and guided by the Office of the Registrar (Evaluation).

Q. Grade Card:

Grade card issued at the end of each semester shall contain the following:

- The credits for each course for that semester.
- The performance in each course is shown by the letter grade obtained.
- The Grade Point Average (GPA) of all the courses for the semester.
- The Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) of all the courses from the first semester.
- The total marks secured by the candidate for each of the courses in which the candidate appeared for the Summative Assessment.
- The Class, Grade, Result and Rank (if applicable)

R. Award of Certificate:

The Student shall be eligible for the award of Certificate, Diploma, UG Degree and UG (Hons) Degree on the successful completion of the Discipline, Open, Foundation and Competence courses along with completion of the internships, projects, fieldtrip, etc., as prescribed by the Scheme of Examinations.

If some candidates exit at the completion of first, second or third year of the four years Undergraduate Programmes, with Certificate, Diploma or the Basic Degree, respectively, then the



results of successful candidates at the end of second, fourth or sixth semesters shall also be classified on the basis of the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA).

Student shall be free to pursue courses/ programs from multiple Institutions/ University apart from Chanakya University. However, they are eligible to get the benefit of being the Students of Chanakya University, only on acquiring a minimum of 50 percent of the prescribed Credits from Courses taken up in Chanakya University.

S. Evaluation/ Revaluation/ Rejection of Results:

The Evaluation of the answer scripts shall be conducted by internal valuator and the student shall have the right to request for the valuated answer scripts. The student can seek a revaluation of the script, with an application to the Dean, who shall assign the script to another expert for revaluation, other than the first valuator. The higher of the marks after the revaluation shall be applicable. However, if the difference of the marks is more than 10 after the revaluation, the script shall be subject to third valuation and an average of the first two marks shall be considered as the final marks. If the marks change to influence the result/ grade, the fee shall be reimbursed to the student.

Make UP Exam: The Student who fails to secure the eligibility marks (minimum 40%), may apply for the Make Up exam, to be held shortly after the SA to clear the course. However, if the student fails to secure the eligible marks of Minimum 40% in the make up exam, they shall have to repeat the Course, afresh, in the next applicable term.

Grade Improvement Option: The Student may seek to improve the results of SA, by withdrawing his SA Marks for specified Course/s, to apply for the Make Up Assessment and the Marks scored in the Make Up Exam shall be considered, as the final marks. This option can be exercised only once for a Course. The student may apply for the improvement option through an application in the prescribed form. Further, the Student who seek Grade Improvement option shall be eligible for Grading and Not for Ranks, if applicable.

T. Grievance Cell:

Every School shall have an academic grievance cell. Students shall report any grievances related to academic matters to the cell. The composition of this cell is as follows:

- Dean (or his/her representative)
- Program Director/ Student Welfare Officer



- One senior faculty member from each Program

The Registrar (Evaluation) shall be the final arbiter for any issue not specifically mentioned in these regulations and is authorised to take the appropriate action for resolution.

U. Additional Learning:

Dual Degree: The University shall facilitate the pursuance of dual degree, where in the student may take up an additional degree along with the one being pursued in the University in the Distance learning mode or Online Mode from the SWAYAM platform. This is subject to the student fulfilling the necessary conditions required for the successful completion of the courses taken in the University.

V. ACADEMIC BANK OF CREDITS (ABC):

The ABC allows for credit redemption through the process of commuting the accrued credits in the Academic Bank Account maintained in the ABC for the purpose of fulfilling the credits requirements for the award of Certificate/ Diploma/Degree by the authorized HEIs. Upon collecting a certificate, diploma or degree, all the credits earned till then, in respect of that certificate, diploma or degree, shall be debited from the account.

The procedure for depositing credits earned, its shelf life, redemption of credits, would be as per UGC (Establishment and Operationalization of ABC scheme in Higher Education) Regulations, 2021. The Equivalence of the credits and eligibility for transfer shall depend on the nature of courses, content and other related aspects, to be determined by the Academic Equivalence committee of the University. The University may enter into MoUs with select Universities/ HEIs in the country and abroad for the facilitation of the same.

W. MOOCs:

The University recognises, The UGC (Credit Framework for Online Learning Courses through SWAYAM) Regulations, 2021 up to 40 per cent of the total courses being offered in a programme in a semester through the SWAYAM platform and shall facilitate the same through proper guidance and quality assurance.

X. National Academic Depository:

The University shall facilitate the entry of the academic records in the National Academic Depository. National Academic Depository (NAD) is a 24X7 online store house of all academic awards viz. certificates, diplomas, degrees, mark-sheets etc. duly digitised and lodged by academic



institutions. Established by the UGC, NAD not only ensures easy access to and retrieval of an academic award but also validates and guarantees its authenticity and safe storage.

Digi Locker aims at 'Digital Empowerment', and the issued documents in Digi Locker system are deemed to be at par with original physical documents as per Rule 9A of the Information Technology (Preservation and Retention of Information by Intermediaries providing Digital Locker facilities) Rules, 2016.





The Regulations Governing PG Programme

(As approved by the Academic Council in a meeting held on 08.12.2022)



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Preamble

Chanakya University aspires to pioneer the vision of NEP '2020 in harnessing the resources of the Technology era with the Wealth of Indian Heritage in the Creation and Dissemination of Knowledge for nurturing Global leaders.

This implies educational outcome as a Conscious realization of an Individual's Character, Culture, Competence with the Curiosity for Creating knowledge for building a Compassionate World'.

The University Vision being, '**Creating Knowledge** and **Transformative Leaders** for **Holistic Development**', the learning outcomes as identified by the graduate attributes of the University are,

These regulations shall be called '**The Regulations Governing the Post Graduate Degree Programmes - 2022-23**'.

5. Integration of **Indian Knowledge Heritage** for a healthy **Civilizational Consciousness**.
6. Curriculum and Methodology with scope for **Experiential, Self and Continuous Learning**.
7. Faculty driven, Student centric and **Outcome oriented Assessment** system.
8. **Credits for Experiential learning** such as Sports, SEVA, Internships and Curated Courses.
9. Course Designed with Social, Technological, Entrepreneurial and Professional perspectives.
10. Education as an Enabler for Entrepreneurship, Employment and Personal Enhancement.

C. Programs:

D. Syllabus:

The syllabus shall be curated by the Dean's Council, a committee of experts, comprising of internal and external experts of the course drawn from the academia and industry. The syllabus is drafted with defined learning objectives and outcomes with details on the methodology, prerequisites of learning, learning resources, desirable teacher attributes and emerging domains of specialization for research and employment. The syllabus shall have adequate component for quantitative elements for analytical skills for professional development.

E. Structure:

1. **Duration:** The 2 Year comprises of 4 semesters. A Semester Comprises of 16 weeks with a minimum of 80 working days.

3. **Required Courses:** The Program includes required Non-credit (Audit) courses, with assessment and appearance in the grade sheet. These courses shall not influence the result, however shall have the grades indicated in the grade sheet.
4. **Fast/ Slow Track:** Students can acquire or drop up to 4 credits/ Semester under the Fast/ Slow track system, enabling them to Shorten/ Extend their term of Study, not lesser than 3 semesters and Not exceeding 5 for the PG Degree Program.
5. **Diploma:** The Student shall have the freedom to exit the program after II semester, with the option of securing a PG Diploma, subject to the condition of acquiring of a mandatory 10 additional Credits based on Internship.
6. **Master's Degree:** The Student shall secure the Master's Degree, on the completion of IV Semesters on acquiring a minimum of 80 credits.
8. **Electives:** The Student can obtain Master's degree with Specialization in a chosen field as an Elective, in the Second Year.
9. **Time Line:** The Student shall have a maximum of 4 Years to complete the PG Degree from the date of registration to the I semester, by using the option of Multiple Exit options.
10. **Re-Entry:** The students who exit with Diploma shall be eligible to re-enter the programme to complete the Master's programme by acquiring the necessary credits. However, such students shall take the exam in the revised course curriculum and syllabus.
11. **Lateral Entry:** Students from other Institutions, shall be allowed admission into programme subject to the approval of the Academic Equivalence Committee. Lateral entry provisions are subjected to conditions that the student shall complete the Master's programme within 4 years from the date of initial (I semester) enrolment.



12. Credit Structure: Credits represent the weightage of a course in terms of Teaching efforts or learning impact measured in Lecture/ Tutorial/ Practical Hours. One credit implies 15 Hours/ Semester and 1 Credit is equivalent to 25 marks in the Semester End Exam. The Table below illustrates the weightage of credits:

F. Course Types:

4. The University shall have an **Academic Equivalence Committee**, comprising of Deans of Schools, Academic Coordinators, Programme Directors or others deemed suitable, to decide on the equivalence of course/s in case of inter-school or inter institution portability of students. It shall examine the content, outcome orientation and assessment to decide on the suitability of credit transfers or program completion.

The students shall not be allowed to take a course, for which they were not registered.

L. Pedagogy:

The Teaching Learning methods shall be designed to measure the learning outcome in tune with the Vision of the University and Graduate Attributes. The Subject specific, Student driven methodology shall involve extensive Experiential learning, Case methodology, Immersive projects, blended learning, Self learning activities and other innovative teaching methods.

M. Assessment:

The Schools shall conduct the student assessment for the Course/ programs offered in line with the Learning outcome. The Formative Assessment and Summative Assessment ratio shall be at 60:40. The various components of the formative (continuous) assessment, the methodologies



and expected outcome is communicated at the commencement of the Program/ Term/ Course, by the course faculty.

The **First test of Formative Assessment (A1)** for 30% marks, shall be held by the end of 8th week with the completion of 50% of the syllabus and the **Second test of Formative Assessment (A2)** for 30% marks shall be held by the end of 16th week, on the completion of 100% of the syllabus.

During the 17th–18th week of the semester, the Summative Assessment Test shall be conducted by the School as **the Final component of assessment (A3) for 40 marks**.

If a student who has failed to attend the A1 or A2, it shall be deemed that the student has dropped the Course. If the student who could not take the test on scheduled date due to genuine reasons, the student may appeal to the Dean. The Dean, in consultation with the concerned teacher shall decide the merit of conducting a special test to such candidate on the date fixed by the concerned teacher but before commencement of the Semester End Examinations.

The Evaluated assignments of the Assessment I (A1) & Assessment II (A2) are provided to the **candidates after obtaining acknowledgement** by the concerned faculty and is maintained by the Dean, to be submitted to the office of the Registrar Evaluation before the commencement of the End Semester Examination.

The marks of the **Continuous Assessments (A1 & A2)**, shall be published on the Notice Board for information of the students. The Formative assessment marks shall be communicated to the Registrar (Evaluation) at least 07 days before the commencement of the Examinations.

Dropping the Course: The Student shall have the option to drop a course, by not taking up the End Semester Examination. The regulations provide the liberty of **pursuing a course without the requirement of taking up the Exam**.

N. Conduct of Examination:

The Exams shall be conducted by the respective Schools, under the guidance of **Exam committee** headed by the Dean. The University shall follow a uniform examination calendar, as designed by the office of the Registrar (Evaluation).

Eligibility: All the students registered for specific courses shall be eligible to appear for the A1, A2 and A3. Students shall be ineligible to appear for **the End Semester Summative Examination (A3)** under the following circumstances, viz, Withdrawal from the Course, Disciplinary Issues and on Health grounds.



O. Passing the Exam:

No candidate shall be declared to have passed the Semester Examination as under each course unless they obtain a minimum of 40% marks in each individual course and the program, including in the Formative Assessment marks.

Candidates who fail in lower semester examinations may go to the higher semesters and take the lower semester examinations. However, if the **Course in the higher semester is a progression** on the course taken in the lower semester (E.g: Maths I and Maths II, etc), it shall be mandatory that the student shall qualify in the earlier paper, to be eligible for the next part of the course.

P. Results and Grading:

The Grading systems shall adopt a combination of both Absolute and Relative Grading system, in a Ten point scale, with the Alpha grades being A+, A, B+, B, C+ and C. Students securing less than 40% shall get the Grade 'D', indicating 'Dropped the Course'.

Q. Grade Card:

Grade card issued at the end of each semester shall contain the following:

- The credits for each course for that semester.
- The performance in each course is shown by the letter grade obtained.
- The Grade Point Average (GPA) of all the courses for the semester.
- The Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) of all the courses from the first semester.
- The total marks secured by the candidate for each of the courses in which the candidate appeared for the Summative Assessment.
- The Class, Grade, Result and Rank (if applicable)

R. Award of Certificate:

The Student shall be eligible for the award of the Diploma/Degree on the successful completion of the course, on the fulfilment of following conditions.

The successful completion of securing a minimum of a CGPA of 5 in the Discipline, Open, Foundation and Competence courses along with internships, projects, fieldtrip, etc., as prescribed by the Scheme of Examinations.

The PG Diploma certificate awarded on the exit after I year of the II year program, shall also be classified on the basis of the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) in the Second Semester.



Student shall be free to pursue courses/ programs from multiple Institutions/ University apart from Chanakya University. However, they are eligible to get the benefit of being the Students of Chanakya University, only on acquiring a minimum of 50 percent of Credits (40), from Courses taken up in Chanakya University.

S. Evaluation/ Revaluation/ Rejection of Results:

The Evaluation of the answer scripts shall be conducted by internal valuator and the student shall have the right to request for the valued answer scripts. The student can seek a revaluation of the script, with an application to the Dean, who shall assign the script to another expert for revaluation. The higher of the marks after the revaluation shall be applicable. However, if the difference of the marks is more than 10 after the revaluation, the script shall be subject to third valuation and an average of the first two marks shall be considered as the final marks. If the marks change to influence the result/ grade, the fee shall be reimbursed to the student.

Student is permitted to reject the result of a Course / Entire examination of any semester. They shall be permitted to appear for the courses in the forthcoming terms. The rejection shall be exercised only once in each semester and the rejection once exercised shall not be revoked. Application for rejection of results along with the payment of the prescribed fee shall be submitted to the Registrar (Evaluation), within 10 days from the date of publication of the result. A Student who rejects the result is eligible for Grading and Not for Ranks, if applicable.

T. Grievance Cell:

Every School shall have an academic grievance cell. Students shall report any grievances related to academic matters to the cell. The composition of this cell is as follows:

- Dean (or his/her representative)
- Program Director/ Student Welfare Officer
- One Senior faculty member from each Program

The Registrar (Evaluation) shall be the final arbiter for any issue not specifically mentioned in these regulations and is authorised to take the appropriate action for resolution.

U. Additional Learning:

Dual Degree: The University shall facilitate the pursuance of dual degree, where in the student may take up an additional degree along with the one being pursued in the University in the



Distance learning mode or Online Mode from the SWAYAM platform, subject to the fulfilment of the necessary conditions for the successful completion of the courses taken in the University.

V. ACADEMIC BANK OF CREDITS (ABC):

The ABC allows for credit redemption through the process of commuting the accrued credits in maintained in the ABC for the purpose of credits requirements for the award of Certificate/ Diploma/Degree by the authorized HEIs.

The procedure for depositing credits earned, its shelf life, redemption of credits, would be as per UGC (Establishment and Operationalization of ABC scheme in Higher Education) Regulations, 2021. The Equivalence of the credits and eligibility for transfer shall be determined by the Academic Equivalence committee of the University.

W. MOOCs:

The University recognises, The UGC (Credit Framework for Online Learning Courses through SWAYAM) Regulations 2021, which allows up to 40 per cent of the total credits offered in a programme in a semester, to be taken online through the SWAYAM platform and shall facilitate the same through proper guidance and quality assurance.

X. National Academic Depository:

The University shall facilitate the entry of the academic records in the National Academic Depository. National Academic Depository (NAD) is a 24X7 online store house of all academic awards viz. certificates, diplomas, degrees, mark-sheets etc. duly digitised and lodged by academic institutions. NAD ensures easy access to and retrieval of an academic award and validates its authenticity. The Documents in Digi Locker system are deemed to be at par with original physical documents as per Rule 9A of the Information Technology (Preservation and Retention of Information by Intermediaries providing Digital Locker facilities) Rules, 2016.





The Regulations Governing Ph.D. Programme
(As approved by the Academic Council in a meeting held on 08.12.2022)



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A. Preamble:

Doctor of Philosophy degree recognises independent research of a Scholar in an **Individual or Multiple (multi-disciplinary)** domains of study, as evidenced by original and novel contribution for theory building through an **Objective and Empirical** process. As Chanakya University envisions Knowledge Creation for Social Transformation, Theoretical, Empirical, Applied and Action research is accorded high priority with a focus on encouraging Inter/ Muti-disciplinary approach in exploring **India rootedness for Global Challenges**.

The following regulation is a guide towards ascertaining the **Standards and Procedures** for the PhD programme of Chanakya University.

B. Title, Application & Commencement:

These shall be called, '**The Regulations Governing Chanakya University Ph.D. Programme – 2023**'. These Regulations are applicable to the Candidates seeking admission to the Ph.D. programs and shall come into force on its approval by the Academic Council and the assent by the office of the Chancellor, Chanakya University.

They Shall come into force from the Academic Year commencing from 2022-23.

C. Centres of Research:

The Doctoral studies shall be undertaken in Schools/ Centres of Chanakya University and Research Institutes/ Organizations of eminence, which are approved by the Competent authorities and recognized as **Research Centres as per the Statutes of the University**.

D. Categories of Research Scholars:

a) **Full Time PhD Scholars:** Scholars who pursue Research in the University or the recognized centres, under the guidance of a Research Supervisor till the **Submission of the Thesis**, as Regular students attending to Research and any other assigned responsibilities.

b) **Part Time PhD Scholars:** A Scholar shall be considered as a Part Time scholar subject to the terms of engagement regarding attendance and assigned responsibilities, as decided by the concerned School Research Committee.

Conversion: The University may permit the conversion of scholars from Full-time to Part-time or vice-versa in respect of registered candidates for valid reasons as recommended by the Doctoral committee subject to the approval of the SRC. **The conversion is allowed only once during the complete period of research subject to a prescribed fee but not allowed**



for those who have already completed (after the Course Work) **One Year as Full Time and Two years as Part Time** research scholars. In case of conversion, the eligibility for Research Fellowship shall be subject to review by the SRC and approval by the VC.

E. Eligibility for Admission:

2 Years Master's degree with an **aggregate of 55%**/ 4 Year UG degree with Professional Qualification, such as BE/ other equivalent, having an **aggregate of 60%**/ Equivalent degree from a Foreign educational institution accredited by an agency, as authorized by the Law of the country.

The University shall encourage scholars **pursuing research in emerging and applied domains**, which may be **Inter/ Trans disciplinary** in nature. Hence, on proven competence, a candidate may be allowed to take up research in an **inter-disciplinary domain, without having the requisite PG/ UG degree** in the stated domain of research.

F. Glossary:

Research: A systematic investigation into specified domains in seeking to establish facts, find solution or to reach new conclusions to contribute to the body of knowledge under the guidance of a nominated supervisor.

Regulations: Procedures guiding the process of executing the PhD program to align with the stated outcome and Vision of the University.

Discipline: A chosen Domain of learning comprising of related courses and which indicate the Nature of the Program.

Multi-Disciplinary: Combining several academic programs or specialisations in addressing a research problem. E.g: Public Policy.

Inter Disciplinary: Domains of study related to More than One discipline with interactive understanding of Concepts. E.g.: Entrepreneurship.

Trans-Disciplinary: Going beyond the boundaries of Disciplines to seek a holistic approach in seeking knowledge or establishing truth. E.g: Bio-Informatics.

CGPA: Cumulative Grade Point Average is a Grading method in a scale of 10, which considers the Average credit points earned on the total courses taken during the program. It is expressed up to two decimal places.



RIC: Research and Innovation Council, the apex body headed by the Vice Chancellor to guide the Policies and Procedures related to Research and Innovation in the University.

SRC: School Research Committee, headed by the Dean of School, in charge of offering the PhD degree programme from the School.

DC: Doctoral Committee is headed by the Research Supervisor, in charge of guiding the research of individual Scholar.

CURE: Chanakya University Research Eligibility Test, conducted by the University to admit eligible candidates for the PhD programme.

JRF: Junior Research Fellowship is the Exam conducted by University Grants Commission and Council for Scientific Industrial Research to determine the eligibility to pursue Research in Institutions across India.

UGC NET/ KSET: National Eligibility Test conducted by the UGC and Karnataka State Eligibility Test conducted at the State level to determine the eligibility to qualify for Teaching positions in UG Institutions.

GATE: Graduate Aptitude Test in Engineering, conducted by the IISC and IITs, to test the understanding in Engineering and Science subjects to test the eligibility for PG programs and admission to select PSUs in India.

Supervisor: A Regular Qualified faculty (either through PhD or Practice), of the University, who shall guide an individual scholar towards the completion of the PHD Programme. Also called Research Guide.

Course Work: The One Year preparatory program to be undertaken by the Scholars, before the commencement of the Research, comprising of courses related to research methods and the domain under study, including Computer skills.

Course: The Specific Subject (paper/component) of a programme. They vary in Nature, Quantum, Instructions, Importance, Progression, Evaluation and Credits based on the Expected and Measurable Outcome of the Course.

Credit: A unit by which the Course work/ Learning emphasis/ Teaching Efforts are measured, especially in terms of Lecture/ Lab Sessions/ Tutorials. It determines the number of hours of instructions required per week in a semester.



Formative Assessment: Continuous Formal and Informal procedures to assess learning and adapt measures to improve learning effectiveness. These are Student, Course and Faculty centric measures.

Summative Assessment: Methods to summarize the Students' learning in a course at the end of the term. This is executed along with Formative Assessment methods.

Colloquium: A periodic academic seminar conducted by the Doctoral Committee to assess the progress of Research of the scholar to review progress and suggest changes for incorporation or identify unique propositions.

Synopsis: A Brief summary of the Research work inclusive of the Statement, Objectives, Hypotheses and outcome of the research. The thesis in a nutshell.

Plagiarism: Wrongful representation of other's ideas, expressions and thoughts in the thesis, without due acknowledgement against academic integrity and ethics.

Viva Voce: Defence of the Research work or progress by the Scholar through an Interactive presentation before an invited audience including the Supervisor and others.

IPR: Intellectual Property Rights refers to the intangible creations of human intellect, including Ideas, Thoughts and Concepts that may be owned by the creator and cannot be used by others without due acknowledgement or process.

INFLIBNET: Information and Library Network Services is an Inter University centre of the UGC to promote and facilitate Library and Information resource sharing for furthering Knowledge and Research among Higher Education.

G. Duration of the Programme:

The Ph.D. programme shall be for a minimum duration of 3/4 Years for Full Time/ Part Time scholars, including Course Work and a Maximum duration of 5/6 years for FT/ PT Scholars from the date of Admission to the Program. Any extension beyond the above limits will be through a process of re-registration, as governed by the relevant Academic Statutes/ Ordinances of the University. Persons with Disabilities (Divyaangs of more than 40%), may be allowed a relaxation of additional 2 years and Women candidates shall be eligible for maternity leave as per the Government regulations.



H. Procedure for admission:

The University shall notify the total number of seats available for the Doctoral program for the academic Year, for specific disciplines based on the availability of Supervisors.

The University shall admit Scholars through a Personal Interview on qualifying in the Chanakya University Research Eligibility (CURE) Test or UGC/ CSIR Junior Research Fellowship (JRF) or National Eligibility Test (NET) or Karnataka State Eligibility Test (KSET) or a Score of 600 and above in the Graduate Aptitude Test in Engineering (GATE). These Tests results shall have Two Year validity from the Date of announcement.

The CURE is a 100 marks test, comprising of Multiple Choice and Descriptive questions, with the syllabus consisting of 50% on Research Aptitude, Digital Skills, etc. and 50% on the Subject of Research. **Students securing 50% marks are eligible** to be called for the Interview.

The University shall decide on the number of candidates to be called for the interview, which shall carry **50 Marks**, based on the seats available for the program. The selection shall be based on an assessment with a **weightage of 70% for the Written test and 30% for the Personal Interview**.

Eligibility may not necessarily mean Enrolment to the program, as the admission for the program is subject to the number of Research Supervisors and other applicable facilities.

Notification: The University shall notify the details of admission to the program, in the institutional website and through advertisement in at least One National and One Regional publication, which shall include, the criteria for Eligibility, the Procedure for admission, the List of Supervisors and Expertise, Examination centre/s and other related information.

The University shall publish the list of Supervisors (Name, Designation, School/ Centre) along with the details of the registered Scholar, topic of the Research and Date of admission on the Website, www.chanakyauniversity.edu.in to be updated every academic year.

The Eligibility Test shall be conducted at the University/ Selected Centres and/or in the online mode, based on requirement and suitability.

The School Research Committee shall constitute Interview Boards based on the Domains of research comprising Supervisors and distinguished Industry experts. The Interview shall consider the Research aptitude of the Scholar, the relevance of the topic of study and the resources available in the University/ Centres.



I. Recognition of Supervisors:

Regular Faculty of Chanakya University shall be eligible to be Research Supervisor. Professors, Associate Professors and Assistant Professors, with 3 years Post PhD Teaching experience (which may be relaxed for Faculty with excellent research experience of 5 years or more, as evidenced by Publications, Projects, Consultancy, Training, other) of the University/ Research centres, shall be considered eligible to be appointed as Research supervisor.

A Professor/ Associate Professor of Practice of Chanakya University, with exceptional record of Professional Practice/ Research/ Projects/ Innovation/ Consultancy / Publications or other evidences of Academic excellence shall be considered as Eligible for being Research Supervisor, on the approval of Board of Studies, as recommended by the SRC.

Co-Supervisor: In case of topics which are Multi/ Inter-disciplinary, requiring multiple perspectives, the School may appoint a Co-Supervisor from within/outside the University, based on Industry/ Professional expertise on approval by AC as recommended by SRC.

A Professor/ Associate Professor/ Assistant Professor can guide a maximum of 8/6/4 scholars at a given time as Supervisor. **Research Supervisor cannot increase the number of scholars under guidance by using recognition from multiple Universities/ Institutions.**

Faculty may be allowed to take research Scholars for Supervision till the age of Superannuation at 65 years. However, for Professors/ Professionals with exceptional credentials, the SRC may recommend Supervisorship, beyond the age of superannuation, subject to the approval of the Academic Council.

Change of Supervisor: A Change of supervisor may be effected due to institutional Separation/ Indisposition/ Incompatibility, affecting academic interface between the Supervisor and the Scholar. The Change in the supervisor, is subject to the approval of the office of the VC on the recommendations of the SRC.

J. The Functions of the Supervisor/ Co-Supervisor

The Supervisor/ Co-Supervisor be responsible for guiding Research, facilitate Professional learning and mentoring the Holistic development of the Scholar in alignment with the vision of the University.

K. Course Work:



Course work is a **Mandatory preparatory course for PhD** for both Full Time and Part Time candidates administered by the School Research Council. The appropriate courses to enhance the Domain knowledge and Research skill of the Scholar shall be decided by the SRC, within a band of 16 - 20 credits. The Scholars may be allowed to pursue Online courses as part of the Course work, **up to 40% of the given credits of the Course work.**

Further, during the PhD programme, the Scholars shall be required to take up Credit based (2-4) course in **Teaching/ Education/ Pedagogy** and Professionals from the Industry shall be required to take up course on **IPR/ Innovation Management/ Entrepreneurship.** These Courses do not form a part of the Course Work. These mandates may be exempted to scholars who possess such qualifications or are experts in these domains as established by the School Research Committee.

The Candidates must complete their course-work **within a period of 18 months** from the date of confirmation of Ph.D. Registration. Failure to complete the Course-work within the stipulated period shall entail automatic cancellation of registration. Under exceptional circumstances, the office of the Vice Chancellor **may grant an extension of 06 months**, on the recommendations of the SRC.

The Course work papers shall be evaluated for 100 marks **with 60% Formative and 40% Summative Assessment ratio.** The School Research Committee shall conduct the course work examination and submit the statement of marks along with the Grade sheet to the office of the Registrar (Evaluation) within a Week, for the announcement of the Results.

The Scholar has to obtain a **minimum Grade of C (50%)** in the course work to be eligible to continue in the programme.

The Absolute Grading system is indicated as given below,

L. Scholarship:

The Ph.D. Scholars, who are not in receipt of any Scholarship or Fellowships may be considered for the award for Scholarship for the Doctoral program based on Criteria suggested by the School Research Committee and approved by the Research & Innovation Council. This is specially to recognize and encourage exceptional research, in tune with the University's vision of Knowledge creation and Leadership. The Scholarships, with a periodic review, shall be subject to the guidelines published by the University, from time to time.

M. Study Leave:

Full Time Scholars are permitted to avail study leave on following grounds:

Visit/ Internships at Institutions/ Industry: The PhD scholar is encouraged to participate in active research environments, during the PhD programme with a stay of 1-6 months at a Foreign/Indian research institutions relevant to the Research domain, as approved by the Research Advisory Council.

Research Expeditions: These form a part of experiential learning in research related domains, ranging 1 to 3 months, such as internship in National/International Research Laboratories or Centres of Excellence. The approval for the Nature and duration of expedition shall be at the discretion of the SRC, on the recommendations of the Research Supervisor.

Exchange/ Sponsorship Programs: The Scholars may avail of various Scholarships/ Fellowships/ etc. offered by Institutions/ Governments/ Agencies/ others and on selection, may be permitted to proceed on Research expedition/ exchange programs for which the fellowship is awarded. Such period may be considered as part of the PhD program and delays, if any, due to such expeditions shall be condoned.

N. Research Committees and Functions:

The University shall set up three distinct bodies related exclusively for the conduct and promotion of Research. They include,

The Research & Innovation Council (RIC):

Headed by the Vice Chancellor, it shall include the Dean of Research along with distinguished researchers co-opted from the Industry and Academia as external members, for the formulation of Research Policy and Guidelines for the University. The Council shall strive to foster a Culture of Research among Students & Faculty along with Global collaboration.



The School Research Committee (SRC):

Established at the School level, the council is convened by the Dean of the School and shall have the Dean of Research along with Professors and Research Supervisors of the School. The SRC shall have the primary responsibility of offering and guiding the Doctoral Program in line with the stated vision of the University.

The Specific Responsibilities of the committee include,

- Design, Schedule and Offering the Doctoral research program
- Identification of Research Supervisors and Co-Supervisors with Domain expertise
- Selection, Conduct and Evaluation of the Course work and Eligibility for Scholars
- Identification of Domain experts for inclusion in the Panel of Experts.
- Fostering Research of Inter/ Multi / Transdisciplinary and Applied in Nature
- Aligning the Research Outcome with the Vision of the University
- Promoting Collaborative Research orientation with global institutions and scholars
- Seeking to establish a bench mark in Research and Innovation through IPRs.

The Doctoral Committee (DC):

The Research Supervisor of the scholar shall be the Convener of this Council. The Doctoral Committee shall be constituted upon the assignment of the Scholar to the supervisor and it shall comprise of the Dean of the School, the Research Supervisor, Co-supervisor and not more than 3 domain Experts/ Practitioners from the Industry/ Profession.

The **Committee** shall have the following responsibilities:

- Review the research proposal and finalize the Topic of research;
- Guide the Scholar to develop the Design and Methodology of research.
- Encouraging the Scholar to attain highest standards in Research outcome
- Suggest Commendation/Continuation/Cancellation of registration based on Review.
- Above all, To Ensure the highest possible Quality & Ethical standards in Research.

The **Doctoral Committee Meeting** shall be conducted as and when required, but not less than Twice in a year. The Nature and Frequency of the Meeting, assessment of Progress, review of Research and other related matters shall be at the discretion of the Committee.

O. Submission of Synopsis:



Candidate shall present a Synopsis as Pre-thesis submission in the School for feedback and comments, which may be suitably incorporated on the advice of the Supervisor.

The synopsis submission must accompany a suggested panel of examiners (for Evaluation and Viva) of the thesis, as suggested by the Research Supervisor on approval by the SRC.

P. The Submission of Thesis:

The Draft thesis shall be submitted within 3 months' period from the date of submission of the Synopsis. The candidate should submit Four copies of the thesis in person along with virus-free soft copy. The hard and soft copies must be exactly same. Thesis, in the prescribed format, must be signed by the Research Supervisor (Co-supervisor, if included in the Ph.D. registration) and forwarded by SRC. Any publication resulted from the Ph.D. work may also be submitted along with the thesis for onward transmission to the Examiners.

The thesis shall be submitted together with an originality report produced by a prescribed antiplagiarism software application. The supervisor (and co-supervisor, if any) shall receive an originality report on the whole text of the thesis and shall take this report into account in the evaluation on the submission.

Note: Avoiding plagiarism and other forms of academic misconduct in the authorship of the thesis remains the sole responsibility of the researcher. If the Research Supervisor (or Co-Supervisor) suspects plagiarism, he or she may ask for an investigation.

The Academic Council shall evolve a mechanism using well-developed software and gadgets to detect plagiarism and other forms of academic dishonesty. While submitting for evaluation, the thesis shall have an undertaking from the research scholar and a certificate from the Research Supervisor attesting to the originality of the work. The similarity shall not exceed 10% excluding own publications, Literature review and the List of References.

Q. Board of Examiners:

A Panel of Six (6) External Examiners from India and abroad in the rank of Associate Professors and above, shall be provided at the time of Synopsis submission by the Research Supervisor, for adjudicating the Thesis. The Research Supervisor shall submit a different panel of examiners for each candidate, when two or more theses are submitted within a period of 6 months.



R. Adjudication:

The Registrar Evaluation shall take all the necessary measure for the adjudication of the thesis, conduct of the Viva voce, declaration of result and Issuance of certificate.

The Report of the Examiner shall include all aspects of the Research work including Suggestions, Recommendations and Unique propositions of the work.

If both the examiners have recommended for the award of Ph.D., the candidate shall be permitted to take the public viva-voce. If one examiner recommends against the award of Ph.D., the thesis will be referred to a Third examiner (third examiner) for adjudication. If two examiners recommend against the award of Ph.D. Degree, the thesis will be rejected.

S. The Public Viva Voce Exam:

The viva-voce examination is based, among other things, on the critiques given in the evaluation report, shall be conducted by the Research Supervisor and at least one of the two external examiners and shall be open to be attended by Members of the Doctoral Committee, faculty, research scholars and the invited audience.

A satisfactory performance in the viva-voce is compulsory. If a scholar fails in the viva-voce examination, the scholar shall be allowed to re-appear after 3 months from the date of first viva-voce before a panel constituted for this purpose. If the candidate fails again, the candidature for Ph.D. Degree will be rejected.

T. Innovation:

If the PhD research constitutes potential for innovation for the protection of Intellectual Property Rights (IPRs), the Scholar with the consent of the Supervisor, may request that the submitted dissertation be treated discreetly before the thesis is submitted for assessment, until the defence/viva-voce.

The IPR Cell or the competent body of the university designated for the purpose shall conduct the procedure for legal and commercial protection of research results, in accordance with the relevant Regulations. In this case, the public defence can be extended, by not later than a Year, from the day of commencement of the procedure of evaluation of the thesis, on producing the Certificate of Technology Transfer from the competent authority.

U. Consolidated Recommendation:



If the candidate passes the viva-voce examination, then the two-member (Examiner and Supervisor) board shall consolidate the recommendations for the award of Ph.D. Degree based on the reports of adjudication of the thesis. The consolidated recommendations are submitted to The Registrar (Evaluation), along with other documents, as may be required by the University, which shall be placed before the Academic Council for approval. The Ph.D. degree for will be awarded in Convocation either in person or in absentia.

V. Award of Research Degree:

The Ph.D. degree will be awarded in the specified Disciplinary or Inter/ Multi/ Trans Disciplinary or in an Unexplored domain of study by the University.

Issuing a Provisional certificate: Prior to the actual award of the degree, the University shall issue a provisional certificate to the effect that the Degree has been awarded in accordance with the provisions of the Chanakya University Regulations and UGC guidelines.

W. Publication of the Thesis:

The Thesis awarded by the University could be published as a Whole or in Parts, on the recommendation of the Examiners and with the prior permission of the University. A Copy of the thesis as a book shall be submitted to the University Library.

X. Depository with INFLIBNET/Institutional Electronic Archive:

Following the successful completion of the evaluation process the University shall submit an electronic copy of the Ph.D. thesis to the INFLIBNET/Institutional Electronic Archive, for universal access and dissemination.

Y. Code of Ethics:

The PhD shall be governed by the Code of Ethics comprising of well laid procedure for handling allegations of misconduct or plagiarism in research. The University shall conduct regular training sessions on '**Academic & Research Ethics**' for the benefit of aal concerned.

Z. Cancellation or Revocation of Cancellation of the Registration:

The requests for the Cancellation or the Revocation of Cancellation of Ph.D. registration shall be forwarded solely by the School Research Committee whose final decision rests with the Academic Council.

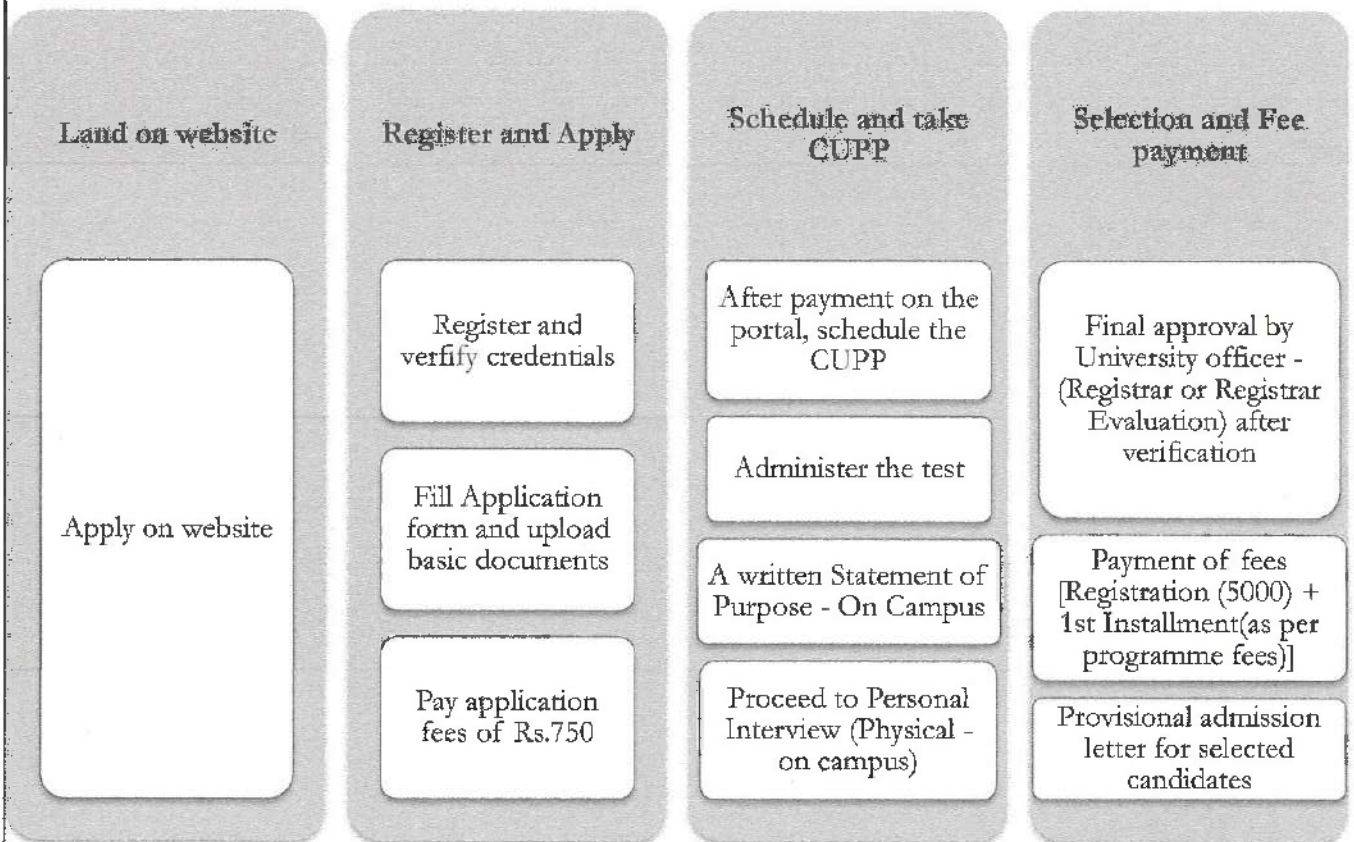

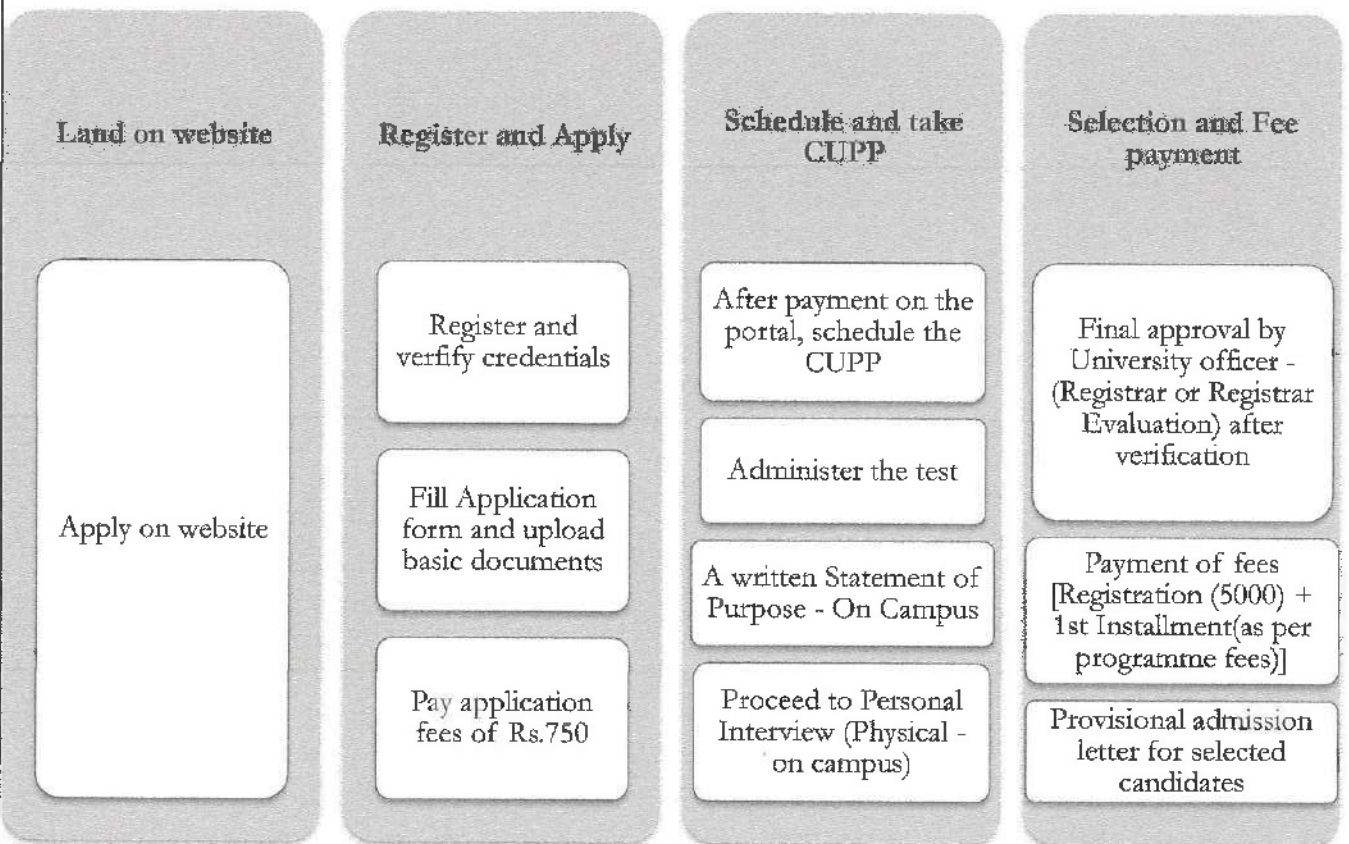

Prof Yashavantha Dongre, Vice Chancellor, Chanakya University warmly welcomed the Chairman and Members and assured full cooperation and assistance to the committee to enable it to function effectively and introduced all to Dr. Justice N Kumar and Members and expressed his gratitude to the Chairman and members for accepting the invitation of the University.

The Chairman of the Committee then requested Shri Sujiban Ghosh, member secretary, to take up agenda items for discussion. Both Shri Sujiban Ghosh, member secretary and Prof Yashavantha Dongre, Vice Chancellor, started the discussion with elaborate presentation of the background of Chanakya University





its formation under "The Chanakya University Act, 2021 (Karnataka Act No. 37 of 2021) of the Government of Karnataka. It received the assent of Government of Karnataka on 11.10.2021, Parliamentary affairs & Legislation Secretariat Notification No: DPAL 44 SHASANA 2021, Bengaluru, dated 11.10.2021 and commenced its operation effective from 05.03.2022.

Fees for the years 2022-23 and 2023-24 were earlier proposed and approved through the Board of Management to cater to the ongoing admission process. In compliance with section 44 of The Chanakya University Act, 2021, Fee Regulation Committee was constituted at the 3rd meeting of Board of Governors held on March 28, 2023, and subsequently, the constitution of the Committee was notified on February 25, 2023.

Prof Yashavantha Dongre, Vice Chancellor gave a detailed introduction through power point presentation on the history of the institution, courses offered for the year 2022-23 and 2023-24, strength of the students, manpower and facilities provided in the aforesaid University and management structure of the University. He briefed the members about the University, the status of infrastructure being built up in the global campus and various kinds of career centric courses being offered in diverse disciplines. He also mentioned the various research activities being undertaken in the campus including interdisciplinary research. During the deliberation, he also mentioned various scholarship schemes being offered to the students based on criteria.

Presently, for the academic year 2022-23, the university has the 4 years honours graduate and post graduate programmes under the following 3 schools: -

- a) School of Commerce & Management
- b) School of Arts, Humanities & Social Sciences
- c) School of Mathematics and Natural Sciences

Future plans: -

- a) Flagship management programme MBA and MCA will be launched from the next academic year: 2023-24
- b) Flagship Law programmes including courses on public policy will be launched from the next academic year 2023-24 with graduate and post graduate programmes.
- c) Flagship engineering programmes will be launched from the academic year 2024-25
- d) Present student strength is around 116, which is estimated to touch almost 10,000 students in the academic year: 2029-30





Shri Sujiban Ghosh, member secretary, explained to the members the mandate of the Committee u/s 44(2) of The Chanakya University Act, 2021, details of which are as follows: -

1. The University is to prepare its tuition fee structure and send it for approval of the committee constituted for the purpose. The fee in respect of the admissions of engineering students made through Common Entrance Examination conducted by the State Government, shall be fixed by the State Government.
2. The Committee shall consider the fees structure of all the courses prepared by the University, if it is satisfied that the proposed fee is sufficient for generating resources for meeting the recurring expenditure of the University, savings required for further development of the University and not unreasonably excessive.
3. In term of section 44, Chanakya University appointed a Committee of Experts vide notification dated 25.02.2023 for approving the fee structure. **Fee structure for the year 2022-23 and 2023-24 is placed for ratification.**

Shri Sujiban Ghosh made a presentation on the methodology adopted for arriving at the Unit cost of Education & the various assumptions made therein. He explained that the cost has been arrived at after considering all relevant items of expenditure and the possible escalation in expenses in the future years. He mentioned that the cost has been worked out separately for various disciplines & the courses being offered. The projections of cost were provided year-wise for all the constituent institutions offering different courses. The presentation explained the methodology by which the Total Unit Cost per course has been arrived at which included the following.

1. Unit Cost of education for each course
2. Assumptions made on the computation of unit cost.
3. Student strength and duration of different courses
4. Cost of Funds employed (own)
5. Projected Capital Expenditure on various infrastructure projects that are being undertaken to upgrade the existing infrastructure as well as to create state of the art facilities which are funded through philanthropic contribution from donors.

Discussion on the Computation:

SOURCES OF FUNDING: -

- a) Net Operating Tuition Fees





- b) Philanthropic contribution from donors for university project
- c) Revenue from Chairs derived out of contributions.
- d) Hostel Income (Considered at net amount after deducting expenses)
- e) Interest Income on Investments

SOURCING OF DATA AND INFORMATION (All data have been reported in Rs lakhs, wherever applicable, unless otherwise stated)

- a) The computation of unit cost is based on the provisional financial for FY 2022-23 and estimation for projected financial for FY 2023-24 to FY 2029-30
- b) The cost of education is computed based on the year-wise projected student numbers and the projected costs.
- c) Operating expenses have been considered based on the activity of each school with increase of 5% to 10% based on the nature of expense for the years 2023-24 to 2029-30.
- d) Depreciation is calculated on written down value method as per Schedule VI of Companies Act, considering the fixed asset requirement for the entire course.

The operating costs are segregated under following broad heads: -

- a) Staff payment & benefits
- b) Academic expenses
- c) Fee Concession / Scholarship
- d) Research expenses
- e) Administrative & General expenses
- f) Admission & Outreach
- g) Branding costs
- h) Repairs & Maintenance
- i) Depreciation as per Companies Act

COMPUTATION OF FACULTY NUMBERS AND COSTS: -

Salary costs of Faculty and other staff :-

- For FY 2023-24, faculty student ratio is considered at 1:15 to cater to requirement for next year in view of introduction of new programmes.
- From FY 2024-25 onwards, faculty student ratio is revised at 1:25. However, for engineering courses, it is considered at 1:20 in line with AICTE guidelines.
- Following table depicts CTC which is considered for computing salary costs of faculty with 5% increase on YoY basis. CTC was calculated on the basis of 7th Pay Basic: -

The above-mentioned CTC was applied for applied for all except for Engineering, details of which are explained in separate slides under the presentation for School of Engineering.

- Recruitment of Non-Teaching staff is considered from 2024-25 as this will be required mainly for School of Engineering.
- Number of positions for Management & other support staff are based on the expected strength as furnished for FY 2023-24 as it is anticipated that there will be no more major recruitment drive in this segment.

Other Assumptions on costs of education for the year 2023-24:

- Scholarship:** It is assumed that 24% of the budgeted student strength will be eligible for scholarship. Average scholarship amount varies based on the programmes and fee structure. Chanakya University also invites scholarship under the Government of India scheme.
- Early Bird Scheme (EBD) :-** This is offered as Rs 5000/- per student for those getting admission within April 30, 2023.
- Housekeeping Expenses:** This is assumed to be Rs 3/- per unit on the constructed area of 568,135 sq. ft





- d) **Electricity Charges:** This is considered at the blended rate of Rs 6.75/- per unit. Unit consumption is arrived at after considering 0.25 units / day for 365 days.
- e) **Water charges:** It is assumed at 50 Ltr portable water + 200 Ltr per student for utilities.
- f) **Admission expenses & Branding:** The details were estimated under different heads for Rs 408.92 lakhs and Rs 85.30 lakhs respectively.
- g) **Learning & Development costs:** Total cost allocated by HR for FY 2023-24 is Rs 8 lakhs, out of which, Rs 4 lakhs will be spent in the month of June 2023 and the balance in the month of Nov-23.
- h) **Staff Recruitment expenses:** The budgeted amounts are estimated at Rs 59 lakhs under various heads of activities.
- i) **Insurance:** Property insurance is considered @ Rs 300/- per student and Student Medicare is considered @ Rs 1300/- per student, totalling to Rs 1600/- per student.
- j) Cost of funds has been computed @11% on total projected yearly revenue from the year 2023-24.
- k) **Research expenses:** This is based on the input received from Research division for Rs 162 lakhs under various the following categories:

Basis of allocation of costs to different schools for the year 2023-24:-

- a) Academic costs are allocated based on input received from different schools for FY 2023-24, and for the years 2024-25 onwards, this is computed based on revenue generation for each school. There are some common costs which are allocated between schools based on revenue generation for each school.
- b) Faculty salary costs for the year 2023-24 have been allocated directly to respective schools as per computation based on regulatory norms for each course.
- c) All other expenses: office & general expenses, research expenses, sports activities admission & branding costs, repairs & maintenance and depreciation are allocated based on revenue generation each school.





- d) For schools requiring laboratories, infrastructure, and other major set up, the relevant costs and depreciation are separately allocated to these schools. Cost of funds has been allocated based on revenue for each school.

Yearly Intake and student strength:

- e) Actual student strength for the current year 2022-23 is 116. From the year 2023-24, student strength was projected to be 916 based on admission pattern and keeping in mind the projected student strength assumed to be around 10,000 in the year 2029-30 and further.
- f) Increase in Fee structure by an average 5% on YoY basis. Fee structure for all the courses is kept low to cater to those students with merit but having inadequate financial resources. Fee structure for existing students remains the same throughout the duration of the course. In addition, the university offers several scholarship schemes to take care of students getting admitted on merit-cum-means basis. For computing school-wise revenue, amounts receivable through grant / donation have not been considered as there is element of uncertainty in nature. However, at university level, these have been projected.
- g) Reasonable and affordable hostel Income is computed. Increase in hostel fees is assumed to be 5% on YoY basis. Increased hostel fee is applicable to all the students, new as well as the existing students.
- h) Comparative Fees Structure of various other Universities was provided for the committee's information as discussed in the previous meeting. The committee has taken note of the same.

Fixed Assets are valued at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation on fixed asset is provided on written down value method at the following rates as per Schedule VI of the Companies Act: -

In view of the above launching of new programmes, substantial increase in student intake over the years and increased faculty and staff strength, establishment of adequate infrastructure will be of paramount importance. In this regard, construction of the university's global campus at Devanahalli is under way which is expected to be completed in 8 years' time. The construction will be carried out in 4 phases, e.g. Phase 1A, 1B, 1C and 1D covering the following: -

- a) Administration & Library Block
- b) 3 Academic Blocks
- c) Food Court
- d) Girls' hostel and Boys' hostel
- e) Faculty housing
- f) Guest house
- g) Sports institute

Observations and Recommendation of the Committee

The Committee has observed the following: -

- a) Fee structure for humanities courses should be slightly lower as compared to science & commerce programmes. There should be differentiation between UG and PG fee structure.
- b) Non-Teaching and Non-Technical staff strength should be reduced as per the requirement over a period.
- c) Fee Regulation Committee meeting should be held at least 3-4 months; prior to the date of annual commencement of admissions. This should be followed by at least 3 meetings to review and approve the fee structure for the forthcoming academic year.

Prof Yashavantha Dongre, Vice Chancellor, Chanakya University warmly welcomed the Chairman and Members and assured full cooperation and assistance to the committee to enable it to function effectively and introduced all to Dr. Justice N Kumar and Members and expressed his gratitude to the Chairman and members for accepting the invitation of the University.

Confirmation of the Minutes of the 1st meeting of Fee Regulation Committee

The minutes of the 1st meeting of the Fee Regulation Committee were approved by the Committee.





Review of Action Taken on Decisions during 1st Meeting of the Fee Regulation Committee

The Committee reviewed the actions taken for the decisions taken during the 1st meeting of the Fee Regulation Committee.

The Committee was apprised on the following programmes: -

For the initial academic year 2022-23, the university had the 4 years honours graduate and 2 years' post graduate programmes under the following 3 schools: -

- a) School of Commerce & Management
- b) School of Arts, Humanities & Social Sciences
- c) School of Mathematics and Natural Sciences

Academic Year : 2023-24 and Future Plans:--

- a) Flagship management programmes MBA and MCA have been launched from the academic year: 2023-24
- b) Flagship Law programmes including course on public policy have been launched from the academic year 2023-24 with graduate and post graduate programmes.
- c) Flagship engineering programmes will be launched from the academic year 2024-25
- d) Present student strength is around 510, which is estimated to touch almost 8,000 students in the academic year: 2032-33

Shri Sujiban Ghosh, member secretary, explained to the members the mandate of the Committee u/s 44(2) of The Chanakya University Act, 2021, details of which are as follows: -

1. The University is to prepare its tuition fee structure and send it for approval of the committee constituted for the purpose. The fee in respect of the admissions of engineering students made through Common Entrance Examination conducted by the State Government, shall be fixed by the State Government.
2. The Committee shall consider the fees structure of all the courses prepared by the University, if it is satisfied that the proposed fee is sufficient for generating resources for meeting the recurring expenditure of the University, savings required for further development of the University and not unreasonably excessive.
3. In term of section 44, Chanakya University appointed a Committee of Experts for approving the fee structure. The proposed Fee Structure for the year 2024-25 is placed for Committee's approval.





4. The Committee welcomed Shri CA Deenadayal as a member of the university's Fee Regulation Committee.

Shri Sujiban Ghosh made a presentation on the methodology adopted for arriving at the Unit cost of Education & the various assumptions made therein. He explained that the cost has been arrived at after considering all relevant items of expenditure and the possible escalation in expenses in the future years. He mentioned that the cost has been worked out separately for various disciplines & the courses being offered. The projections of cost were provided year-wise for all the schools offering different courses. The presentation explained the methodology by which the Total Unit Cost per course has been arrived at which included the following.

1. Unit Cost of education for each course over a span of 8 years (Actual for the year 2022-23, Provisional for the year 2023-24 and projection for 2024-25 to 2034-35)
2. Assumptions made on the computation of unit cost.
3. Student strength and duration of different courses
4. Projected Capital Expenditure on various infrastructure projects that are being undertaken to upgrade the existing infrastructure as well as to create state of the art facilities which are funded through philanthropic contribution from donors.

Discussion on the Computation:

SOURCES OF FUNDING: -

- a) Net Operating Tuition Fees
- b) Philanthropic contribution from donors for university project
- c) Revenue from Chairs derived out of contributions.
- d) Hostel Income (Considered at net amount after deducting expenses)
- e) Interest Income on Investments.

SOURCING OF DATA AND INFORMATION (All data have been reported in Rs lakhs, wherever applicable, unless otherwise stated)

- a) The computation of average unit cost is based on the provisional financial for FY 2022-23 and estimation for projected financial for FY 2023-24 to FY 2029-30
- b) The cost of education is computed based on the year-wise projected student numbers and the projected costs.





- c) Operating expenses have been considered based on the activity of each school with increase of 5% to 10% based on the nature of expense for the years 2023-24 to 2029-30.
- d) Depreciation is calculated on written down value method as per Schedule VI of Companies Act, considering the fixed asset requirement for the entire course.

The operating costs are segregated under following broad heads: -

- a) Staff payment & benefits
- b) Academic expenses
- c) Fee Concession / Scholarship
- d) Research expenses
- e) Administrative & General expenses
- f) Admission & Outreach
- g) Branding costs
- h) Repairs & Maintenance
- i) Depreciation as per Companies Act

COMPUTATION OF FACULTY NUMBERS AND COSTS: -

Faculty salary costs were computed based on the following regulatory parameters: -

In computation of faculty numbers, we have considered the following composition: -

Salary costs of Faculty and other staff:-

- a) Presently, Faculty student ratio is going towards 1:12 from 1:8 through efficient mobilisation of resources, efforts are being made to reach FSR at 1:15 through the following measures: -
 - ✓ Reduction in the number of majors
 - ✓ Enhance Cross List programmes at all levels.
 - ✓ Decrease unique credits / major.





- b) Faculty includes Full time employees + Adjunct / Contractual + Teaching Assistants.
c) Following table depicts CTC which is considered for computing salary costs of faculty with 5% increase on YoY basis. CTC was calculated based on 7th Pay Basic: -

Professor	Rs 1.75 lakhs to Rs 3 lakhs p.m.
Associate Professor	Rs 1.25 lakhs to Rs 1.75 lakhs p.m.
Assistant Professor	Rs 0.75 lakhs to Rs 1.25 lakhs p.m.

- d) The above-mentioned CTC was applied for all except for Engineering, details of which are explained in separate slides under the presentation for School of Engineering.
e) Average CTC for Adjunct / Contractual faculty is considered at Rs 9,60,000/- p.a. with 5% escalation on YoY basis.
f) Recruitment of Non-Teaching staff is considered from 2024-25 as this will be required mainly for School of Engineering.
g) Number of positions for Management & other support staff are based on the expected strength as furnished for FY 2023-24 and availability of further input from concerned departments for additional staff requirement in this category.

Other Assumptions on costs of education:

- ✓ Academic expenses have been projected based on student numbers and the prevalent rates per student per year for each academic and pastoral activities with cost inflation of 5%, both for Non-Engineering and Engineering separately.
- ✓ Scholarship amount has been projected as 10% of academic receipts for 2024-25 and thereafter @ 5% on academic receipts.
- ✓ Cost of Library books and e-resources (for non-engineering) is computed as follows: -
 - a) 100 Titles per program and 500 volumes per program. We have 19 programs. Hence total 500*19. This is AICTE Norm.
 - b) E-Resources with renewal of subscription for online databases, print journals, newspapers & magazines, AMCs for RFID, Institutional memberships, e.g., Delnet, IIMB etc.
- ✓ Admission & branding expenses have been considered based on multifarious marketing and branding activities, with cost inflation @ 5% on YoY basis.
- ✓ All the administrative costs and facility costs have been derived based on detailed calculation in alignment with Administration team.





- ✓ Research expenses are based on 5% on the revenue level. On an average, it is Rs 2 to Rs 2.50 lakhs p.a. per faculty.
- ✓ HR costs projection and the projection relating to number of management & support staff were done based on input from concerned departments and subsequent discussion for cost optimisation.
- ✓ Interest on term loan has been considered @ 11% (Subject to negotiation for the lower rate) and repayment of term loan is for 12 years with moratorium period of 3 years.

Basis of allocation of costs to different schools

- a) Salary costs for faculty are based on number of students for each programme with regulatory parameters in faculty student ratio. For School of Engineering, non-teaching details are computed based on regulatory norms. For other administrative and support people, costs have been allocated to schools based on revenue generated by each school.
- b) Academic costs are allocated based on input received from different schools for FY 2023-24, and for the years 2024-25 onwards, this is computed based on student numbers for each school. There are some common costs which are allocated between schools based on revenue generation for each school.
- c) All other office & general expenses, research expenses, sports activities admission & branding costs, repairs & maintenance and depreciation are allocated based on revenue generation each school.
- d) For schools requiring laboratories, infrastructure and other major set up, the relevant costs and depreciation are separately allocated to these schools.

Yearly intake and student strength:

- e) Actual student strength for the batch 2022-23 is presently 107 (This was 116 as on March 31, 2023). From the year 2023-24, student strength was estimated (PG admission will continue till Nov 30, 2023) at 510 based on admission pattern and keeping in mind the projected student strength assumed to be around 8000 students and more.
- f) Proposed Fee structure for the year 2024-25 is based on competitive fee structure of other universities. From the year 2024-25 onwards, increase is projected at an average 5% to 10% on YoY basis. Fee structure for all the courses is kept low to cater to those students with merit but having inadequate financial resources. **Fee structure for existing students remains the same throughout the duration of the course.** In addition, the university offers several scholarship schemes to take care of students getting admitted on merit-cum-means basis.





- g) Reasonable and affordable hostel income is computed. Increase in hostel fees is assumed to be 5% on YoY basis. Increased hostel fee is applicable to all the students, new as well as the existing students.
- h) Comparative Fee Structure with universities in Bangalore and universities at national level is placed before the Committee and the Committee noted the same.

Depreciation is provided on Straight Line Method on the estimated useful life of the assets as estimated by the management. Following table shows the estimated useful life of the asset under each category:

The Committee advised for submission of Cost of Education Certificate, duly certified by Chartered Accountant or a Firm of Chartered Accountants. The same is attached along with the minutes.

Capex Outlook

In view of the above launching of new programmes, substantial increase in student intake over the years and increased faculty and staff strength, establishment of adequate infrastructure will be of paramount importance. In this regard, construction of the university's global campus at Devanahalli is under way which is expected to be completed in 8 years' time. The construction will be carried out in 4 phases, e.g., Phase 1A, 1B, 1C and 1D covering the following: -

- a) Administration & Library Block
- b) 3 Academic Blocks
- c) Food Court
- d) Girls' hostel and Boys' hostel
- e) Faculty housing
- f) Guest house
- g) Sports Institute

Observations and Recommendation of the Committee

- The upcoming courses offered by the University should be futuristic. Example: B Com LLB
- The University should have a dedicated Research budget and should not be linked to revenue. There should be dedicated funds for international programs.
- Faculty recruitment should be driven by teachers who have practical experience in the area in which they are teaching.
- It is suggested to record classroom sessions to assess the effectiveness of faculty.
- Impact on the University if the donors reduce their financial commitment.
- The University should begin planning for overseas student enrolment.
- It is suggested to have probation period of 2 years for faculty. The alignment of faculty mindset to the University vision must be tested thoroughly before a permanent employment is confirmed.

Objective: To provide guidelines appointment of Visiting Faculty and Adjunct Faculty

Eligibility: All the external resource persons with an approval by the Deans of the respective Schools.

The process for identifying the requirement of Visiting and Adjunct faculty to commence 90 days prior to the commencement of each semester.

The respective Schools shall prepare the faculty requirement matrix (FRM) for the upcoming semester. The detailed report of the with the job specification (required qualification, experience, specialization etc) & Job description (job summary, expected KPIs etc) to be submitted to the Director HR and CC to Registrar along with the approval of the Dean. The report to be submitted at least 60 days before the commencement of the semester.

On the receipt of the FRM. The HR department initiates the process of recruitment with an announcement on official website of the university, reference network, newspaper advertisement (if needed) as deem suitable by the Director HR with the mention of last date for application.

The application scrutiny shall be carried out based on the job specifications.

The HR Department shall announce the list of shortlisted candidates and same shall be communicated to all the candidates.

The HR department shall arrange for a selection interview with a panel of experts. The selection process may include a demonstration class by the candidates.

The selection panel presents the list of recommendation for selection.

The list of recommended candidates shall be presented to the Vice Chancellor for approval through the Registrar.

The process of recruitment and selection to be completed min 30 days before the commencement of the semester.

On the approval, the candidates shall be given offer letters by the office of the Registrar.

The office of the registrar shall communicate the selection to the respective deans of the schools.

The consent shall be sought from the selected candidates.

On joining, candidates shall submit the essential documents such as PAN, Bank Account details, Aadhar copy, photographs, a copy of education qualification and experience certificate etc.

The HR department shall complete the joining formalities and issue ID card.

The HR may organize orientation program for the selected candidates.



1 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES & NOTES TO ACCOUNTS

A Background

The Chanakya University ('University') was incorporated under "The Chanakya University Act, 2021 (Karnataka Act No.37 of 2021) of the Government of Karnataka and received its assent on October 11, 2021, vide Parliamentary affairs & Legislation Secretariat Notification No. DPAL 44 SHASANA 2021, Bengaluru, dated October 11, 2021 and was incorporated as an artificial juridical person on March 05, 2022. The Centre for Social Studies (CESS) acted as a sponsoring body of the University and had incurred certain expenses, entered into agreements including those with donors, obtained requisite approvals for setting up the University, entered into certain contracts with vendors and contractors for creating infrastructure for running the University and took all other actions necessary or incidental there to. All assets and liabilities acquired/contracted by CESS in connection with the University vested in the latter pursuant to the said act. A memorandum was executed to formalize the same with effect from April 1, 2022. In terms of this memorandum, the benefits of all approvals, agreements, contracts, rights and obligations which CESS had in relation to the University was also transferred to it.

B. Significant Accounting Policies

1 Basis of preparation of financial Statements

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) in India. These financial statements comply with the Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI).

2 Use of Estimates:

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with the generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues/ expenses for the year and assets/liabilities/disclosure of contingent liabilities as at the end of the reporting date. Management believes that the estimates used in the preparation of financial statements are prudent, reasonable and based on best knowledge of current events & actions. Although these estimates are based on the management's best knowledge of current events and actions, uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in the outcomes requiring a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets or liabilities in future periods. Difference between the actuals and estimates are recognized in the period in which the same are known / materialized.

3 Fixed Assets:

Fixed assets are stated at cost of acquisition less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. The Cost of assets comprises of cost of acquisition and all costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the present condition for its intended use. Fixed assets received free of cost or donation are carried at nominal value Rs. 1.

Capital work-in-progress comprises of all directly attributable costs of bringing the fixed assets to their working condition for their intended use, till the date of asset being put to use. Advances paid to acquire fixed assets at the reporting date have been included under 'Loans and Advances'.

4 Depreciation:

Depreciation is provided on Straight Line Method on the estimated useful life of the assets as estimated by the management. Following table shows the estimated useful life of the asset under each category:

Utensils purchased for canteen and hostel are being expensed out in the year of acquisition.

Depreciation on assets is provided prorata from the date of addition over the useful life mentioned above. Depreciation on assets sold/discarded/disposal is recognised till the date of sale/discarding/disposal.

5 Leases taken by the University:

Leases are classified as finance or operating leases depending upon the terms of the lease agreements.

Assets acquired under leases, where the lessor has substantially transferred all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership, are classified as finance leases. Such leases are capitalized at the inception of the lease at lower of the fair value or the present value of the minimum lease payments and a liability is created for an equivalent amount. Each lease rental paid is allocated between the liability and the interest cost, so as to obtain a constant periodic rate of interest on the outstanding liability for each period.

6 Investments:

Investments are classified into short term and long term investments based on the management's intention at the time of purchase. Short term investments are carried at the lower of cost or fair market value of each investment computed individually. Long-term investments are carried at cost. Provision for diminution is made if such diminution is considered as being other than temporary in nature. The cost of an investment includes acquisition charges such as brokerage, fees and duties.

8 Funds/ Donations received by the University

- a Funds/Donations received by the University which are subject to certain conditions stipulated by the donors in terms of relevant agreements entered into with them have been classified in the Balance Sheet as 'Restricted Funds'. These conditions may relate to end utilisation of the donations or that the corpus is to be retained as such and the income derived there from used for specific purposes. Any funds / donations received with no such stipulations are classified in the Balance Sheet as 'Non Restricted Funds'
- b Donations received by the University from a donor for creation of a Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund have been included under the category of Restricted Funds. This amount has been utilised for investment in fixed deposits with a bank and in mutual funds and have been earmarked for this purpose. Seventy five percent of the incomes received from Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund shall be used for the purpose of development or general work of the University. The remaining twenty five percent shall be reinvested in the Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund
- c As and when funds / donations (other than that received for creation of Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund) are utilised for meeting permitted revenue expenses, an appropriate amount equal to the expenditure incurred is withdrawn and credited to the Income and Expenditure Account. In case such funds / donations are utilised for meeting permitted capital expenditure, an appropriate amount equal to the depreciation/amortisation recognised on the relevant assets is withdrawn and credited to the Income and Expenditure Account. The balance amount not recognised as income is shown in the Balance Sheet under the head 'Restricted Funds'.



d Income derived on funds/donations (other than that received for creation of Permanent Statutory Endowment Fund) till their utilisation or on endowment funds where the University can only utilise the income there on are recognised in the Income and Expenditure Account.

9 Cash and Cash Equivalents:

Cash for the purposes of cash flow statement comprise cash on hand and at bank in demand deposits and cash equivalents comprise of short term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into known amounts of cash and which are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value.

10 Revenue Recognition:

10.1 Tuition & other fees:

Tuition and other fees are recognised on accrual basis based on the period to which it relates.

10.2 Registration Fee and Application Fee:

Non refundable registration and application fees received from students are recognised on receipt basis

10.3 Interest and Other Income:

- a) Interest is recognized using the time-proportion method, based on rates implicit in the transaction.
- b) Dividends are recorded when the right to receive payment is established.
- c) Other Income are recognised at the time of rendering of service

11 Foreign Currency Transactions:

All foreign currency transactions are accounted for at the exchange rates prevailing on the date of such transactions. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currency are restated at the rates ruling at the year end and all exchange gains/ losses arising there from are adjusted to the Income and Expenditure Account, except those covered by forward contracted rates where the premium or discount arising at the inception of such forward exchange contract is amortized as expense or income over the life of the contract.

12 Retirement Benefits to employees:

12.1 Defined Contribution Plan

The University's defined contribution plans are the Employees Provident Fund (under the provisions of the Employees' Provident Funds and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952)

The University's contribution to Provident Fund is made at pre-determined rates and is expensed in the Income and Expenditure Account. The University has no liability other than making contribution to the fund.

12.2 Defined Benefit Plan [Long-Term Employee Benefits]

i) Gratuity

The liability as at the balance sheet date is provided for based on the actuarial valuation, based on Projected Unit Credit Method at the balance sheet date, carried out by an independent actuary. Actuarial Gains and Losses comprise experience adjustments and the effect of changes in the actuarial assumptions and are recognised immediately in the Income and Expenditure Account as an income or expense.

ii) Encashment of Leave

The employees are entitled for encashment of earned leave, a defined benefit plan, in accordance with the rules framed by the University. The liability for the year has been determined on the basis of actuarial valuation using Projected Unit Credit Method at the year end.

13 Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets



A provision is recognized when there is a present obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, in respect of which a reliable estimate can be made. Provisions, other than gratuity and leave liabilities, are not discounted to its present value and are determined based on management best estimates of the expenditure required to settle the obligation as at the balance sheet date. Provisions are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate for each such obligation.

A contingent liability is disclosed when there are possible or present obligations that may, but probably will not, require an outflow of resources, the outcome of which cannot be ascertained with reasonable certainty, unless the possibility of such outflow is remote.

Contingent assets are not recognized in the financial statements since that may result in the recognition of income that may never be realized.

14 Taxes on Income:

The University is registered under 12 AA of the Income Tax Act, 1961 and hence is exempt from tax.

15 Impairment:

Impairment loss is provided to the extent carrying amount of assets exceeds their recoverable amount. Recoverable amount is higher of asset's selling price and its value in use. Value in use is the present value of estimated future cash flows expected to arise from the continuing use of an asset and from its disposal at the end of its useful life. Net selling price is the amount obtainable from the sale of an asset in an arm's length transaction between knowledgeable, willing parties, less the costs of disposal.

An assessment is made at each reporting date as to whether there is any indication that previously recognized impairment losses may no longer exist or may have decreased. If such indication exists, the entity estimates the asset's recoverable amount. A previously recognized impairment loss is reversed only if there has been a change in the assumptions used to determine the asset's recoverable amount since the last impairment loss was recognized. The reversal is limited so that the carrying amount of the asset does not exceed its recoverable amount, nor exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation, had no impairment loss been recognized for the asset in prior years. Such reversal is recognized in the Income and Expenditure Account unless the asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the reversal is treated as a revaluation increase.

C Notes to Accounts

17a) Contingent Liabilities Not Provided For:

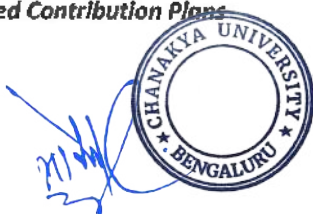
The University has received an endorsement dated March 18, 2023 from Assistant Commissioner of Taxes,(Vigilance) Bangalore, taking a contention that the land taken on lease from KIADB for running its activity is liable to pay GST under RCM basis. He has also quantified the tax payable at Rs. 9 crores apart from applicable interest and penalties. The University has responded to this endorsement objecting to the stand taken and has contended that no GST is payable on RCM basis as proposed. Based on professional advice, devolution of liability on the University is considered not probable, and hence no liability has been recognized in these financial statements.

17b) During the year, a writ petition has been filed with Honorable High Court of Karnataka wherein the University is one of the responding party to a litigation challenging both the allotment of leasehold land by KIADB and approval by State Government Order approving such allotment of land. The University however, has filed objection to such litigation and is confident that there are no material effects on the functioning of the University and there exists valid title on the University of the said portion of land allotted to it and such litigation does not hold any merit in the court of law based on legal advice sought.

- 19 As set out in note 1A above, the assets and liabilities of CESS in so far as it related to the University vested in the latter, with effect from April 1, 2022. The net difference between the value of assets and liabilities as at that date so vested resulted in a deficit of Rs 1,12,86,690/-. This mainly represents the aggregate of all expenses (normally recognized in the income and expenditure account) incurred by CESS on behalf of the University till March 31, 2022 from the date the university project was conceived. This aggregate expenditure incurred has not been segregated between those incurred upto March 5, 2022 and those incurred from March 6, 2022 to March 31, 2022. The excess of expenditure over income shown in the Income and Expenditure account consequently does not include such expenditure incurred between March 6, 2022 to March 31, 2022.

Notes to Financial Statement for the year ended March 31, 2022

Note 1

Organisation and Activity

Centre for Educational and Social Studies ("CESS"), formerly known as Centre for Leadership and Management in Public Services (hereinafter referred as the "Institution") is established as a Society under the Karnataka Societies Registration Act, 1960 domiciled at No. 6/6, 'Prajnanam', 10th Block, 2nd Stage, Nagarbhavi, Bangalore - 560072, Karnataka, India. The Institution primarily understands and builds Education, Health and Other Public Service Systems in the areas of Quality, Stakeholder Management, Technology and Knowledge Management.

The Institution is registered under section 12AA of the Income Tax Act, 1961 and has also obtained a certificate under section 80G.

The Chanakya University (Project of CESS) is a multi-disciplinary institution committed unflinchingly to the service of society through excellence in teaching, development of knowledge and direct contributions in the world of practice. The concerns of India and Indian knowledge systems will deeply inform all the knowledge endeavours of the University including teaching, research and practice. Truly Indian in spirit, the University will act equally as a citizen of the world.

The University is strategically located near the Bengaluru International Airport and is a part of the Aero-Space Industrial Zone, which houses over 1000 Multi-National Corporates including Rolls Royce, Apple, and the likes. This environment will encourage the students to network with industries for a journey of experiential learning through projects, internships, and interactions with industry leaders, which will prepare them for evolving as a professional. We will be embedding Value-Added Professional Programs which will enhance their employability skills, and every student will evolve as a Transformative Leader in their career space.

Note 2

Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Indian Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (Indian GAAP), under the historical cost convention on the accrual basis and as a going concern. Accounting Policies have been consistently applied except where a newly-issued accounting standard is initially adopted or a revision to an existing accounting standard requires a change in the accounting policy hitherto in use.

(b) Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the Generally Accepted Accounting Policies requires that the management makes estimates and assumptions that may affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent liabilities as at the date of financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenses during the reported period, the actual result could differ from those estimates. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognized prospectively in current and future periods. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

(c) Revenue Recognition

Income is recognised to the extent it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Institution and the amount can be reliably measured. Income received as part of Donations and Contributions are treated as income in the year of receipt. Income from interest on deposits are recognised on accrual basis.

(d) Fund Accounting

Fund Accounting is a method of accounting and presentation whereby assets and liabilities are grouped according to the purpose for which they are to be used. A fund is either created by law or by management or by donor. Funds are represented by the assets whether in the form of Fixed Assets, Investments, Inventory, Bank account, etc. Fund Accounting does not necessarily involve opening of a new bank account for its operations. Funds are just the restriction imposed for utilisation of asset.

Fund based accounting essentially involves preparation of financial statements fund-wise and consolidation of those statements to represent the financial results/position of the institution as a whole.

Funds received may be divided into:

- i. Restricted Funds
- ii. Unrestricted Funds

a. Corpus Fund - Funds contributed by founders / promoters of the Institution. It also includes donations / contributions received with specific directions to be part of the corpus. These are non-refundable funds, which can however be increased by additional contribution by the founders / promoters / donors / contributors with specific directions to be part of the corpus in furtherance of the objects of the Institution.

b. Designated Funds - Funds contributed by founders / promoters including CSR Funds towards Chanakya University – Project of CESS. This is not forming part of the Corpus Fund.

c. General Fund - Unrestricted funds other than designated funds and corpus.



Notes to Financial Statement for the year ended March 31, 2022

(e) Fixed Assets & Depreciation

Fixed assets are carried at cost of acquisition less accumulated depreciation. The cost of fixed assets comprises their purchase price including duties and taxes (other than those subsequently recoverable / adjustable from tax authorities) and any directly attributable cost of bringing the assets to working condition for their intended use.

Intangible assets acquired separately are measured on initial recognition at cost. Following initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses, if any.

Fixed Assets were earlier being depreciated under the Written Down Value method at the rates prescribed under section 32 r/w Rule 5 of the Income Tax Act, 1961. Whereas from the financial year 2021-22 onwards, there has been a change in the Policy of the Institution whereby the assets are being depreciated on Straight Line Method basis. The lease hold improvements are depreciated over the primary period of the lease/ license.

The amortization period and the amortization method are reviewed at each financial year end. If the expected useful life of the asset is significantly different from previous estimates, the amortization period is changed accordingly. If there has been a significant change in the expected pattern of economic benefits from the asset, the amortization method is changed to reflect the changed pattern.

The Institution has used the following rates to provide depreciation on its Fixed Assets:

Type of Asset	Depreciation Rate
Office Equipments	20%
Computers & Computer Softwares	25%
Furniture	20%
Vehicle	20%

(f) Lease of Land

Leasehold land rentals to be charged to the Income and Expenditure account on straight line basis in case of operating lease unless another systematic basis is more appropriate if payment to lessor is not made on straight line basis.

(g) Provisions and Contingent Liabilities

A provision is recognized when the Institution has a present obligation as a result of past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. Provisions are not discounted to their present value and are determined based on the best estimate required to settle the obligation at the reporting date. These estimates are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the Institution or a present obligation that is not recognized because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation. A contingent liability also arises in extremely rare cases where there is a liability that cannot be recognized because it cannot be measured reliably.

The Institution does not recognize a contingent liability but discloses its existence in the financial statements. The Institution has not recognized any contingent liabilities during the current year.

(h) Income Taxes

The Institution is registered under section 12AB of the Income-tax Act, 1961 ("the Act"). Under the Provisions of the Act, the Income of the Institution is exempted from tax, subject to the compliance of specific terms and conditions specified in the Act. The application of funds are considered based on actual payment basis as envisaged in Section 11 of the Act.

Report on Projected Unit Cost of Education per student per year

1. This is to report and confirm that, from the verification of the Statements of Projected unit cost of education per student per year as produced before us In terms of engagement letter from The Chanakya University (herein after referred to as "CU") dated 21.11.2023 and such Statements is enclosed as **ANNEXURE – I** to this report along with assumptions underlying in preparation of such report, the calculation of Projected cost of education per student per year is in accordance with the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles relating to preparation & presentation of Financial Information of similar nature, as followed in India and various pronouncements issued by Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (The ICAI) in this regard .
2. Our engagement for the agreed upon procedure was undertaken in accordance with the Standard on Related Services (SRS) 4400, "Engagements to Perform Agreed-upon Procedures regarding Financial Information" issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.
3. The procedures were performed solely to assist you in verification of the cost of education per student per year in respect of academic programs/ sub programs comprising of School of Engineering, School of Arts, Humanities & Social Sciences, School of Mathematics & Natural Sciences, School, of Commerce & Management, School of Public Policy & Legal Study, offered by CU based on the projected average unit cost for ensuing financial years as presented before the Fee Regulation Committee.
4. Our verification is based on the inquiries and discussions with university officials, who are responsible for preparing projections, expense statement, allocation of expenses, fund statement, number of intake of students and duration of respective courses with regard to statement prepared for the projected unit cost of education per student per year and relied on their representations and explanations.

We report our findings as below:

Based on our review of the said assumptions, nothing has come to our attention which causes us to believe that these assumptions do not provide a reasonable basis for the statement of projection of unit cost of education per student per year.



Further, as per our review the projections are prepared on the basis of the assumptions as set out in Notes to annexure to the cost of education per student per year and on a consistent basis with the historical financial statements, using appropriate accounting principles. Even if the events anticipated under the hypothetical assumptions described above occur, actual results are still likely to be different from the projection since other anticipated events frequently do not occur as expected and the variation may be material.

In the course of performing those procedures as enumerated above, on the basis and assumptions adopted for the cost of education per student per year for the various courses, the accompanying statements are found in order in accordance there with and no material deviation is observed.

Statement of assumptions and limiting conditions and Responsibility of Management :

- a) The preparation and presentation of the projection including the underlying assumptions, set out in notes to annexure is the responsibility of the Management of CU. Our responsibility is to review the evidence supporting the assumptions (excluding the hypothetical assumption) and other information in the prospective financial information. Consequently, users are cautioned that this projection may not be appropriate for purposes other than that described above.

ASSUMPTIONS/OTHER NOTES FORMING PART OF ANNEXURE I:

1. Cost of education has been worked out based on the approved intake numbers of students as confirmed by the management. The approved numbers have been arrived at based on the approvals of the regulatory bodies wherever applicable and for the rest as per the decision of the management. The student's intake and duration for each course considered for computing projected unit cost of education per student per year is based on the approved intake number of students for the Academic year 2024-25 as certified by the Registrar of The Chanakya University.
2. The Projected unit Cost of Education arrived at above is based on the average unit cost as projected, which includes an allocation of overhead expenses.
3. The projected yearly average unit cost per year is computed after giving effect to the allocation of expenses based on various assumptions. Above projected yearly average unit cost have been taken based on the average cost from the year 2023-24 to 2029-30, wherein 2023-24 being based on estimated financial statement and for the remaining years from 2024-25 to 2029-30 same is calculated based on best estimates of the management.
4. It is assumed that expense like Staff compensation, Academic expense, Utilities and services, Office and general expenses will be increased by an overall 5% to 10% considering the average increase in historical cost of each institution based on the best estimate of the management.
5. The cost of own fund is considered as Nil.
6. Infrastructure development cost is considered at NIL as it is a new campus.

ANNEXURE 1 to Report on Projected Unit Cost of Education per student per year dated 22/11/2023

Basis of allocation of costs :-

- a) Faculty salary costs are based on number of students for each programme with FSR of 1:15.
- b) These costs are directly allocated to schools and further drilled down to programmes based on revenue generation of each programme.
- c) Academic costs are directly allocated to schools based on student numbers and further allocated to programmes under each school based on revenue generation.
- d) All other common costs, e.g. administrative costs, finance department costs, costs of the office of Registrar etc. are allocated based on revenue generation for each school.
- e) All direct costs relating to Engineering - e.g. Faculty costs, learning & Development, FDP and other operational costs as per AICTE guidelines are directly allocated
- f) All common administrative costs are allocated based on revenue generation for School of Engineering

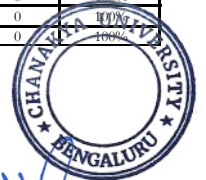
